FACILITATING RESPECTFUL RETURN

Since 1990, Federal law has provided for the protection and return of Native American human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, and objects of cultural patrimony. By enacting NAGPRA, Congress recognized that human remains of any ancestry "must at all times be treated with dignity and respect." Congress also acknowledged that human remains and other cultural items removed from Federal or tribal lands belong, in the first instance, to lineal descendants, Indian Tribes, and Native Hawaiian organizations. With this law, Congress sought to encourage a continuing dialogue between museums and Indian Tribes and Native Hawaiian organizations and to promote a greater understanding between the groups while at the same time recognizing the important function museums serve in society by preserving the past. ARTIFACT REPATRIATION AND THE BLUE LICKS PIONEER MUSEUM: THE FACTS

- Parks has communicated with all stakeholders including the Friends Group, state legislators, federal congressional representatives, local county judges, and county attorneys regarding its repatriation efforts at Blue Licks.
- These artifacts were purchased by the Commonwealth of Kentucky from William J.
 Curtis, not donated.
- The repatriated objects will **remain in Kentucky** and are not being relocated to Oklahoma.
- The Pioneer Museum will not be closing.
- The repatriated Native American artifacts only account for 12.5% of the Pioneer Museum's total collection.
- Plans are underway to introduce new exhibits highlighting the Native American history and prehistory of the area.

43 CFR Part 10 -- NAGPRA REGULATIONS

- (a) Purpose. The Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (Act) of November 16, 1990, recognizes the rights of lineal descendants, Indian Tribes, and Native Hawaiian organizations in Native American human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, and objects of cultural patrimony.
 - (1) The Act and these regulations provide systematic processes to:
 - (i) Protect Native American human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, and objects of cultural patrimony; and
 - (ii) Restore Native American human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, and objects of cultural patrimony to lineal descendants, Indian Tribes, and Native Hawaiian organizations.
 - (2) The Act and these regulations require consultation with lineal descendants, Indian Tribes, and Native Hawaiian organizations.
 - (3) Consistent with the Act, these regulations require deference to the Native American traditional knowledge of lineal descendants, Indian Tribes, and Native Hawaiian organizations.

43 CFR Part 10 -- NAGPRA REGULATIONS

- (d) *Duty of care*. These regulations require a museum, Federal agency, or DHHL to care for, safeguard, and preserve any human remains or cultural items in its custody or in its possession or control. A museum, Federal agency, or DHHL must:
 - (1) Consult with lineal descendants, Indian Tribes, or Native Hawaiian organizations on the appropriate storage, treatment, or handling of human remains or cultural items;
 - (2) Make a reasonable and good-faith effort to incorporate and accommodate the Native American traditional knowledge of lineal descendants, Indian Tribes, or Native Hawaiian organizations in the storage, treatment, or handling of human remains or cultural items; and
 - (3) Obtain free, prior, and informed consent from lineal descendants, Indian Tribes, or Native Hawaiian organizations prior to allowing any exhibition of, access to, or research on human remains or cultural items. Research includes, but is not limited to, any study, analysis, examination, or other means of acquiring or preserving information about human remains or cultural items. Research of any kind on human remains or cultural items is not required by the Act or these regulations.

CONSEQUENCES FOR NAGPRA NON-COMPLIANCE

43 CFR 10.11 -- Failure to repatriate the ancestral remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, and cultural artifacts as required by the federal Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) could subject Parks to significant civil penalties.

- Each instance of failure to comply with the Act constitutes a separate violation subject to a civil penalty.
- The penalty for each separate violation must be calculated as follows:
 - (1) The base penalty amount is \$8,315, subject to annual adjustments based on inflation under the Federal Civil Penalties Inflation Adjustment Act Improvements Act of 2015 (Pub. L. 114-74).
- Based upon the 274 artifacts at Blue Licks, the potential base penalty could approximate \$2,278,310 (274 funerary objects x \$8,315).
- An additional penalty of up to \$1,664 per day for each continuing violation once an agency determination becomes final.

Dear Commissioner Meyer:

As Senators and Members of the U.S. Senate Committee on Indian Affairs, we write to express our grave concern over recent reports that institutions of higher learning such as yours have failed their statutory mandate to "expeditiously return" cultural items and ancestral remains of Native Americans pursuant to the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990 (NAGPRA).²

Delayed repatriation is delayed justice for Native peoples. For too long, Native ancestral remains and cultural items have been unconscionably denied their journey home by institutions, desecrated by scientific study, publicly displayed as specimens, left to collect dust on a shelf, or simply thrown in a box and forgotten in a museum storeroom.

