CHNK Behavioral Health

Teams and Coverage Area

- One MST Team
- Serving twelve county Northern Bluegrass Region
 - Primarily Boone, Campbell, Grant and Kenton Counties

Referral Sources/Youth Served

- DCBS per contract with CHNK
- Average caseload per therapist is 5 (full capacity)





CHNK Behavioral Health (continued)

Program Strengths

- Program has been maintained for two years under DCBS contract and CHNK has helped families achieve positive outcomes
- From 11/21 to 10/23 (last Program Implementation Review)
 - 58 cases closed with 46 having opportunity for full course of treatment.
 - 89% of youth living at home.
 - 91% of youth in school/working.
 - 96% of youth with no new arrests.

Program Needs

- More staff to meet community demand (team at capacity)
- Support in finding new staff given challenges/requirements of MST.
 - In-home work/24-7 team coverage (on call services are rotated among team members).
 - Educational and qualifications requirements (Masters-level clinicians)



Home of the Innocents

Teams and Coverage Area

- Two MST Teams
- Serving Jefferson County-Salt River Trail and the surrounding counties within 90 minutes from downtown Louisville office.

Referral Sources/Youth Served

- Various Community Partners including but not limited to:
 - DCBS, DJJ, Family & Criminal Court, Mental Health agencies, schools, parents/caregivers, insurance companies, residential facilities, police (LMPD).
- Projected to serve 66 youth/families annually.





Home of the Innocents (continued)

Program Strengths

- Stable leadership and staff with consistency in MST program.
- Programmatic support for MST from agency.
- Strong stakeholder relationships and financial stability through existing contracts.
- History of consistent positive outcomes and strong referral pipeline.
 - Effectively manages referral process.
- Strong relationship with other MST teams in Kentucky (to promote MST).

Program Needs

- Streamlining referral process to reduce wait times and keep team at capacity.
- Challenge to attract qualified MST clinicians for expansion.
- Better coordination/input from MST team with other systems on youth placement process. Some youth being referred to HOTI MST team "too late" in behavioral cycle.





KVC Kentucky

Teams and Coverage Area

- One MST Team
- Serving Southern Bluegrass area (ten counties)-Boyle, Clark, Estill, Fayette, Garrard, Jessamine, Lincoln, Madison, Mercer, Powell).

Referral Sources/Youth Served

- All MST referrals are received through DCBS TWIST system.
- Capable of serving 60 families per year with full team and adequate referrals.





KVC Kentucky (continued)

Program Strengths

- Collaborative relationships with key stakeholders (Program Specialist, MST Consultant, DCBS Regional Leadership, Myers-Stauffer).
- Positive outcomes from MSTI Program Implementation Data Report (8/1/22 to 10/26/23) include:
 - 40 cases discharged with 30 having opportunity for full course treatment.
 - Average cases per therapist has been 5.23 (full capacity).
 - Therapist adherence scores of fidelity to MST model is 0.774 vs target of 0.61.
 - 93.33% of youth served have had no new arrests and 86.67% are working or in school.
 - Only 5% of youth discharged due to lack of engagement.
 - 75% of youth with substance use as a treatment target show reduced substance use (based on any measurement) and 62.5% show reduced substance use based on an objective measure (such as a drug screen).

Program Needs

- Staffing. KVC meets weekly to implement a focused marketing strategy to recruit and retain qualified MST therapists and works with MST consultant to support clinician training and development.
- Appropriate Referrals (36% of referrals have not met referral criteria or have been unable to be accepted/initiated).
