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Gov. Beshear and Kentucky Agricultural Development Board Approve Nearly \$3 million for 26 Projects Across Commonwealth Investments Boost Key Industry During the Fight Against COVID-19

FRANKFORT, Ky. (May 15, 2020) – The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board approved \$2,820,352 for 26 agricultural diversification and rural development projects across the commonwealth at its monthly board meeting.

"Kentucky's farmers and producers work hard every day to help feed our commonwealth, and we are especially thankful to them throughout this difficult time," said Gov. Andy Beshear. "The KADB approvals today will help our farmers improve profitability and markets for their products, and I am proud to support these efforts."

State Investments:

Integrated Beef Assessment Tool

The University of Kentucky Research Foundation was approved for up to \$256,602 in state funds to launch an online, integrated beef assessment tool. The goal of this project is to facilitate producers to improve their management practices to increase profitability and overall sustainability of their operations. Farmers Market Pavilion

JSW Farm Chop Shop Inc. was approved for up to \$173,230 in state funds to purchase a carcass washing unit. Located in Wolfe County, JSW Farm Chop Shop Inc. is a Global Food Safety Initiative (GFSI) certified processing facility. Installation of a beef carcass wash system

CAIP covers a wide variety of agricultural enterprises in its 11 investment areas, including, but not limited to, bees and honey; equine; forage; beef and dairy cattle; goats and sheep; horticulture; poultry; swine; timber and technology, as well as energy efficiency and production; farm infrastructure and water enhancement; marketing; and value-added production.

The Deceased Farm Animal Removal Program (DAR) serves as a measure to facilitate the coordination of environmentally sound and cost-effective disposal of deceased livestock for Kentucky producers.

The Next Generation Farmer Program (NextGen) addresses the growing need for a specialized program that would benefit producers ages 18 to 40 that have been engaged in an agricultural operation for a minimum of three years.

The Youth Agricultural Incentives Program (Youth) encourages youth to engage in and explore agricultural opportunities.

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Gov. Beshear and Kentucky Agricultural Development Board Approve Additional Investment for Capital Access Loan Programs Kentucky Agricultural Finance Corporation Receives \$5 Million Investment

FRANKFORT, Ky. (May 15, 2020) – The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board (KADB) recently approved \$5 million for the Kentucky Agricultural Finance Corporation's (KAFC) revolving loan programs.

"During this uncertain time, capital availability for our agriculture industry is extremely important," said Gov. Andy Beshear. "The investment today will ensure that our farmers and producers can continue to provide necessary services and products to the commonwealth."

The KAFC provides financial assistance to individuals and enterprises interested in launching or expanding their agricultural manufacturing or value-added processing operations. This is comprised of investments for the purchase of livestock, land and machinery, the production of agricultural infrastructure and the expansion of agriculture-associated endeavors.

The demand for KAFC participation in agricultural projects has continued to increase since its revitalization in 2004. KAFC assets exceed \$89 million, with more than 74 percent of the disbursed portfolio being comprised of Beginning Farmer loans (\$56 million), which continue to be a priority of the KADB and KAFC boards. One hundred percent of principal and interest payments received by KAFC are invested directly back into the loan programs.

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Gov. Beshear and Kentucky Agricultural Development Board Approve \$1 Million Investment for Meat Processing Expansion

Investment Aids Critical Expansion During Pandemic

FRANKFORT, Ky. (May 19, 2020) – The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board (KADB) recently approved \$1 million for the Kentucky Agricultural Development Fund (KADF) Meat Processing Investment Program.

"We want to take every step we can to help the farmers and producers who are keeping food on our table during this pandemic," said Gov. Andy Beshear. "This program will help our smaller processors, who have been overwhelmed during this outbreak, to adapt, expand their operations and maintain the food chain we all depend on."

In response to COVID-19, the KADB developed the Meat Processing Investment Program to provide financial incentives for Kentucky meat processors to expand their operations to process more Kentucky beef, dairy, pork, lamb, sheep, goat and poultry products. Three separate investment areas include Kentucky Meat Processor Incentives, Simplified Processor Capacity Expansion and Large-Scale Processing Expansion.

