RE: 2024 Regular Session House Bill 6: Program Completion and Sentence Credit Payments

The 2024 Regular Session House Bill 6 continued payments for program completions resulting in sentencing credit through the 2024-2026 fiscal biennium. HB 6 required the Kentucky Department of Corrections (DOC) to report the following annually:

- 1) Number of program completions;
- 2) Cost of payments for each category of sentencing credit; and
- 3) The programmatic impact on recidivism.

Corrections Policy and Procedures (CPP) 30.1 establishes the procedures used to identify and evaluate evidence-based, promising practice-based, and life skills-based programming approved for state inmates. Additionally, CPP 30.2 details the specific process that must be followed by county jails for these approved programs to be eligible to earn program credit.

A memorandum of agreement was developed to outline payments and reporting requirements for jail incentives. Criteria include: screening inmates via an evidence-based risk and need assessment with placement into programs that address individualized criminogenic needs; adherence to program guidelines and fidelity; reporting of program attendance and completions; and introduction of new quality assurance measures.

Programming is provided by DOC Division of Reentry Services within communities and state prisons, in conjunction with DOC-approved community partners and vendors. DOC strives to select evidence-based



programming that addresses the key factors associated with reducing recidivism and providing a second chance to inmates upon release.

Courses eligible for jail incentives are listed in the local facilities course catalogue, which is available on DOC's website and updated quarterly.

Programs that focus on education, vocational training, or life skills equip inmates with the tools needed to successfully return to their communities. Cognitive-behavioral programs help inmates develop healthier coping mechanisms and decision-making skills. Programs that provide addiction treatment are shown to reduce recidivism by addressing the underlying issues that may contribute to criminal behavior and curb generational cycles of crime.

Program participation aims to keep the state's recidivism low and boost public safety. Recently, Kentucky has secured low recidivism rates with nearly 70% of people released from state custody over the past two years not being re-incarcerated. Additionally, overdose deaths have decreased for the third year in a row, with 2024 seeing a more than 30% decrease.
