

• Designed to treat women's substance use disorder, reuniting families and promoting the delivery of healthy, drug-free babies while not limiting the number or age of children that women can bring with them.

- 301 babies born free of illicit substances



# What is Family-Focused Recovery?

Family Focused Recovery programs support mothers recovering from substance use disorder and address underlying physical, mental and behavioral health concerns. Eligibility for VOA's FFR treatment model is evidence based and designed to meet the unique needs of pregnant, postpartum, and parenting mothers.

- FRR Prevents family separation, provides prolonged care and support to mothers and infants, and reduces the risk of relapse
- FRR is one of the few U.S. programs that combines intensive addiction treatment, behavioral health treatment services, and family support to address underlying concerns that inhibit physical, mental and behavioral health.

Comprehensive and integrated maternity and behavioral health care model

#### Intervention



- Inpatient SUD treatment with housing
- Childcare Services
- Counseling and case management
- Support services and coaching
- Length of Stay: 30-90 days



# In partnership, Humana, VOA and **Qualified Ventures will:**

- Create a dedicated FFR Fund, a first-of-its-kind vehicle designed to deliver highimpact health outcomes for pregnant mothers in priority states. This fund is designed to encourage further investment to drive towards scale.
- Structure payment models between Humana and partner CBOs that enable efficient and predictable scaling of priority community-based programs, starting with FFR.
- Generate program and outcomes data to inform policies that seek to shift the balance of medical spending toward human services that address social determinants of health to improve population health and well-being.
- Deliver meaningful improvements in health and well-being to the thousands of individuals receiving services to combat substance use disorder and other health-related social needs.

# Longitudinal Study: Social Return on Investment Project STRONG

Starts October 1, 2022 – September 30, 2027 (5 year longitudinal study)

Cost: \$1.3M funded in part by Humana and an anonymous VOA donor

# Family Recovery Court Jefferson and Clay Counties

- A voluntary program for parents who are court involved and child protective service (CPS) active due to substance use issues.
- Eligibility for the program requires a Cabinet petition on the basis of substance use and said petition has been adjudicated by the courts.
- Immediate goal is sobriety and the long-term goal is family reunification.





# Jefferson County in partnership with Seven Counties Services

# Opened Clay County, 2021 with a DOJ Grant

- We have provided services to 34 adult participants, with 65 children.
- Within 6 months of entering the program 85% of participants have achieved family reunification.








### **Kentucky Judicial Commission on Mental** Health

Established on August 11, 2022 by Supreme Court Order 2022-42

### **Restorative Justice**

This unique program allows victims of crime to participate fully in the resolution of the offense – with a focus on seeking solutions and making amends.

Restorative Justice practices are centered on making things right for all parties involved while enabling creative solutions not used within the traditional justice system.

# **Benefits to our community**

- Significant cost savings for every case resolved outside the court system
- Healing and restoration for victims and community
- 50% reduction in recidivism compared to those who do not get this intervention
- Promotion and support of positive behavioral change of offenders
- Successful re-integration of the young offenders back into the community









# **Innovating Together: VOA and DCBS**

- Public / private partnership with child welfare
- Serves as a substance use disorder educational resource to the Department for Community Based Services staff
- Helps parents access treatment, navigate through the process of receiving treatment with a dedicated liaison

Current data shows that youth entering out of home placement is on the rise at over 5,000 with close to 9,000 in out of home placement by the end of FY22. Over 70% of those placements have substance use as a factor. The solution is family-focused recovery services and access to more recovery capital.

### **DCBS** Rationale

- Changing the narrative from "remove then refer" in order to prevent the additional trauma of family separation and unnecessary expense.
- Changing the culture within the system related to attitudes, biases and and narratives about parents with substance use disorder.

# **FAMILY CONNECTIONS PROGRAM**

- Multi-year pilot project
- DCBS consults with VOA clinicians in cases identified to feature parental (maternal) addiction

#### VOA clinician provides:

- Assessments and recommendations for care makes direct linkages to treatment
- Participates in prevention planning
- Attends court appearances & family team meetings
- Coordinates case management with treatment provider(s) and DCBS worker/supervisor


