

KY Students Depend on Continued AHEC Funding

4,300

high school students would lose access to extended health career exploration programs if funding is cut.

6,500


high school students would lose access to day-long health career fairs if funding is cut.

plus post-secondary students would lose access to health care prep programs through the AHECs (i.e. nurse aide trainings, shadowing, MCAT prep, etc.)
