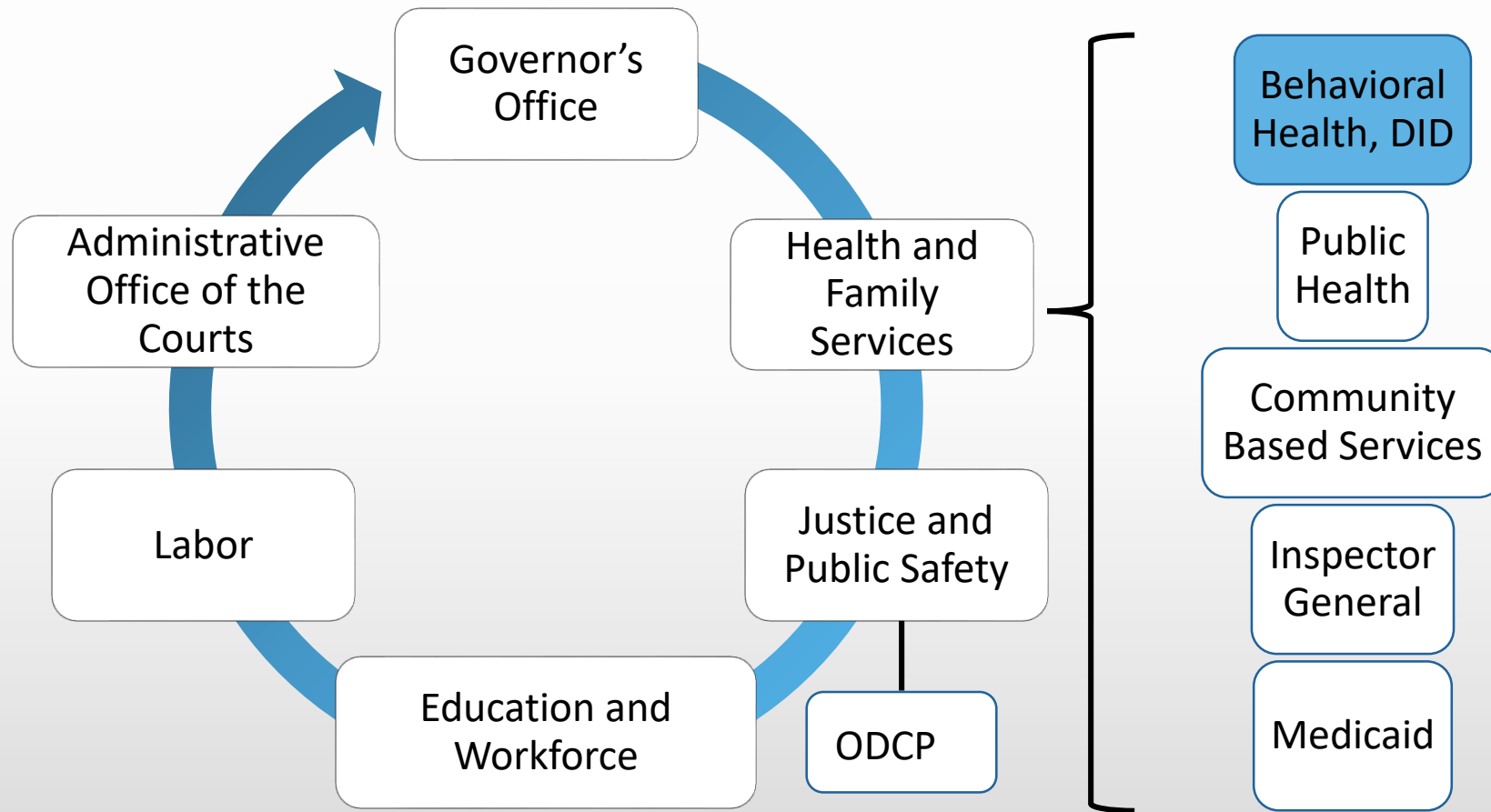

