1	AN ACT relating to abandoned and blighted property.
2	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:
3	→ SECTION 1. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
4	READ AS FOLLOWS:
5	The General Assembly finds and declares that:
6	(1) Abandoned and blighted residential, commercial, and industrial buildings are a
7	nuisance and public safety threat to communities across the Commonwealth,
8	negatively affecting quality of life and surrounding property values. If not
9	rehabilitated, the buildings are likely to remain abandoned and subject to further
10	deterioration, resulting in increased costs to the Commonwealth, local
11	governments, and taxpayers;
12	(2) Providing a mechanism to transform abandoned and blighted buildings into
13	productive reuse and return to the market is an opportunity for communities
14	throughout the Commonwealth to revitalize, grow, and improve the quality of life
15	of its citizens; and
16	(3) If the owner of an abandoned and blighted residential, commercial, or industrial
17	building fails to maintain a building in compliance with applicable public safety
18	housing, building, and nuisance code requirements, it is in the public interest for
19	the court, pursuant to Sections 1 to 16 of this Act, to appoint a conservator to
20	bring the building into compliance with applicable code requirements before the
21	building sustains further deterioration preventing future productive economic
22	<u>use.</u>
23	→ SECTION 2. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
24	READ AS FOLLOWS:
25	As used in Sections 1 to 16 of this Act, unless the context otherwise requires:
26	(1) ''Abandoned and blighted property'' means a residential, commercial, or
27	industrial building that has been continuously vacant for at least one (1) year

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1	<u>w</u>	ith repeated housing, building, or nuisance code citations and at least three (3)
2	<u>o</u>	f the following conditions:
3	<u>(c</u>	n) The building has not been brought into compliance with the housing,
4		building, or nuisance code requirements of the local government in which it
5		is located within time constraints placed upon the owner by the appropriate
6		code enforcement agency or agencies;
7	<u>(l</u>	b) The building is unfit for human habitation, occupancy, or use;
8	<u>(c</u>	c) The condition and vacancy of the building materially increases the risk of
9		fire to the building and to adjacent properties;
10	<u>(c</u>	d) The building, by reason of neglect or lack of maintenance, has become a
11		place for the accumulation of substantial trash and debris or a haven for
12		rodents or other vermin that create potential health and safety hazards;
13	<u>(e</u>	e) The building is subject to unauthorized entry leading to potential health and
14		safety hazards, and either the owner has failed to take reasonable and
15		necessary measures to secure the building or the local government has
16		secured the building in order to prevent such hazards after the owner has
17		failed to do so;
18	<u>(1</u>	f) The building is an attractive nuisance to children or for illicit purposes,
19		including drug use and vagrancy; or
20	<u>(£</u>	g) The building, because of its dilapidated appearance or other conditions,
21		substantially negatively affects the economic well-being of residents or
22		businesses in close proximity to the building;
23	(2) "	Actively marketed" means:
24	<u>(c</u>	a) A ''for sale'' sign has been placed on the property with accurate contact
25		information;
26	<u>(1</u>	b) The owner has engaged the services of a licensed real estate agent, placed
27		weekly or more frequent advertisements in print, or listed the property for

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1		sale in electronic media via Web site specifically designed for such activity;
2		<u>and</u>
3		(c) The owner has made a good-faith effort to sell the property at a price that
4		reflects the circumstances and market conditions;
5	<u>(3)</u>	"Building" means a residential, commercial, or industrial building or structure
6		and the land appurtenant thereto;
7	<u>(4)</u>	"Competent entity" means a person or entity, including a nonprofit corporation,
8		with experience in the rehabilitation of residential, commercial, or industrial
9		buildings and the ability to provide or obtain the necessary financing for such
10		rehabilitation;
11	<u>(5)</u>	"Conservator" means a competent entity appointed by a court to take possession
12		of and undertake the rehabilitation of an abandoned and blighted building;
13	<u>(6)</u>	"Conservator's fee" for rehabilitation or demolition of an abandoned and
14		blighted building means a fee equal to the greater of:
15		(a) A reasonable amount not to exceed twenty percent (20%) of the actual costs
16		incurred by a conservator for rehabilitation or demolition of the building as
17		described in the plan for rehabilitation or demolition approved by the court;
18		<u>or</u>
19		(b) Fifteen percent (15%) of the sale price of the property;
20	<u>(7)</u>	"Costs of rehabilitation" means costs and expenses for construction,
21		stabilization, rehabilitation, maintenance, or demolition, including reasonable
22		non-construction costs associated with the project, including but not limited to
23		architectural, engineering, legal fees and costs, permits, financing fees, and a
24		conservator's fee;
25	<u>(8)</u>	"Historic structure" means a property which is listed on the National Register of
26		Historic Places, is a contributing property in a national register historic district,
27		or is designated an historic property by the Kentucky Heritage Council;

