SHORT TERM RENTALS ARE CRITICAL TO KENTUCKY TOURISM

Kentucky's tourism industry is worth **\$14 billion** annually and provides over 100,000 jobs. The bourbon industry has an annual boost of **\$9 billion**.

Short-term rentals are critical to supporting Kentucky's bourbon industry by offering its 2.5 million visitors accommodation close to Kentucky's most iconic distilleries along the Bourbon Trail, many of which are located in areas with few or no hotels.

Short term rental reform helps ensure Kentucky residents can continue sharing their homes in areas along the Bourbon trail and drive welcome tourism to our state's distilleries and neighboring communities.

Frankfort (Bu1ffalo Trace)

Nearly 80% of census tracts in Frankfort are home to Airbnb listings but no hotels.

Hosts in Frankfort neighborhoods without hotels welcomed over 6,000 guests and collectively earned more than \$900,000 from sharing their home in 2022.

Versailles (Woodford Reserve)

More than 70% of census tracts in Versailles are home to Airbnb listings but no hotels.

Hosts in Versailles neighborhoods without hotels welcomed over 3,000

guests and collectively earned nearly \$700,000 from sharing their home in 2022.

Bardstown (BEAM and Heaven Hill)

More than 70% of census tracts in Bardstown are home to Airbnb listings but no hotels.

Hosts in Bardstown neighborhoods without hotels welcomed over 2,500 guests and collectively earned more than \$400,000 from sharing their home in 2022.

Lawrenceburg (Wild Turkey)

100% of census tracts in Lawrenceburg are home to Airbnb listings but no hotels.

Hosts in Lawrenceburg welcomed nearly 3,000 guests and collectively earned more than \$400,000 from sharing their home in 2022.

Shelbyville (Diageo)

More than 40% of census tracts in Shelbyville are home to Airbnb listings but no hotels.

Hosts in Shelbyville neighborhoods without hotels welcomed over 4,500 guests and collectively earned more than \$250,000 from sharing their home in 2022.