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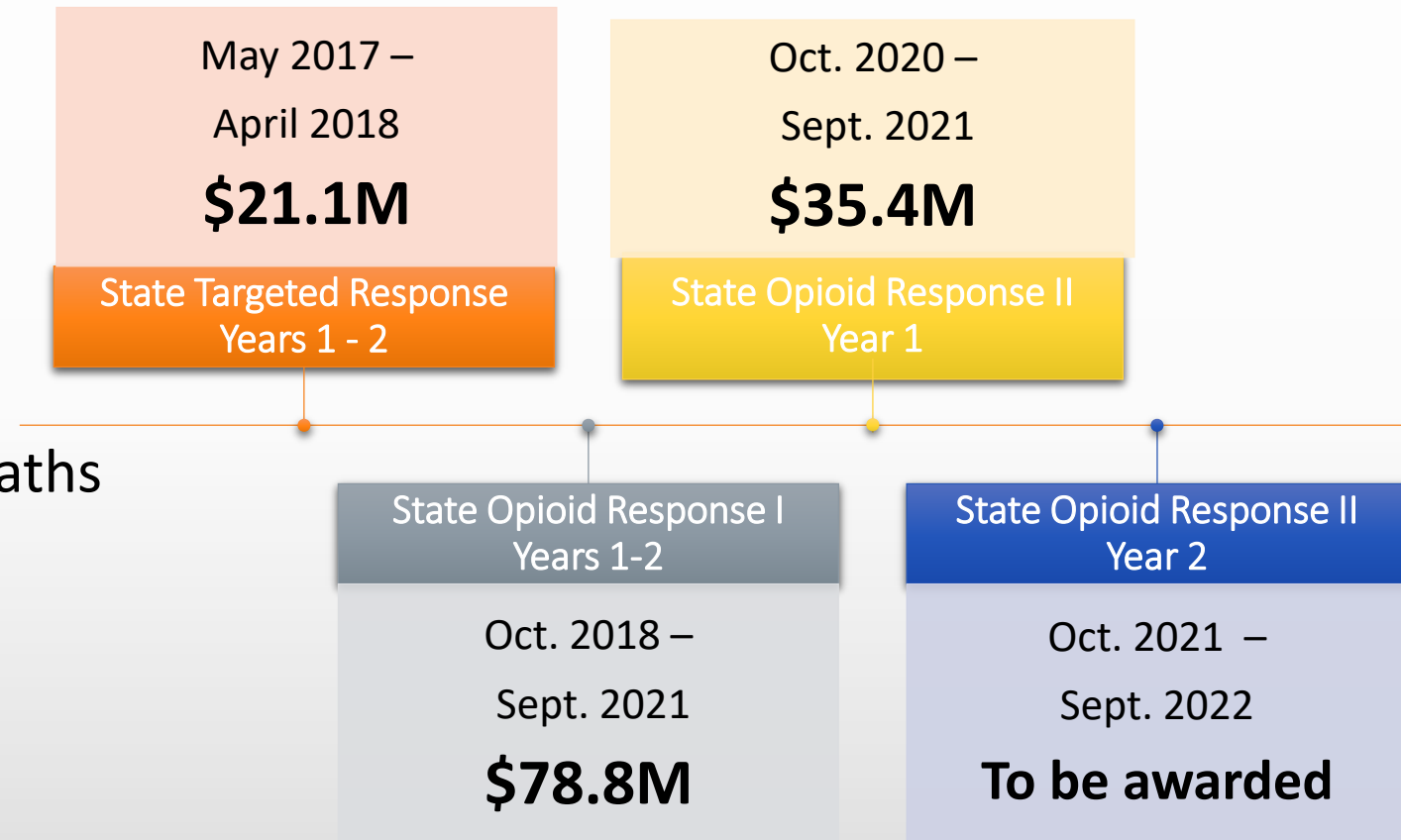

