Reclaimed Ranch Fiber Mill, LLC is a soon-to-be established fiber mill in Northern KY that will process fiber for farm families in the region, state, and nation. Established as a fiber animal farm rescue in 2021, Reclaimed Ranch hosts agritourism events and farm tours encouraging community participation to showcase their fiber animals (alpacas, llamas, and Angora rabbits).

After the first season of shearing, the applicant quickly discovered the difficulty of finding a local small-scale fiber mill that could process their wool.

The applicant plans to purchase milling equipment from a retiring operation in Oklahoma to create value-added items (roving, yarn, felted material, rugs) for farmers to increase their farm profitability and educate consumers on sustainable fiber products.

KADB funds will be used to fund building upgrades, milling equipment, and working capital.

# County Agricultural Investment Program (CAIP)

CAIP provides Kentucky agricultural producers with cost-share assistance on practices to allow them to improve and diversify their current farm operations. CAIP covers a wide variety of agricultural enterprises in its 11 investment areas, including, but not limited to, bees and honey; equine; forage; beef and dairy cattle; goats and sheep; horticulture; poultry; swine; timber and technology, as well as energy efficiency and production; farm infrastructure and water enhancement; marketing; and value-added production.