At the time of passage, Congress envisioned that NAGPRA repatriation activity would be complete, or nearly complete, within five years.³ But three decades years later, "a daunting amount of work remains," and experts reportedly estimate that it could take as many as 70 more

years before NAGPRA's directive of expeditious repatriation is fulfilled.⁵ This is simply unacceptable.

Congress passed NAGPRA to address long-standing concerns over the mistreatment and disposition of American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian cultural items and ancestral remains possessed by federally-funded institutions and federal agencies. While NAGPRA has had positive and far-reaching impacts, such as improved relationships between museums, institutions, federal agencies, and Native peoples, and significant, successful repatriation of many cultural items and ancestral remains, Congress continues to receive troubling testimony detailing ongoing issues related to the timely completion of NAGPRA repatriations. These issues include insufficient consultation with Tribes, poor curation practices, misidentification of items, disrespect for traditional knowledge, and allegations of malfeasance to avoid or slow repatriation efforts.

Accordingly, we request an update on your institution's current process and pace of repatriation, as well as information on its repatriation policies and practices pursuant to NAGPRA. We also specifically request responses to the following questions within 60 days:

- 1) Please describe in detail how your institution determines if there is "a relationship of shared group identity that may be reasonably traced" when your institution is determining the cultural affiliation of NAGPRA-eligible items or ancestral remains, and explain how your institution interprets and applies the terms "totality of the circumstances" and "preponderance of the evidence" when making such determinations.

- 2) Please describe the process your institution undertakes to determine
 - a. When there is sufficient evidence to proceed with repatriation; and
 - b. When a cultural item or ancestral remain is culturally unidentifiable.
- Please describe the processes and methods your institution uses to gather and utilize Native traditional knowledge when determining the cultural affiliation of NAGPRA-eligible items or ancestral remains.
- Please provide examples of when your institution has used only Native traditional knowledge to culturally affiliate NAGPRA-eligible items or ancestral remains.
- 5) Please describe each allegation filed with the National NAGPRA Program regarding your institution's failure to comply with NAGPRA, including a summary of the circumstances and outcomes of the allegation(s).
 - a. If your institution requested an informal discussion with the Secretary pursuant to 43 C.F.R. § 10.12(f)(1) in response to an allegation, please provide copies of all documents provided to, or received from, the Secretary in connection with the request.

Description

The 274 cultural items were removed from Mason County, KY. These cultural items were collected in the 1920s thru the 1940s. The Pioneer Museum's founder, William Curtis, was a collector of these objects and took part in excavations at Fox Field (Fox Farm Fort Ancient culture archeological site), Mason County, Kentucky, and possibly at other sites in Kentucky. Curtis worked with other collectors in the field to acquire objects for the museum from surrounding counties in the state, but most items with a known provenience trace back to Fox Field. Most of these items are displayed and stored in the museum.

The 274 unassociated funerary objects are two adzes, six awls, eight game balls, five deer knuckle beads, two copper bracelets, two celts, one chisel, 12 discoidals, four drills, eight effigies, one effigy bead, five pottery figurines, one fishhook, 11 shell gorgets, one limestone gorget, one slate gorget, one grooved bone hairpin, one knapping hammer, three hoes, one grooved bone body ornament, nine flint knives, three necklaces of shell and bone beads, one necklace of animal bones, two bone sewing needles, 15 stone pendants, two shell pendants, four conch shell wheel pendants, four cannel coal pendants, three bear tooth pendants, two animal bone pendants, two ceramic disk pendants, two stone pestles, 10 pipes, 27 projectile points, one hide scraper, 61 pottery sherds, two bone whistles, one whetstone, one atlatl weight, 19 pottery vessels, four uniface knives, two mussel shell spoons, one strand of nine bone, clay, and shell beads, one strand of bear and canine teeth and a hawks claw, seven bear teeth fragments, one strand of 10 canine teeth, one strand of 13 marine shells, one strand of 12 beads. one string of seven beads, one string of 12 shell beads, one string of 18 shell beads, one strand of nine shell beads. one strand of seven conical shaped shell beads, one strand of 12 animal teeth, one strand of small shell beads, one strand of nine stone beads, and one animal tooth bead.

Determinations

Pursuant to NAGPRA and its implementing regulations, and after consultation with the appropriate Indian Tribes and Native Hawaiian organizations, the Kentucky Department of Parks has determined that:

- The 274 cultural items described above are reasonably believed to have been placed with or near individual human remains at the time of death or later as part of the death rite or ceremony and are believed, by a preponderance of the evidence, to have been removed from a specific burial site of a Native American individual.
- There is a relationship of shared group identity that can be reasonably traced between the cultural items and the Absentee-Shawnee Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma; Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma; and the Shawnee Tribe.






FIG. 40. A BURIAL MOUND.
