## Support House Bill 361 to Expand Patient Access to Care

More than **2 million** Kentuckians live in areas that are experiencing healthcare provider shortages. Amid a growing healthcare provider shortage, physician assistants (PAs) have the education, training and experience to meet patient needs. But outdated regulatory structures and burdensome mandates must be modernized to ensure the next generation of PAs choose to live and work in Kentucky.

The Kentucky Academy of Physician Assistants (KAPA) asks for your support of HB 361.

## What would HB 361 do?

HB 361 would remove unnecessary administrative burdens and give PAs a voice in their regulatory body.

## Proposals in HB 361 include the following:

- Remove alternate physician requirement.
  - Supervising physicians are required to designate an alternate physician in their application to supervise. The physician shortage makes this an enormous administrative burden. Removing this requirement would allow flexibility at the practice level while allowing a PA to have multiple supervising physicians as appropriate.
- Amend CME requirements for HIV and pediatric abusive head trauma.
  - All Kentucky PA programs require training on HIV and pediatric abusive head trauma. Allowing graduating PA students to apply their curriculum to meet the CME requirement will remove duplication.
- Add one PA to the Kentucky Board of Medical Licensure (KBML) as a non-voting member.
- Require the chair of PAAC be a licensed PA.
- **Require** members of the Physician Assistant Advisory Committee (PAAC) to be nominated by fellow PAs.

## What Kentucky Patients Say About PAs