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1	(9) "Immediate family" means a parent, spouse, child, brother, or sister;
2	(10) "Local government" has the same meaning as in KRS 99.705;
3	(11) "Nonprofit corporation" means a corporation recognized by the United States
4	Department of Revenue as being tax exempt under 26 U.S.C. sec. 501(c) that has,
5	as one (1) of its purposes, remediation of blight, economic development, historic
6	preservation, or the promotion or enhancement of affordable housing
7	opportunities;
8	(12) "Owner":
9	(a) Means the holder or holders of title to, or of a legal or equitable interest in,
10	a residential, commercial, or industrial building for six (6) months or more;
11	<u>and</u>
12	(b) Includes an heir, assignee, trustee, beneficiary, and lessee, provided the
13	ownership interest is a matter of public record;
14	(13) "Party in interest" means a person or entity that has a direct and immediate
15	interest in a residential, commercial, or industrial building, including:
16	(a) The owner;
17	(b) Any lienholder with a recorded interest in the property; and
18	(c) The city and county in which the building is located;
19	(14) "Rehabilitation" means improvements to a building in order to bring it into
20	compliance with all applicable housing, building, and nuisance code
21	requirements; and
22	(15) "Vacant" means abandoned, unoccupied, or empty continuously for at least one
23	(1) year, excluding unauthorized or illegal occupancies.
24	→SECTION 3. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
25	READ AS FOLLOWS:
26	(1) A petition for the appointment of a conservator to take possession of and
27	undertake the rehabilitation of an abandoned and blighted building shall be filed

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1	in the Circuit Court in the county in which the building is located by the city or
2	county in which the building is located. The proceeding on the petition shall
3	constitute an action in rem.
4	(2) The petition shall include:
5	(a) The name and last known address of the owner of the vacant building;
6	(b) Copies of citations charging the owner with being in violation of local
7	housing, building, plumbing, electrical, fire, health, or nuisance code
8	requirements, including proof of service pursuant to KRS 65.8825(2);
9	(c) A schedule of recorded liens or other encumbrances on the property,
10	including the names and addresses of all lienholders;
11	(d) Assessed value of the property for tax purposes;
12	(e) A recommendation as to which person or entity should be appointed
13	conservator, including the qualifications of the person or entity;
14	(f) A preliminary plan including the current condition of the building,
15	photographs, initial estimates for costs of rehabilitation of the building to
16	bring it into compliance with all applicable housing, building, electrical,
17	fire, health, and nuisance code requirements charged in the citations, and
18	an estimated timeline for completion;
19	(g) Anticipated funding sources for the preliminary plan; and
20	(h) A sworn statement by the petitioner that, to the best of his or her knowledge
21	and belief:
22	1. The building meets the conditions for conservatorship set forth in
23	Section 5 of this Act;
24	2. The building has not been legally occupied for at least the previous
25	twelve (12) months;
26	3. The property has not been actively marketed within the previous sixty
27	(60) days;

