

Did You Know?

The Office of the Inspector General is the single referral source for the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit in the Office of the Attorney General.

This includes cases referred by the Managed Care Organizations. From July 1, 2020-June 30, 2021, the Medicaid Preliminary Investigations Branch identified overpayment amounts of \$1,439,268.82 in the Medicaid program and either referred them for prosecution through the fraud unit or for administrative recovery.


Cost-Avoidance Savings Through the Determining Eligibility Through Extensive Review (DETER) Program

\$5,323,263.75 Overpayments Identified by the Compliance Branch, Which in Addition to DETER Investigations Conducts Recipient Claim Investigations








