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# Statement of Purpose


Guided by the Recovery-Oriented System of Care Framework, the purpose of the Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) is to implement a targeted response to Kentucky's opioid crisis by expanding equitable access to a full continuum of high quality, evidence-based overdose prevention, harm reduction treatment, and recovery supports.





- Community Advisory Board







# Overdose Education + Naloxone Distribution reduces the risk of fatal overdose



Health departments; community-based service providers; jails, prisons, probation and parole; naloxone kiosks; schools

Treatment providers; KORE grantees

Co-prescribing; pharmacist-initiated



# Syringe Service Program (SSP) Expansion

saves lives, reduces disease transmission, and facilitates service access

- 8,743 individuals accepted referral to treatment
- 453 educational events
- 98,496 brochures and educational materials were distributed

# Research Supports Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD)

### MOUD reduces

- Opioid use, craving, and return to use
- Risk of overdose and mortality
- Recidivism
- Infectious disease transmission

### MOUD improves

- Treatment retention
- Opportunity for choice and collaboration


- Jail re-entry care coordination
- Re-entry employment support

**RESTORE** initiative



### **Treatment Outcomes**

- 42% reduction in OUD diagnosis at six-months
- **4,193** received <u>MOUD</u>
- 2,479 received <u>re-entry</u> service supports
- 2,215 received quick response team services
- 1,220 served through 14 primary care centers
- 1,155 pregnant and parenting women





Recovery Capital supports remission and

sustains long-term recovery





## **Recovery Outcomes**

- 1,583 received recovery housing through Oxford House
- 4,919 received employment support
  - Increase in employment from intake (18.4%) to 6-month follow-up (55.1%)
- 4,051 individuals on probation/parole linked to employment/job training
  - 55% retained employment
- 9,619 served through a mobile recovery center across 167 locations
  - 1,545 SMART recovery meetings held
