## The WHY of Carter G. Woodson Academy



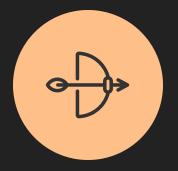
#### Founding Context

Carter G. Woodson Academy (CGWA) was founded to close opportunity gaps and redefine what excellence looks like for young Black males in Fayette County.



#### Namesake Legacy

Named after Dr. Carter G. Woodson, "The Father of Black History," symbolizing the power of education as liberation.



#### Core Purpose

To educate, empower, and equip young men academically, socially, and morally to become leaders of character and consequence.



#### **Cultural Foundation**

The "WELL" Principles—Well Behaved, Well Mannered, Well Spoken, Well Read, Well Traveled, and Well Prepared—anchor the culture and serve as daily expectations of excellence.

By rooting the story of Carter G. Woodson Academy in its mission, history, and cultural intent, we establish the foundation for understanding how this school embodies the district's commitment to unity, belonging, and student efficacy.

#### Restorative and Reflective Culture

The RESET model and restorative circles replace punishment with growth, empathy, and recommitment.

The cultural identity and climate at Carter G. Woodson Academy create a transformative environment where scholars feel seen, valued, and empowered to achieve.

### Signature & Replicable Practices

#### Culturally Rooted Curriculum

Integrates African and African American history across disciplines to connect learning with identity and purpose. Promotes critical consciousness alongside academic mastery—helping students think deeply and act responsibly.

#### Mentorship & Male Leadership Pipeline

Sustained partnerships with male educators, fraternities, and community leaders. Cross-age mentoring among scholars builds intergenerational accountability and leadership capacity.

#### Dual Enrollment with Kentucky State University (KSU)

Scholars earn college credit through CGWA's partnership with Kentucky State University—the Commonwealth's only public HBCU. Strengthens academic rigor and college readiness while providing culturally affirming exposure to higher education. Serves as a replicable model for school-to-HBCU pipelines across Kentucky.

#### Family Engagement Model

Parents are "village partners" in scholar success. Family nights integrate literacy, wellness, and celebration, aligning with the FCPS Comprehensive District Improvement Plan (CDIP) goal of deepening family engagement.

#### Discipline through Culture, Not Compliance

The RESET model and restorative circles emphasize reflection, empathy, and personal accountability. Builds self-awareness and replaces punitive discipline with growth-oriented development.

#### Global & Local Exposure

Cultural travel, HBCU tours, and community internships extend learning beyond the classroom. The "Well-Traveled" principle fosters global citizenship and college readiness.

#### Visual Culture of Excellence

Aesthetic design communicates value and belonging—murals, portraits, and affirmations of Black excellence. Reinforces identity, aspiration, and pride daily.