Kentucky Opioid Response Effort

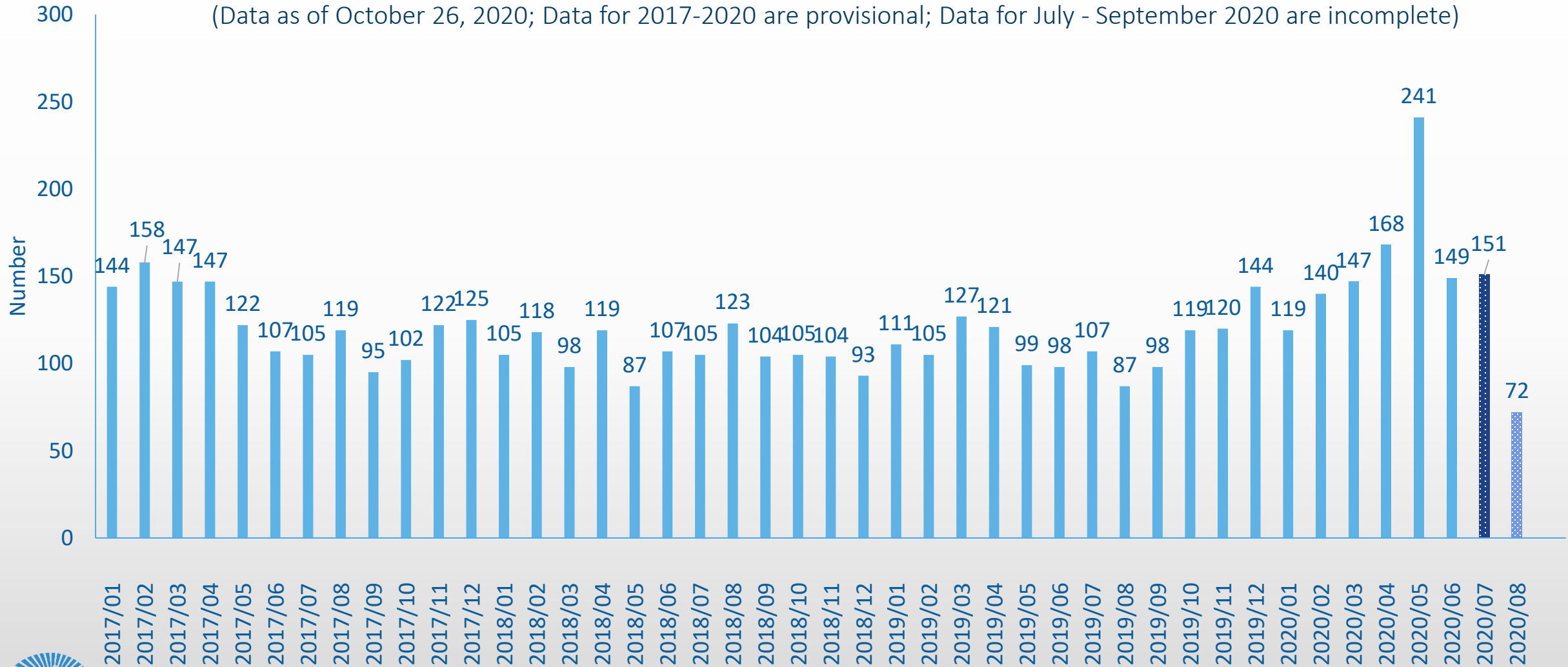
Objectives

- Increase access to medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD)
- Reduce unmet treatment need
- Reduce opioid overdose related deaths
- Expand evidence-based services to address stimulant misuse and use disorders