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1	4. The property is not subject to a pending foreclosure action by an
2	individual or nongovernmental entity;
3	5. The property is not subject to an outstanding mortgage held by a bank
4	or other creditor with a recorded security interest in the property; and
5	6. The owner has been the holder of title to the property for six (6)
6	months or more.
7	(3) Upon filing the petition with the court, the petitioner shall file a notice of lis
8	pendens in the office of the clerk of the county in which the property is located.
9	→ SECTION 4. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
10	READ AS FOLLOWS:
11	(1) Service of process shall be provided in accordance with the Kentucky Rules of
12	Civil Procedure to the following parties in interest:
13	(a) The owner of the property at his or her last known address;
14	(b) The city or county in which the property is located that is not the petitioner;
15	<u>and</u>
16	(c) Any lienholder with a recorded interest in the property.
17	(2) Notice of the pendency and nature of the proceeding shall additionally be
18	provided by certified or registered mail to any property owner located within five
19	hundred (500) feet of the property at his or her last known address, including
20	notice the property owner may petition to intervene in the proceeding.
21	(3) The petitioner shall notify the parties in interest and any property owner located
22	within five hundred (500) feet of the property of the hearing date.
23	→SECTION 5. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
24	READ AS FOLLOWS:
25	(1) The court shall act upon a petition filed by holding a hearing. A party in interest
26	may be heard with respect to the petition, the requested relief, or any other matter
27	which may come before the court in reference to the proceeding. Any party in

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1	interest shall be permitted to present evidence to support or contest the petition,
2	including but not limited to the schedule of encumbrances.
3	(2) The court may appoint a competent entity as conservator if it finds all of the
4	following apply as of the date of filing the petition:
5	(a) The building has not been legally occupied for at least the previous twelve
6	(12) months;
7	(b) The owner fails to present sufficient evidence that the property was actively
8	marketed during the preceding sixty (60) day period;
9	(c) The property is not subject to a pending foreclosure action by an individual
10	or nongovernmental entity;
11	(d) The property is not subject to an outstanding mortgage held by a bank or
12	other creditor with a recorded security interest in the property;
13	(e) The owner fails to present sufficient evidence the property was acquired by
14	the owner within the preceding six (6) months. The evidence shall not
15	include instances where the prior owner is a member of the immediate
16	family of the current owner, unless the transfer of title results from the
17	death of the prior owner; and
18	(f) The court finds at least three (3) of the conditions meeting the definition of
19	abandoned and blighted property in Section 2 of this Act have been
20	established.
21	→ SECTION 6. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
22	READ AS FOLLOWS:
23	(1) If the court finds after a hearing that the conditions for conservatorship have
24	been established, the court may:
25	(a) Appoint a conservator; and
26	(b) Grant such other relief as may be just and appropriate.
27	(2) In appointing a conservator, the court shall consider any recommendation

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1		contained in the petition or otherwise presented by a party in interest.
2	<u>(3)</u>	No member of the governing body of a local government or a public officer of a
3		local government in his or her individual capacity, or a member of the immediate
4		family of a member of the governing body or public officer of a local government,
5		is qualified to be appointed as a conservator in the action.
6	<u>(4)</u>	A conservator appointed by the court may be required to post a bond in an
7		amount determined by the court, but not exceeding the assessed value of the
8		building at the time of the appointment, prior to proceeding as conservator.
9	<u>(5)</u>	A conservator may be removed by the court at any time upon the request of the
10		conservator, or upon a showing by a party in interest that the conservator is not
11		carrying out duties or responsibilities under the appointment. If a conservator is
12		removed for failure to carry out duties or responsibilities under the appointment,
13		the conservator shall not be entitled to reimbursement for costs of rehabilitation.
14		→SECTION 7. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
15	REA	AD AS FOLLOWS:
16	<u>(1)</u>	If the court finds after a hearing that the conditions for conservatorship have
17		been established, but the owner represents that the conditions will be abated in a
18		reasonable period, the court may allow the owner to proceed to remedy the
19		conditions.
20	<u>(2)</u>	If the owner is allowed to proceed with abatement, the court may require the
21		owner to post a bond in the amount of the repair costs estimated in the petition as
22		a condition to retaining possession of the building.
23	<u>(3)</u>	The court shall additionally enter an order providing that, if the conditions are
24		not abated by the owner by a specific date or that other specified remedial
25		activities have not occurred by a specific date or dates, an order appointing a
26		conservator shall be entered.
27	<i>(4)</i>	In the event the owner brings the property into compliance with all applicable

