2022 Legislation

• **HB 9**- establish a funding mechanism for public charter schools; establish a category of public charter schools called "urban academies" that must have an enrollment preference for students who live in close proximity to the school; require public charter schools to establish food programs that provide free and reduced-price meals to students. **Governor's veto overridden**,

Sent to Sec. of State

- HB 31, SB 363- Crown Act, prevent hair-related discrimination at workplaces and schools. SB 363- sent to Education, HB 31- reported favorably out of House Judiciary
- **HB 37** Maternal Care Act for Implicit Bias- require licensed health facilities to provide each patient with written information regarding the patient's rights and implement an evidence-based implicit bias program for all health providers involved in the perinatal care of patients within those facilities; require the Department for Public Health to track data on maternal death and severe morbidity. **Sent to Committee on Committees**
- HB 120- expand eligibility for preschool education programs to children who reside in households with an income at or below 200% of the federal poverty level. Sent to Committee on Committees
- HB 126- FAFSA requirement for HS completion. Reported favorably out of House Education, posted for passage on 1-13-22, returned to rules on 3/10/22
- **HB 131** allowing governing body of a consolidated local govt. to implement rent control ordinances in a developing area. **Sent to Committee on Committees**
- **HB 250**-Appropriate \$23 million as a bail out loan to Kentucky State University to address their budget shortfall; require Council on Postsecondary Education to create and oversee a management improvement plan for KSU; require CPE to make recommendations for repayment and to provide annual reports on the status of the KSU loan. **Signed by Governor**

- **HB 737**-establish the Kentucky Urban Farming Youth Initiative to promote farming to youth in urban counties in at least one urban University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service office. **Sent to Committee on Committees**
- SB 10-establish a temporary work permit requirements for a registered nurse who is a graduate of a foreign nursing school. Signed by Governor
- SB 103- require racial and ethnic community criminal justice and public safety impact statements for certain legislation and administrative regulations. Sent to L&O
- SB 163- delete the requirement that an eligible high school student and eligible postsecondary student not be a convicted felon for KEES eligibility purposes. Final version passed flipped the original intent and reduced educational opportunities available for current and former incarcerated individuals. Vetoed by Gov. in its entirety.
- SB 173- require translation of the MOST (Medical Orders for Scope of Treatment) form into Spanish and any other languages as needed. Signed by Governor
- SB 238- cosmetology exams available in multiple languages. Sent to L&O
- SB 265-direct the Governor to replace the Kentucky State University board of regents. Signed
 by Governor
- SB 275- hate crimes bill, enhanced term of imprisonment. Sent to Judiciary
- SB 276- Emily's Law, Medicaid coverage for sickle cell disease. Signed by Governor
- SB 319- create and appropriate to, Black and minority contractor assistance fund. Sent to A&R
- SB 331- eligible defendants shall not be detained on money bail. Sent to Judiciary
- SJR 158- direct the Department of Education to create a task force to examine the equity and inclusivity of racial and demographic representation in education curricula. Sent to Education
