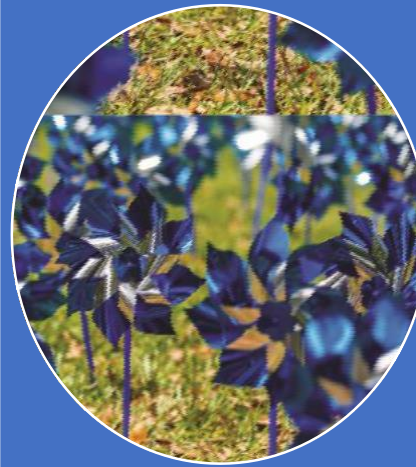
Healthy Families America

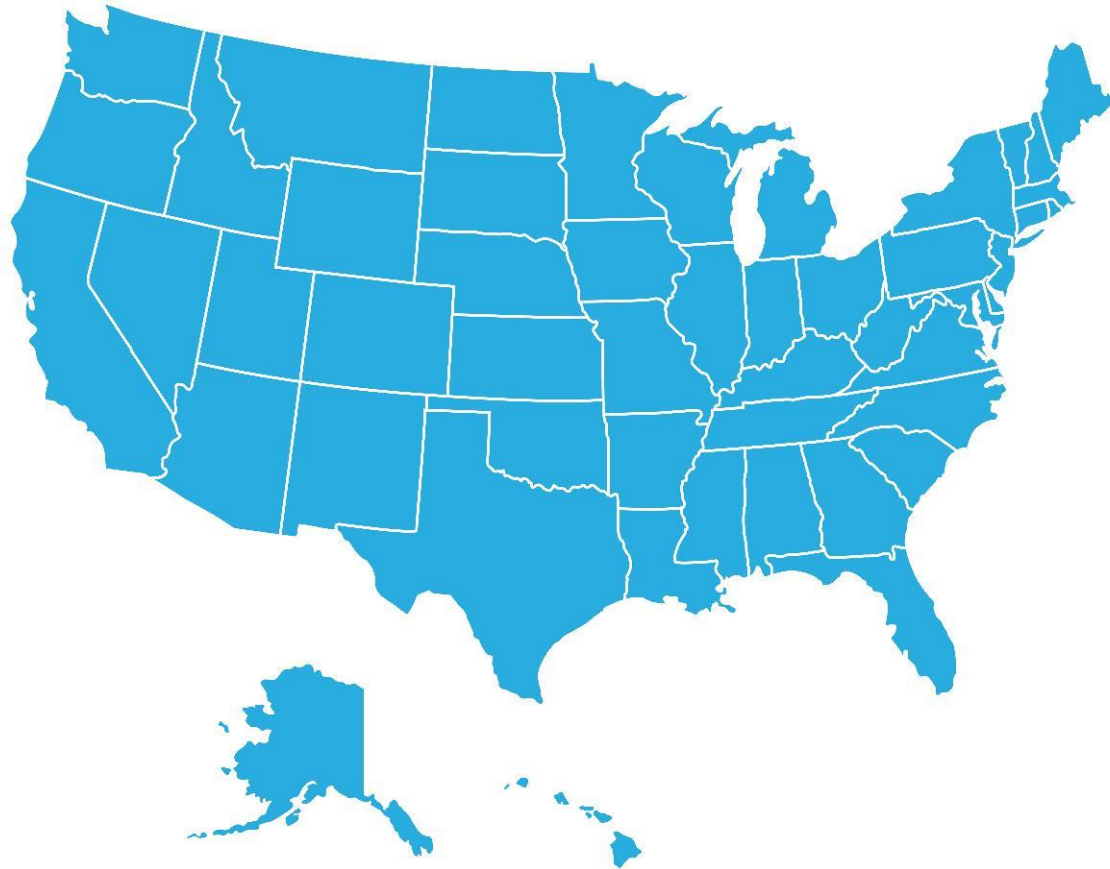

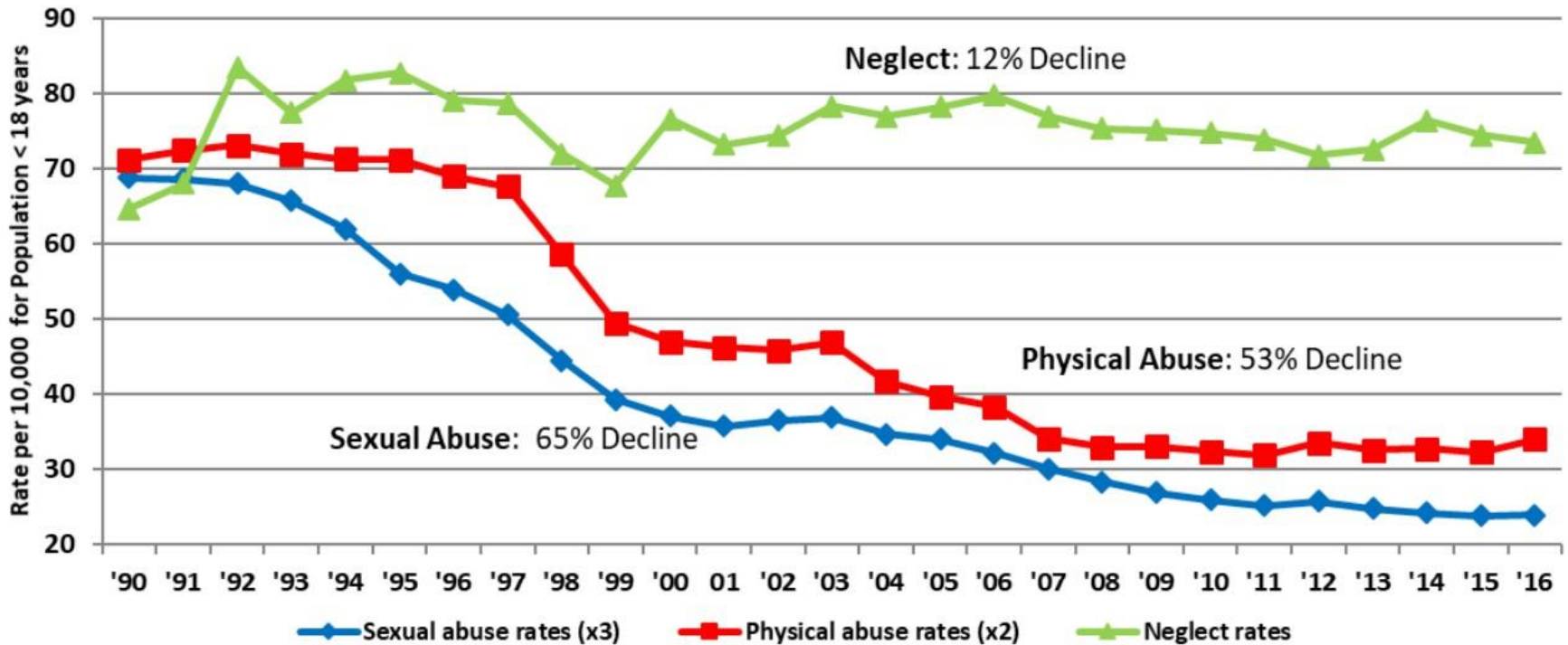
CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT IMPACTS EVERYONE



- Abuse and neglect happen **across the socioeconomic and geographic spectrum.**
- **34% of children** will experience a child protective services investigation by age 18.
- **Millions** of children are reported for allegations of abuse and neglect each year; over **600,000 reported cases** are determined to be victims of child maltreatment.

Child Maltreatment–2018

National Child Abuse & Neglect Data System (NCANDS)

- 678,000 unique victims
 - 62% neglect
 - 11% physical abuse
 - 7% sexual abuse
 - 2% psychological abuse
 - 16% multi-type abuse/neglect
- 1,770 deaths

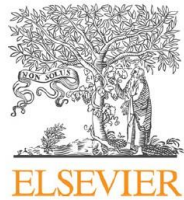
CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT IS COSTLY



- The total lifetime economic burden of child abuse and neglect in one year is **\$2 trillion**
- On an annual basis, **child maltreatment is more costly than the two leading health concerns** in the country: stroke and type 2 diabetes

Economic Burden of Known Cases of Child Maltreatment from 2018 in Each State

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Abstract

Child abuse and neglect are a major public health problem with significant effects for individual victims and for society. Previous research has estimated the economic burden of child maltreatment at a national level but has not provided social work advocates with state-level estimates or provided information regarding the correct interpretation of these estimates. Using data from the