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1	housing, building, and nuisance code requirements or sells the property subject
2	to the conservatorship, the owner shall reimburse the petitioner for all reasonable
3	costs incurred by the petitioner in preparing and filing the petition.
4	→SECTION 8. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
5	READ AS FOLLOWS:
6	(1) The conservator shall have all powers and duties necessary in order to bring the
7	building into compliance with all applicable housing, building, and nuisance
8	code requirements and to fulfill the conservator's responsibilities under Sections
9	1 to 16 of this Act. A conservator's powers and duties shall include but not be
10	<u>limited to:</u>
11	(a) Taking possession and control of the building and appurtenant land subject
12	to the conservatorship;
13	(b) Pursuing all claims or causes of action of the owner with respect to the
14	building;
15	(c) Contracting for the repair and maintenance of the building. The
16	conservator shall make a reasonable effort to solicit three (3) bids for
17	contracts valued at more than thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000);
18	(d) Borrowing money or incurring indebtedness for costs of rehabilitation of
19	the building as set out in Section 9 of this Act;
20	(e) Contracting for and paying for the restoration of utilities to the building;
21	(f) Applying for and obtaining construction permits;
22	(g) Purchasing materials, goods, and supplies to accomplish repairs to the
23	building;
24	(h) Renewing or entering into contracts providing for insurance coverage on
25	the building;
26	(i) Engaging and paying legal, accounting, appraisal, and other professionals
27	necessary to aid the conservator in the conduct of the conservatorship;

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1	(j) If the building has been designated a historic structure, consulting with the
2	local government's historical commission or board of historical and
3	architectural review, a local historic preservation organization or, in the
4	absence thereof, the Kentucky Heritage Council for recommendations on
5	preserving the property's historic character;
6	(k) Applying for and receiving public grants or loans;
7	(l) Selling the building as set out in Section 12 of this Act; and
8	(m) Exercising all authority that an owner of the building would have to
9	rehabilitate and maintain the building.
10	(2) Notwithstanding the appointment of a conservator, nothing in Sections 1 to 16 of
11	this Act shall be construed to relieve the owner of any civil or criminal liability or
12	of any obligation to pay taxes, local government liens and charges, private liens,
13	or other fees or charges, whether incurred before or after the appointment of the
14	conservator, and no such liability shall transfer to the conservator.
15	(3) If any interest in the property subject to conservatorship is sold or transferred by
16	the owner during the pendency of the conservatorship, the sale or transfer shall
17	be subject to the conservatorship.
18	→SECTION 9. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
19	READ AS FOLLOWS:
20	(1) A conservator may borrow money or incur indebtedness in order to cover the
21	costs of rehabilitation or to otherwise fulfill the conservator's obligations under
22	Sections 1 to 16 of this Act. In order to facilitate the borrowing of funds for the costs of
23	rehabilitation, the court shall grant priority status to a lien given to secure payment on
24	a debt incurred for purposes authorized under Sections 1 to 16 of this Act.
25	→SECTION 10. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
26	READ AS FOLLOWS:
27	(1) While in possession of the building, the conservator shall:

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1		(a) Maintain, safeguard, and insure the property;
2		(b) Develop a final plan for abatement of the conditions which caused the
3		petition to be granted or, if no feasible final plan can be developed, develop
4		alternatives, including the closing, sealing, or demolition of all or part of
5		the building in accordance with Section 11 of this Act;
6		(c) Submit the final plan to the court and all parties in interest; and
7		(d) Execute the final plan.
8	<u>(2)</u>	The final plan shall include a cost estimate, a financing plan, sources of
9		financing, and a description of the work to be done for the rehabilitation of the
10		building in order to bring it into compliance with all applicable housing,
11		building, and nuisance code requirements, any duly adopted plan for the area in
12		which the building is located, and any historic preservation requirements, along
13		with an estimated timeline for completion.
14	<u>(3)</u>	Any party in interest shall be allowed to comment on or request a hearing on the
15		final plan within thirty (30) days of receipt of the final plan by certified or
16		registered mail.
17	<i>(4)</i>	While in possession of the building, the conservator shall additionally submit a
18		status report to the court and all parties in interest every six (6) months from the
19		date of appointment, or more frequently as the court may deem appropriate. The
20		status report shall include:
21		(a) A copy of any contracts entered into by the conservator regarding
22		improvement of the building and any related bids;
23		(b) An account of all expenses and improvements;
24		(c) The status of developing and implementing the final plan; and
25		(d) A description of proposed actions to be taken in the next six (6) months to
26		improve the building.
27	(5)	Upon implementation of the final plan, the conservator shall submit to the court