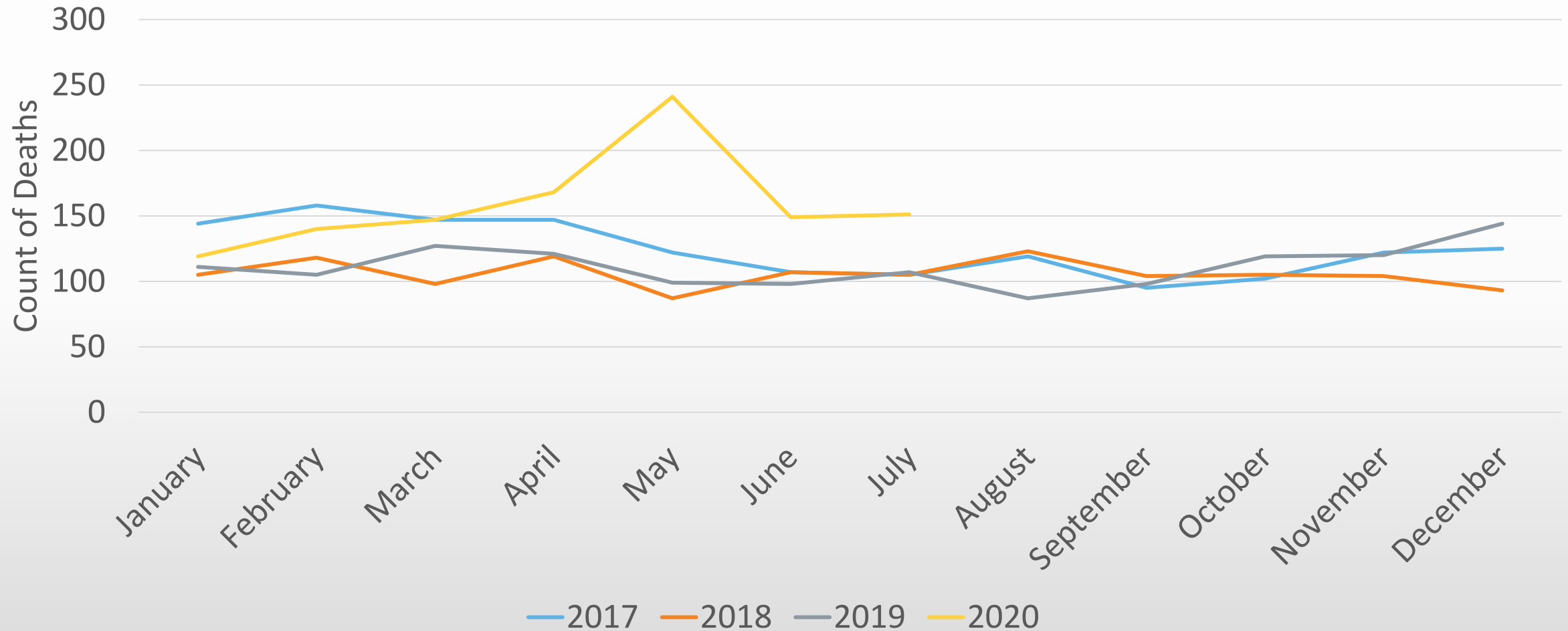
Kentucky Resident Drug Overdose Deaths, January 2017- September 2020

(Data as of October 26, 2020; Data are provisional)