National Child Abuse and Neglect Data System (NCANDS) from 2018 and per victim estimates of the economic burden of fatal and non-fatal cases of child maltreatment, this study calculates state-level estimates of the economic burden of known cases of child maltreatment from the year 2018. Rationale for estimating the economic burden of investigated versus substantiated cases is discussed, as is interpretation of study findings. The findings of this study provide social work and other advocates with state-level estimates of the economic burden of child maltreatment and facilitate the interpretation of the findings to be used in advocacy efforts. Limitations of NCANDS data and economic burden estimation are discussed.

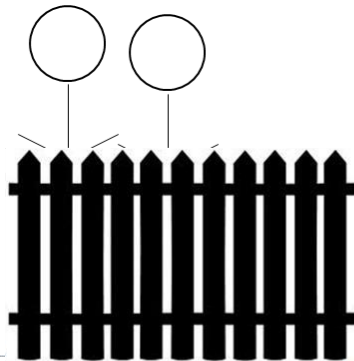

Child Maltreatment Prevention

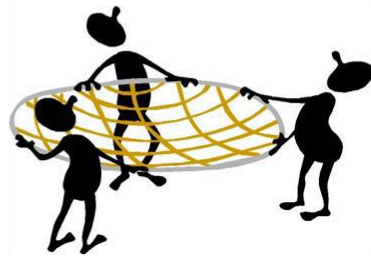


Primary Prevention

- Preventing children from being abused or neglected
- Addressing systemic factors that place children/families at-risk

Secondary Prevention

- Identifying & working with those at-risk for maltreatment



Tertiary Prevention

- Helping victims of child maltreatment
- Stop maltreatment
- Treatment & services



Prevention Strategies

- Expanding voluntary home visiting (i.e. HANDS)
- Quality funded child care and early education
- Support for parenting teens
- Promoting positive fatherhood engagement
- Parent training and education
- Family Resource Centers
- Increasing economic supports for families (e.g. Earned Income Tax Credit)
- Banning corporal punishment in public institutions
- Promoting family-friendly workplace policies (e.g. paid family leave)
- Evidence-based child sexual abuse prevention programs