Through the Level 1 Kentucky Meat Processor Incentives (Level 1) investments, eligible applicants can receive up to \$20,000 per facility. This is for processors needing support with costs related to increasing processing capacity of Kentucky animals custom processed under U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) inspection. Level 1 incentives will be paid per head processed above a pre-determined baseline at the following rates: \$100/cattle; \$50/hog; \$25/sheep or goat; and \$1/poultry. Eligible applicants for the Simplified Processor Capacity Expansion (Level 2) can receive up to \$37,500 in funding for expenses related to small to modest facility expansion, improvements or upgrades. Level 2 eligible investments include freezers, coolers, penning areas, kill floors, machinery and equipment, restorations, food safety certifications, and building expenses. Request for items or practices not listed may be considered upon approval

from the KADB Meat Processing Expansion Committee. For Level 2 inquiries, contact Renee Carrico, Project Manager, at 502-782-2719 or renee.carrico@ky.gov.

USDA-inspected processors or those actively planning to become USDA-inspected may be eligible for the Large-Scale Processing Expansion (Level 3) investments. Processors interested in making extensive facility improvements to process more Kentucky meat products can receive up to \$250,000 in funding. "This three-tiered investment approach incentivizes our processors to do more with what they have to increase the volume of meat processed in Kentucky," said Warren Beeler, executive director of the Governor's Office of Agricultural Policy (GOAP). "I am very proud of the board's bold action that will help grow an area of our food chain that has been overwhelmed due to the pandemic."

GOAP staff, working in conjunction with the Kentucky Center for Agriculture and Rural Development (KCARD) and the University of Kentucky, are currently available to assist Kentucky processors interested in applying for funding in any of the program areas.

FUNDING REQUEST

JSW Farm Chop Shop, Inc. is requesting \$783,367 in State funds to purchase equipment for wastewater treatment facility system and a carcass washing unit. The applicant has revised their budget is requesting \$230,339 in State funds.

APPLICATION SUMMARY

The applicant estimates with the upgrades it will be able to process 24,000 beef cattle per year by 2021. The funds will be used to install an efficient waste water treatment facility system and to purchase a carcass washing unit. Currently the USDA is only allowing the applicant to process beef trim that will be sold to customers seeking beef trim for a cooked, finished product.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$1,238,895 with the following funding sources: \$783,367 KADF State funds \$455,528 In Kind Match

PROJECTED PRODUCER IMPACT

APPLICATION SUMMARY

The Winchester Clark County Farmers Market was formed in 1991 by local farmers whose vision was to provide the community with locally raised produce and vegetables. Since then the market membership has expanded to over 30 farming families/businesses that currently line Depot Street every Saturday morning from May through September. The market has been on this street for numerous years, however with the recent demolition of the Sphar Building has led to three years of planning and designing to construct a permanent farmers market location on that property. A long term lease agreement has been made with the city of Winchester to allow the construct and use of the property. Funds will be used for construction cost of the new structure.

The total cost of the project is estimated at 485,000 with funding from the following sources:

The University of Kentucky Research Foundation is requesting \$311,802 in State funds to launch an online integrated beef assessment tool.

APPLICATION SUMMARY

The University of Kentucky (UK) Beef and Forage Specialists were requested by the Kentucky Agricultural Development Board's (KADB) Program Evaluation Committee to develop an integrated approach for County Agricultural Investment Program (CAIP) funding for beef cattle producers across the state. As a result, the group of 14 UK Specialists will be collaborating in an effort to develop an online assessment tool that will assist in identifying the areas of greatest need for each producer and track the progress they make over time. Additionally, educational materials will be developed to assist producers in the implementation of the recommended practices. The applicant states that, to their knowledge, no tool of this kind exists for beef cattle or any other agricultural product. The overall goal will be to facilitate producers to improve their management practices to increase profitability and overall sustainability of their operations. KADF funds will be utilized for development of the software, video production for education components and travel for specialists as they develop these materials.