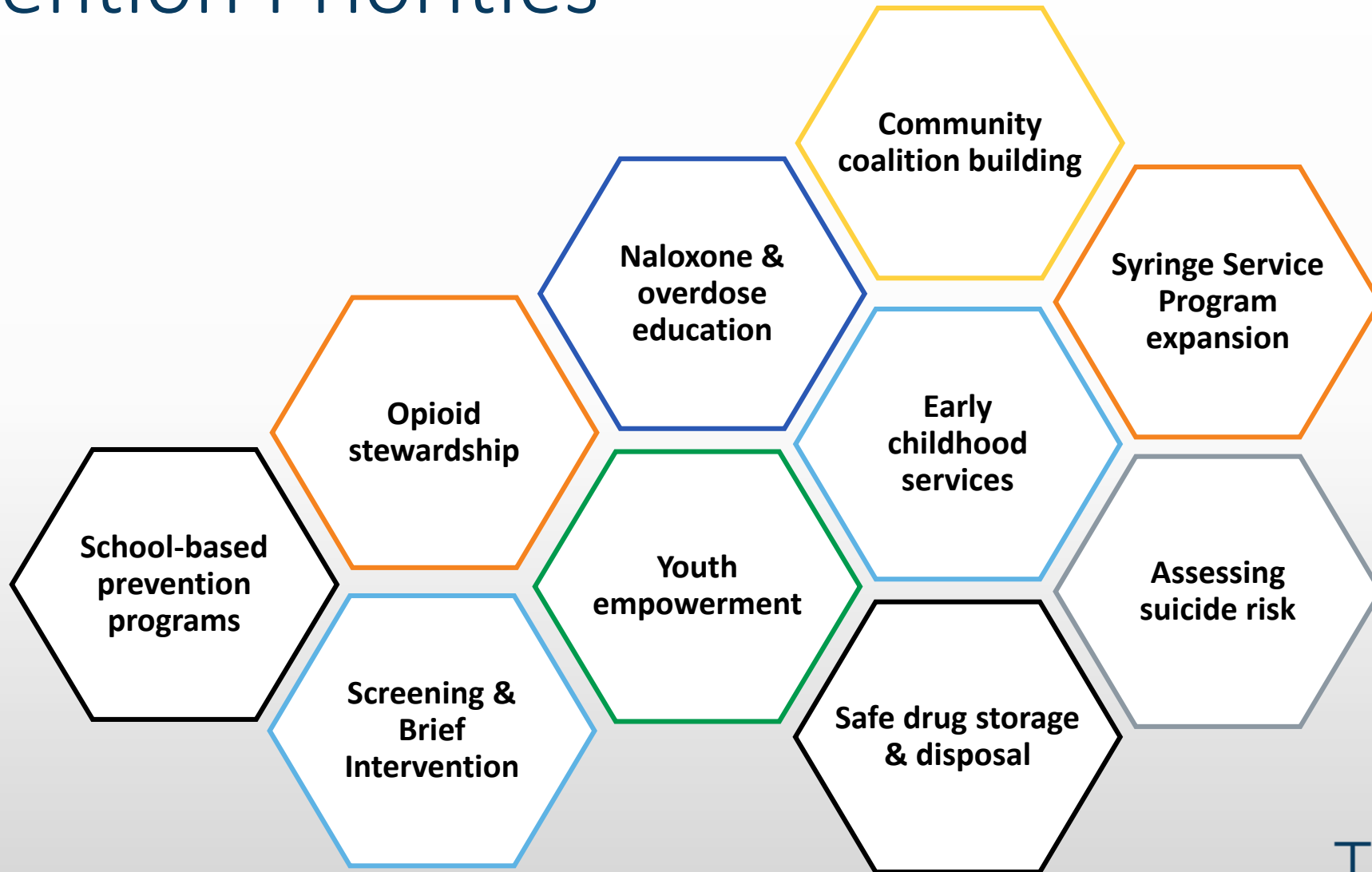
Infrastructure Priorities



Infrastructure Outcomes

- **22,338** individuals participated in **> 325 trainings**
 - **277** physicians received DATA waiver training to prescribe buprenorphine
 - Hazelden Betty Ford *Recovery Champions* curriculum delivered to:
 - **5,034** DCBS staff, partners, and parents
 - **1,576** judges and court staff
 - **187** Citizen Foster Care Review Board volunteers
 - **400** employers
 - **1,025** trained in peer support and recovery support services
- Established a National Alliance of Recovery Residence certification

