

Of the 72 relative employees from Oct. 2023 submitted to Representative Decker in July 2024, all but two have officially entered new roles as of Aug. 31, 2024. The 2 remaining positions are in process.

RESPONSE: Similar to the positions, relevant offices and departments are in the process of being disbanded. Some are being re-worked to better acknowledge our commitment to serving all people in our community. The one exception is the Center for Health Equity Transformation (CHET). CHET is designed to tackle the leading health conditions experienced by Kentuckians (see below).

CHET: Kentucky has a declining life expectancy and among the highest national rates of morbidity and mortality from cardiovascular disease, cancer, substance abuse, diabetes, and obesity. Moreover, the burden of these diseases is not evenly distributed; suffering falls

disproportionately on rural, racial/ethnic, and LBGTQIA communities, those with disabilities and those from lower socioeconomic status groups.

CHET receives funding from the College of Medicine, College of Arts and Sciences, College of Communication & Information, College of Public Health, Center for Clinical & Translational Science, Office of the Vice President for Research, Cardiovascular RPA, and UNITE RPA. External to UK, CHET has received funding from Aetna Better Health of Kentucky and Anthem BlueCross and BlueShield Medicaid.

CHET's Primary Faculty demonstrate extraordinary research productivity, including research funding, publications, presentations, and research-related honors and awards.

Since 2019, Primary Faculty have been awarded 45 grants for a total of \$64.7 million in new funding. Including funding obtained prior to 2019, the total funding for CHET primary faculty is \$115.2 million across 66 research projects with current active grants totaling \$102.5 million for FY23-24. In addition to their success in obtaining research funding, CHET's Primary Faculty average seven peer-reviewed publications and six peer- reviewed presentations annually. This is extraordinary productivity, especially considering that 8 out of 10 primary faculty are early career faculty and/or pre-tenure.

Following the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit's decision in *Speech First v. Schlissel* in 2019, the university has not used its bias incident response mechanism to convey an implicit threat of punishment for those alleged to have committed a bias incident. Rather, the university has used the bias incident response system primarily as an information gathering mechanism. In some instances, the Institutional Equity and Equal Opportunity Office would treat a report as a basis to begin a formal investigation. Those investigations were done independently of the bias incident response mechanism. Due to constitutional and statutory privacy rights, the university cannot share copies.

3. Please state whether, at anytime between July 1, 2020, and the date of your response, any member of the university faculty or staff was required to communicate in a core syllabus or otherwise, a statement of support for diversity, equity and inclusion and initiatives, including initiatives that provide differential,

Yes, there are three instances. First, the former University Senate Rules required a syllabus statement in support of diversity, equity and inclusion. After the UK Board of Trustees abolished the University Senate in June 2024, this rule no longer exists.

Second, some job postings require applicants to respond to open ended questions on topics related to DEI. Postings within UK HealthCare require all applicants to agree to abide by the UK HealthCare values, which are diversity, innovation, compassion and teamwork.

Third, the university operates the Disparities Researchers Equalizing Access for Minorities (DREAM) Scholars Program. Although open to all predoctoral trainees — postdoctoral trainees and assistant professors in good standing are eligible to apply — there is a preference for applicants who are underrepresented minorities in research

4. Consistent with its obligations under the Constitution, the university does not give preferences based on religion, sex, color or national origin. All employment decisions are made on the basis of merit. As part of our procurement process, firms are asked about their commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion, but all decisions are made on the basis of merit.

5. State whether, as of the date of response to this letter, the university has the formal or informal policy that prohibits discrimination on the basis of an individual's political or social viewpoint.

The university has formal policies prohibiting discrimination on the basis of an individuals' political or social viewpoints. Specifically, the University's Governing Regulations (University Constitution), Administrative Regulations (university statutes implementing the Constitution) and Human Resources Polices prohibit such discrimination.

6. Please state whether, as of the date of your response to this letter, you believe the university is required by any federal or state law, court order or binding contract, to provide differential treatment or benefits to individuals on the basis of religion, race, sex, color or national origin.

No, the university is not required by any federal or state law, court order or binding contract to provide differential treatment or benefits to individuals on the basis of religion, race, sex, color or national origin. Indeed, absent extraordinary circumstances,

both the United States Constitution and the Kentucky Constitution forbid consideration of race, sex and religion in decision-making. At times, federal or state laws do require the university to make accommodations on the basis of religion or disability, but the university does not consider these legally required accommodations to be "differential treatment or benefits".

7. Please state whether, as of the date of your response to this letter, there are any students enrolled at the university who received a scholarship that was awarded on the basis of the recipient's religion, race, sex, color or national origin.

The university interprets your question as asking whether the university awarded race exclusive scholarships. With that understanding, the answer is no. The university has always complied with the Constitution as interpreted by the Supreme Court.

First, consistent with the Court's decision over the last half century, the university does not have scholarships which are race exclusive.

Second, prior to the Supreme Court's decision in *Students for Fair Admissions v.*President and Fellows of Harvard College, the university — consistent with applicable case law — had a number of scholarships that considered race as one factor among many. To the extent that scholarships were awarded prior to Students for Fair Admissions and were renewable, the university has honored those commitments.

Third, after the Supreme Court's decision in *Students for Fair Admissions*, the university does not consider race. Consistent with the Court's decision, the university may consider the content of personal statements, which may include a discussion of how race has impacted the applicant's life.

8. Based on a review of the course descriptions of more than 5,000 2023-24 enrolled classes, the university does not offer any courses which are "dedicated to the promotion or justification of diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives" or which "present as truth, rather than as a subject for inquiry" the various topics described. There are courses which discuss those topics as a matter of inquiry. Consistent with the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit's decision in *Meriwether v. Hartop*, individual faculty members have a First Amendment right to teach students about certain concepts without presenting those concepts as truth.

- Please note that the minimum test score requirements are based on the composite or total score from
 one test date. Early application is strongly encouraged, but applications and supporting documents
 must be received by 11:59 p.m. EST on December 1, 2024. Please note, it is the student's
