It's been one of the most powerful things we've done because it helps us all understand the racialized impacts of laws that have determined access to opportunity, resources, and power for generations and highlight what we can do to change them.

In partnership with <u>Bread for the World</u>, Metro United Way developed this training in the fall of 2019 and has since shared it with many different audiences. Our staff has been trained to execute the simulation and offer a safe, confidential, and engaging space to help elevate the conversation around policies that have been in place for decades and have affected generations of families in our community.

The Emancipation Proclamation was enforced in Texas on June 19, 1865, at the end of the American Civil War, two years after it was first signed. In 2021, the date was officially recognized as a federal holiday, symbolizing the end of slavery in the United States.

MCC Gears Up for the 30th Annual "Voices" Black History Month Celebration with a Kentucky Chautauqua Performance of Colonel Charles Young

MADISONVILLE, KY – Madisonville Community College is thrilled to announce the upcoming 30th Annual "Voices" Black History Month Celebration, an event dedicated to honoring the rich cultural heritage and contributions of the African American community. The celebration will take place on Monday, February 5th, at noon in the John H. Gray Building, Room 104, on the MCC North campus.

The program includes a performance by local performer Margie Bowman and a feature presentation from the Kentucky Humanities Kentucky Chautauqua program of Colonel Charles Young, portrayed by Michael Jones.

Charles Young was the third African American to graduate from the United States Military Academy at West Point. He was born near Mays Lick, Kentucky, in Mason County on March 12, 1864, a year before the end of the Civil War. Young had a distinguished career of more than 30 years in the United States Army, rising from lieutenant to colonel, all while battling racism in a nearly all-white officer corps. Young's success in an army that was not quite ready to embrace him required steadfast devotion and perseverance. He was at the height of his career when America entered World War I.

Young accomplished much during his military service, including being the first African American superintendent of a national park, the first African American military attaché, and the highest-ranking African American Regular Army officer at the time of his death.

Colonel Charles Young is portrayed by Michael Jones of Paris. Jones holds a B.A. from Morehouse College and an M.A. from the University of California, Riverside. He spent several years working as a museum curator for the Kentucky Historical Society and currently works for the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet as a Historic Preservation Program Administrator.

Bennie Vernell Massey, Sr. September 3, 1949 - June 28, 2023

A life-long resident of Lynch, Kentucky, Bennie Vernell Massey, Sr. was a retired coal miner and member of the United Mine Workers of America who fought for better working conditions, wages, and rights, alongside his brother, George. He was an active member of the Greater Mt. Sinai Baptist Church, where he served as deacon and a member of the choir. Bennie and his first wife, Patricia Diane Mahone, shared two children, Bennie Vernell Massey, Jr., and Angel Nicole Massey. He later married Kaye Francis Pearson until her passing in 2016.

Known for his sense of style, talent for grilling, deep rolling laugh, and penchant for jovial banter, Bennie passionately advocated for the Southeastern Kentucky region. He appeared in many documentaries for KET and other educational outlets, sharing the stories and majestic beauty of the area. He was a proud member of the theatrical department of Southeast Kentucky Community and Technical College and performed in the "Higher Ground" series for many years. He served his community as a member of the Tri-City Messengers (an Acapella gospel group), a member of the Greater Mt. Sinai Spirituals, the president of the Eastern Kentucky Social Club (Lynch Chapter), and a long-term Lynch City Councilman.


