



UBER IN KENTUCKY

Statewide, since January 2023, Uber has paid millions of dollars to the Kentucky Department of Revenue under the new 6% tax on Transportation Network Company charges.

- Monthly, Uber drivers provide hundreds of thousands of rides in Kentucky.

In **Northern Kentucky**, at the **Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky Airport (CVG)**, Uber pays a \$3 Airport Transportation Network Company (TNC) Ride Fee.

- This fee provides millions of dollars to support CVG operations.

At the **University of Kentucky**, since 2022, Uber has partnered with University of Kentucky Transportation services to operate **“Kentucky Wildcab,”** a popular student-operated ride service. To reduce drunk driving, and to keep UK students safe after nights out in Lexington, students can request “Wildcab” rides using the Uber app Thursday to Sunday, from 11PM to 3AM

In **Bowling Green/Warren County**, following the devastating December 2021 tornado, Uber partnered with the City of Bowling Green and Hotel Inc to provide vouchers for Uber rides to tornado survivors.

- Uber vouchers assisted tornado survivors get to work, school, medical appointments, the grocery store, religious services, and to tornado recovery appointments.