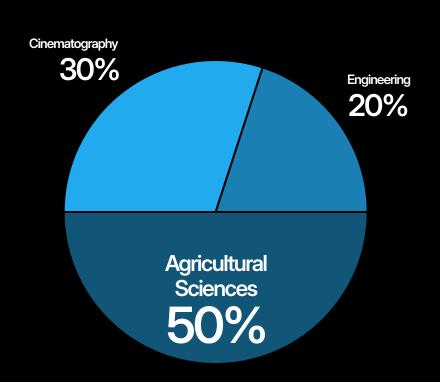

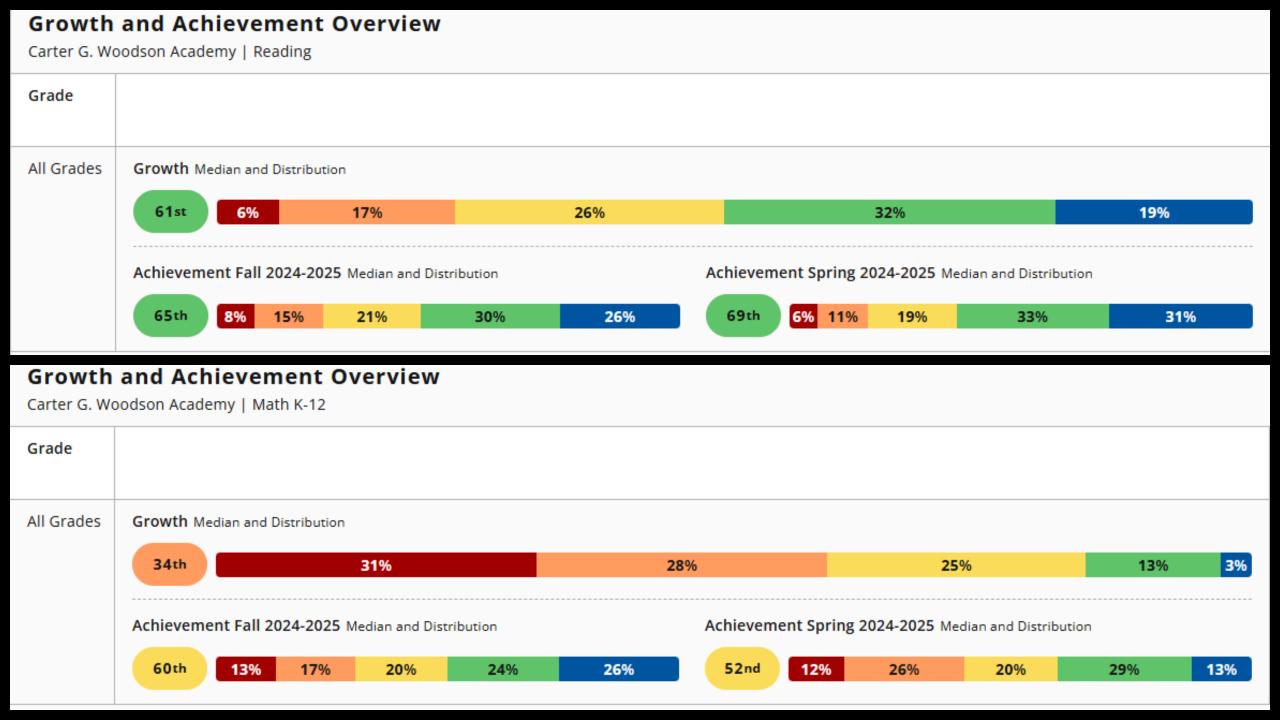

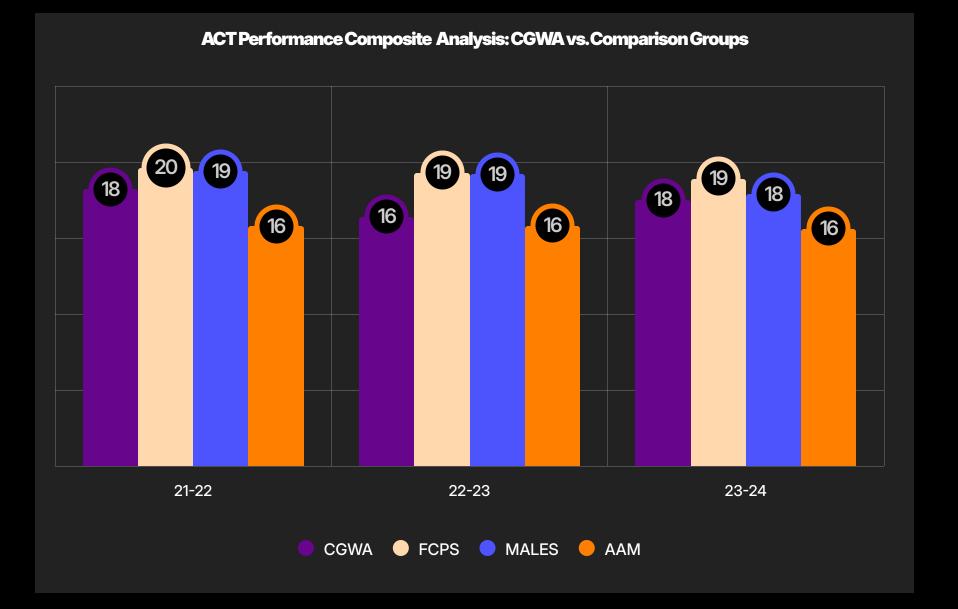