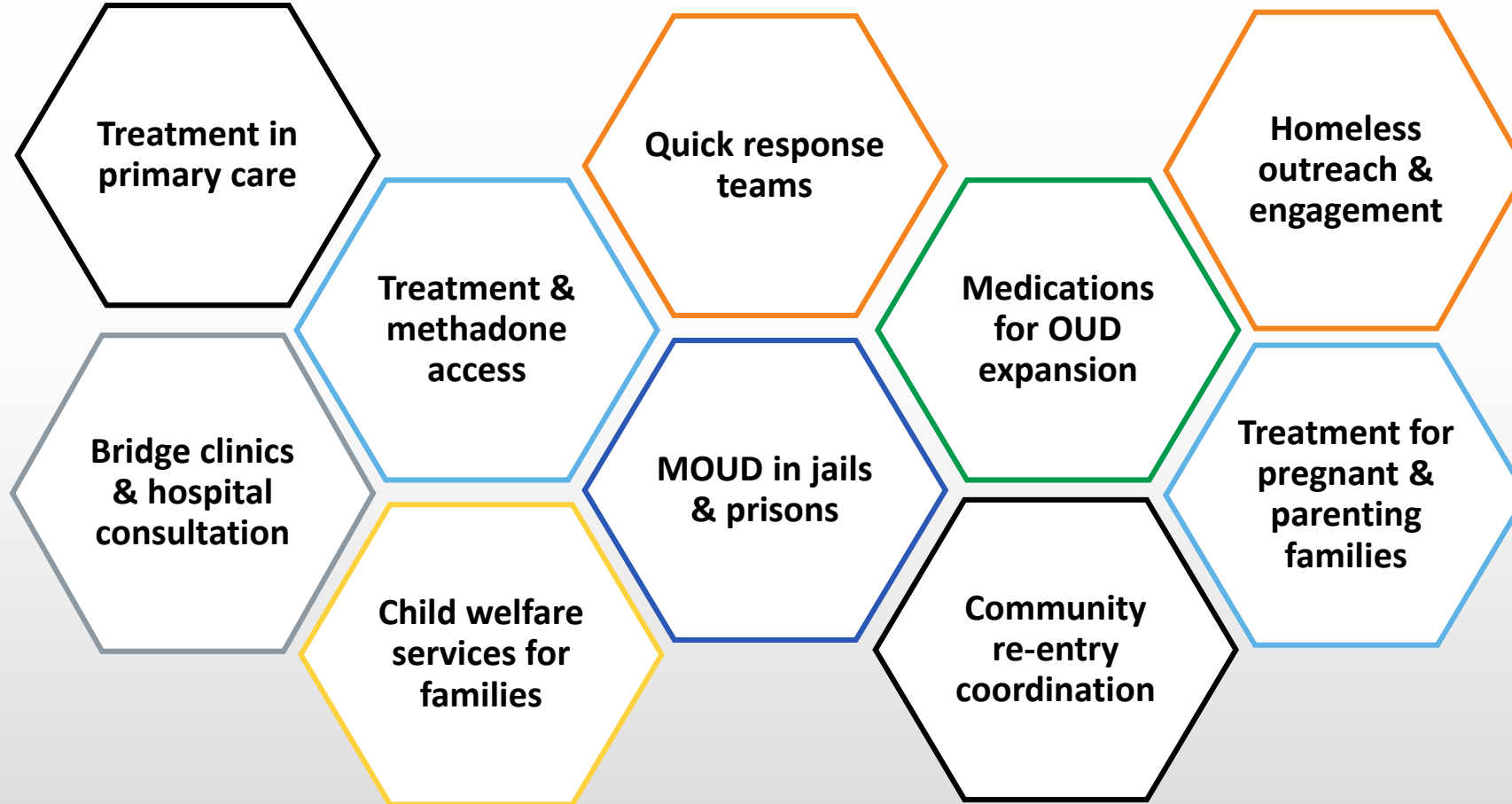
Prevention Priorities



Prevention Outcomes

- **53,509** naloxone units distributed through the statewide program
- Nearly **130,000** youth participated in universal prevention programming:
 - **298** K-12 schools implementing *Too Good for Drugs* and *Sources of Strength*
 - **87%** of schools committed to assessing their policies and procedures related to substance use and mental health
- **120** hospitals committed to *Statewide Opioid Stewardship* program
- **166** opioid overdose prevention trainings delivered to:
588 prescribers, **726** first responders, and **2,216** community members

