The Power of Investing in Home Libraries



Based on Years of Research



Approximately 80 books in an adolescent student's home library raises literacy levels

to average.

Growing up with more books in the home has been shown to elevate students' educational attainment across 27 countries, including the United States.

- As few as 20 books in the home helps students achieve higher levels of education.
- A home library is as important as parental education and family income in predicting educational outcomes.

Proven Success in Building Home Libraries

Florida's New Worlds Reading Initiative Completes a Fantastic Year 1

- 1.5 million books delivered directly to homes of striving readers in the first year of the program.
- Eligible students invited to enroll and select topic areas of interest. Topics are combined with age, grade, and reading level to create a high-interest home library.
- Throughout the school year, with one new book each month (available in multiple languages), over 100,000 students developed both their reading skills and a love of reading.
- The program, which also engages families and reinforces Science of Reading strategies, is sustained via <u>legislation</u> and looking forward to a dynamic Year 2.

Louisiana Program Ready to Launch

- Expands program design to add PreK students a critical moment of development.
- Students are enrolled automatically in an "opt-out" approach, reaching more readers.
- Sustainable funding mechanism created via legislation.
