

Federal Staffing Minimum Mandate in Nursing Facilities

August 11, 2022 Betsy Johnson In April 2022, CMS released the proposed rule for the SNF PPS updates for Federal Fiscal Year 2023 (FFY23). In the proposed rule, CMS is seeking to establish a minimum staffing requirement for long-term care facilities.

Currently Federal Regulations require nursing homes to provide:

- Licensed nursing services 24 hours a day, with a registered nurse on staff for at least eight consecutive hours a day, seven days a week. This equates to 0.30 staffing hours per resident day (HPPD)
- Facilities also must designate a full-time registered nurse as a full-time director of nursing.
- Qualitative standard, which requires nursing homes to provide "sufficient nursing staff ... to maintain the highest practicable physical, mental, and psychosocial well-being of each resident."

Kentucky's staffing hours (3.78) Surrounding states (3.53) National average (3.76)



National Minimum Staffing Study

It will cost providers nearly \$10.1 billion annually to meet the minimum staffing if the mandate were 4.1 hours per patient day (HPPD). Under this mandate, nursing homes would have to hire an **additional 187,000 nurses and nurse aides**.*













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Percent Change in Health Care Sector Employment since February 2020
