

• Jobs - Over 11 million work-based trips annually
























































Context


- Response to COVID-19: Deemed
 Essential Service Providers
- Move essential workers to jobs at hospitals, warehouses, distribution facilities, and grocery stores.
- Access to essential needs like grocery, dialysis, and cancer treatments.
- As the economy recovers, need for more service and more buses to allow for adequate distance between passengers.




Funding

- Surrounding States (OH, IN, TN) investing 5 to 15 times more per capita in public transit than KY.
- FY 21 budget allocated some VW Settlement money to match bus purchases.
- Draft FY 21 budget included a fix for toll credits.
- Final FY 21 budget did not.
 - Now very little match for non-bus capital needs
 - Still no identified solution to the toll credit crisis









- We need to identify long-term solution to toll credits crisis.
- Without a solution in the general fund budget, tens of millions of federal dollars allocated to Kentucky's essential transit agencies will go unmatched each year.