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1		and all parties in interest a full accounting of all actions taken to rehabilitate the
2		property, all income and expenditures received or incurred during
3		implementation of the final plan, and an estimate of the conservator's fee.
4	<u>(6)</u>	The conservator may then petition the court for authorization to terminate the
5		conservatorship through either a public or private sale.
6		→SECTION 11. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
7	REA	AD AS FOLLOWS:
8	<u>(1)</u>	If no feasible final plan can be developed for rehabilitation of the building in
9		order to bring it into compliance with all applicable housing, building, and
10		nuisance code requirements at a reasonable cost in relation to the present value
11		of the building without consideration of the value of the land on which the
12		building is located, the conservator may submit a plan for demolition and
13		removal of the building and all debris from the property to the court and all
14		parties in interest.
15	<u>(2)</u>	The present value of the building in relation to the estimate for costs of
16		rehabilitation of the building in order to bring it into compliance with all
17		applicable housing, building, and nuisance code requirements may be established
18		by evidence of three (3) affidavits prepared by real estate appraisers, qualified
19		building contractors, or qualified building inspectors.
20	<u>(3)</u>	A plan for demolition shall require a reasonable effort to be made to salvage
21		reusable materials for credit against the cost of demolition. The proceeds of any
22		moneys received from the sale of salvaged materials shall be used or applied
23		against the cost of demolition and removal of the building and all debris from the
24		property. Proper records shall be kept showing application of sales proceeds. Any
25		sale of salvaged materials may be made without the necessity of public
26		advertisement.
27	<i>(4)</i>	Any party in interest shall be allowed to comment on or request a hearing on a

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1		plan for aemoution within thirty (30) days of receipt of the plan for aemoution by
2		certified or registered mail.
3	<u>(5)</u>	Upon demolition and removal of the building and all debris from the property,
4		the conservator shall submit to the court and all parties in interest a full
5		accounting of all actions taken, all income and expenditures received or incurred,
6		and an estimate of the conservator's fee.
7	<u>(6)</u>	The conservator may then petition the court for authorization to terminate the
8		conservatorship through either a public or private sale.
9		→SECTION 12. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
10	REA	AD AS FOLLOWS:
11	<u>(1)</u>	Upon application of the conservator, the court may order the sale of the property
12		free and clear of all existing liens, claims, and encumbrances subject to the
13		approval and supervision of the court by private sale pursuant to a written
14		contract of sale between the conservator and prospective purchaser, by public
15		auction, or by any other method that the court determines is fair to the owner of
16		the property and all parties in interest, is reasonable under the circumstances,
17		and will maximize the return from the property to the conservatorship estate.
18	<u>(2)</u>	Before entering an order authorizing the sale of the property by the conservator,
19		the court may require that the conservator provide evidence of the value of the
20		property by affidavit of three (3) real estate appraisers or by any other evidence
21		that the court determines is appropriate.
22	<u>(3)</u>	If the conservator has received a specific offer for sale that the conservator
23		desires to accept, the conservator shall provide to the court the identity of the
24		buyer and the proposed terms of the sale. If the conservator has not received a
25		specific offer for sale that the conservator desires to accept, the conservator shall
26		provide to the court the proposed procedures for conduct of the sale.
27	(4)	Any sale of the property shall be made subject to the approval and supervision of