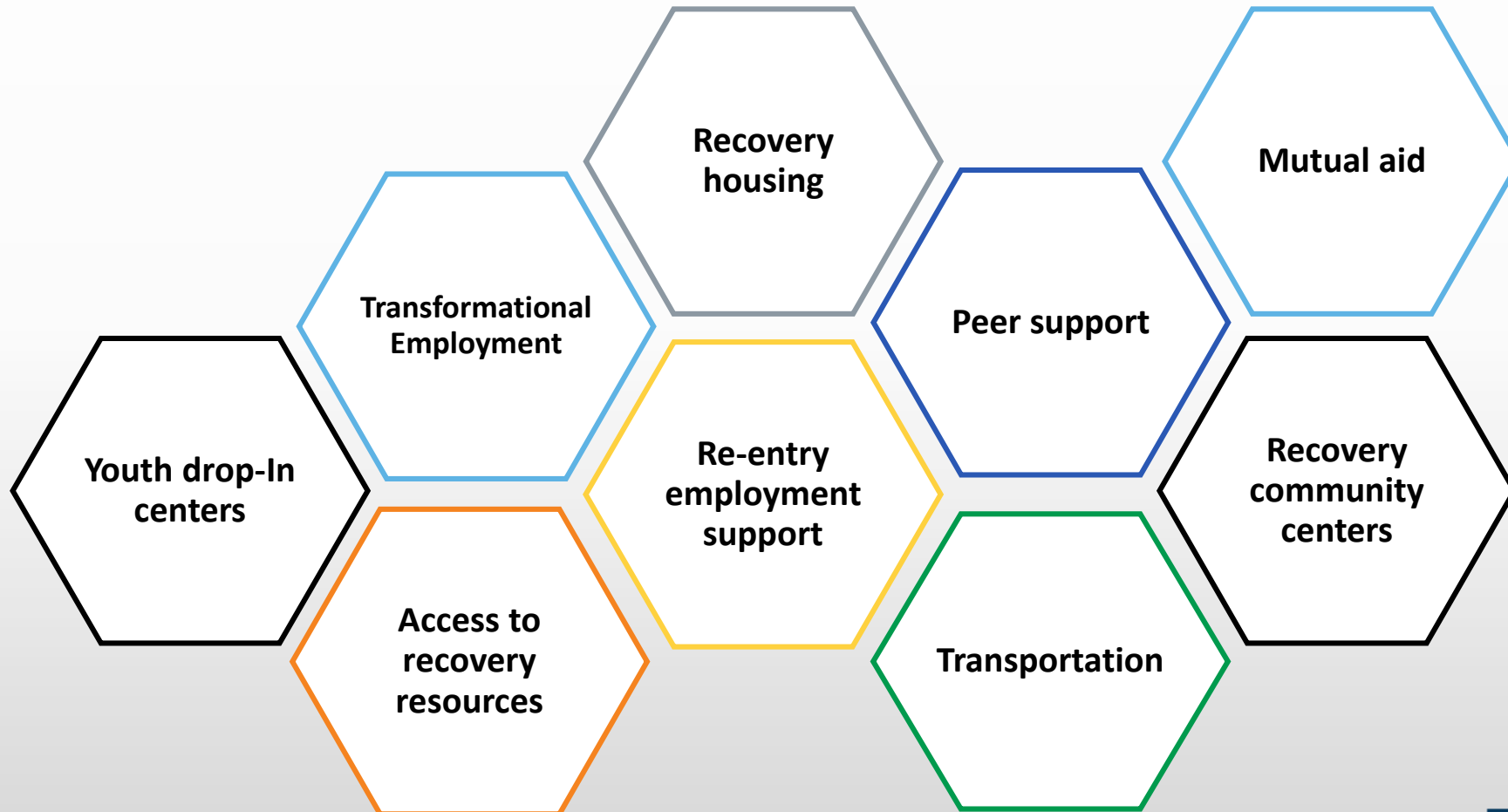
Treatment Priorities



Treatment Outcomes

- **96** treatment programs and providers funded across **170** sites
- **22,919** individuals received treatment services
 - **4,584** served by **10** bridge clinics across **6** hospital systems
 - **3,192** served by the Treatment Access Program
 - **796** served across **7** quick response teams
 - **3,765** pregnant and parenting women served

Recovery Priorities



Recovery Outcomes

- **12,550** served by KORE-funded recovery support services
 - **2,932** served across **6** recovery community centers
 - **2,241** received recovery housing
 - **2,973** received employment services (DOC Reentry Employment Specialists & Strategic Initiative for Transformational Employment)
 - **1,343** served by the Access to Recovery Program