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1	the court only after all of the following occur:
2	(a) The court finds the conditions that were the grounds for the petition have
3	been abated or corrected by the conservator and the owner has not
4	successfully petitioned to terminate the conservatorship as set out in Section
5	14 of this Act;
6	(b) Notice of the proposed sale and an opportunity for a hearing at which all
7	parties in interest may be heard is given in accordance with the Kentucky
8	Rules of Civil Procedure, provided if no party objects to the proposed sale or
9	requests a hearing within thirty (30) days, the court may proceed without a
10	hearing; and
11	(c) The court issues an order of sale that sets forth the required procedures for
12	or terms of the sale.
13	(5) If the proposed sale is by public auction or any other method other than a private
14	sale approved by the court, the conservator shall conduct and promote the sale in
15	a manner anticipated to raise the highest and best sale price.
16	(6) If the proposed sale is pursuant to a specific offer the conservator desires to
17	accept, the court may finally approve the sale and no separate confirmation order
18	is required. If the proposed sale is by public auction or any method other than a
19	private sale approved by the court, the conservator shall seek an order approving
20	the sale process and confirming the sale within ten (10) days of the date of the
21	<u>sale.</u>
22	(7) Notwithstanding any provision to KRS Chapter 134 to the contrary, any holder of
23	a local government lien may by written agreement waive or release all or a
24	portion of its lien priority upon sale of a property subject to the lien in accordance
25	with Sections 1 to 16 this Act.
26	→SECTION 13. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
27	READ AS FOLLOWS:

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1	<i>(1)</i>	If the proceeds of the sale are insufficient to pay all existing liens, claims, and
2		encumbrances, the proceeds shall be distributed according to the priorities set out
3		in subsection (2) of this section and all unpaid liens, claims, or encumbrances
4		which have not been assumed under subsection (2) of this section shall be
5		extinguished.
6	<u>(2)</u>	The proceeds of the sale shall be applied in accordance with the following
7		priorities to:
8		(a) Costs and expenses of sale;
9		(b) State and local government tax liens, unless priority is waived by a local
10		government in accordance with Section 12 of this Act;
11		(c) Principal and interest on any borrowing or incurrence of indebtedness
12		granted priority over existing liens and security interests under Section 9 of
13		this Act;
14		(d) Costs of rehabilitation;
15		(e) Properly recorded local government code enforcement liens existing
16		pursuant to KRS 65.8835;
17		(f) Other valid liens and security interests in accordance with their priority;
18		(g) The owner; and
19		(h) If the owner cannot be located, any proceeds from the sale which belong to
20		the owner shall be presumed to be abandoned and unclaimed and shall be
21		subject to the custody and control of the Commonwealth.
22	<u>(3)</u>	Following confirmation of the sale by the court, the conservator shall execute
23		and deliver a deed within ten (10) days conveying title to the property to the
24		purchaser free and clear of all existing liens, claims, and encumbrances in
25		accordance with this section and KRS Chapter 132.
26	<u>(4)</u>	As soon as reasonably possible following delivery of the deed to the purchaser,
27		the conservator shall submit to the court and all parties in interest a report of sale

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1	in which the conservator certifies all of the following:
2	(a) That the sale was conducted in accordance with the order authorizing the
3	sale;
4	(b) The date of the sale;
5	(c) The name of the purchaser;
6	(d) The purchase price;
7	(e) The amount of the net proceeds of the sale;
8	(f) A copy of the closing statement, if a closing statement was prepared; and
9	(g) Any other information that the court may require.
10	→SECTION 14. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
11	READ AS FOLLOWS:
12	Upon request by a party in interest or the conservator, the court may order the
13	termination of the conservatorship if it determines:
14	(1) The obligations, expenses, and improvements of the conservatorship, including
15	all costs of the conservator, have been fully paid or provided for and the purposes
16	of the conservatorship have been fulfilled;
17	(2) The owner or a lienholder has requested the conservatorship be terminated and
18	has provided adequate assurances to the court that the conditions that constituted
19	grounds for the petition will be promptly abated;
20	(3) The conservator is not carrying out required duties or responsibilities as set out
21	in Section 8 of this Act; or
22	(4) The building has been sold by the conservator and the proceeds have been
23	distributed as set out in Section 13 of this Act.
24	→SECTION 15. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 99 IS CREATED TO
25	READ AS FOLLOWS:
26	Sections 1 to 16 of this Act shall not apply if the property owner has vacated the
