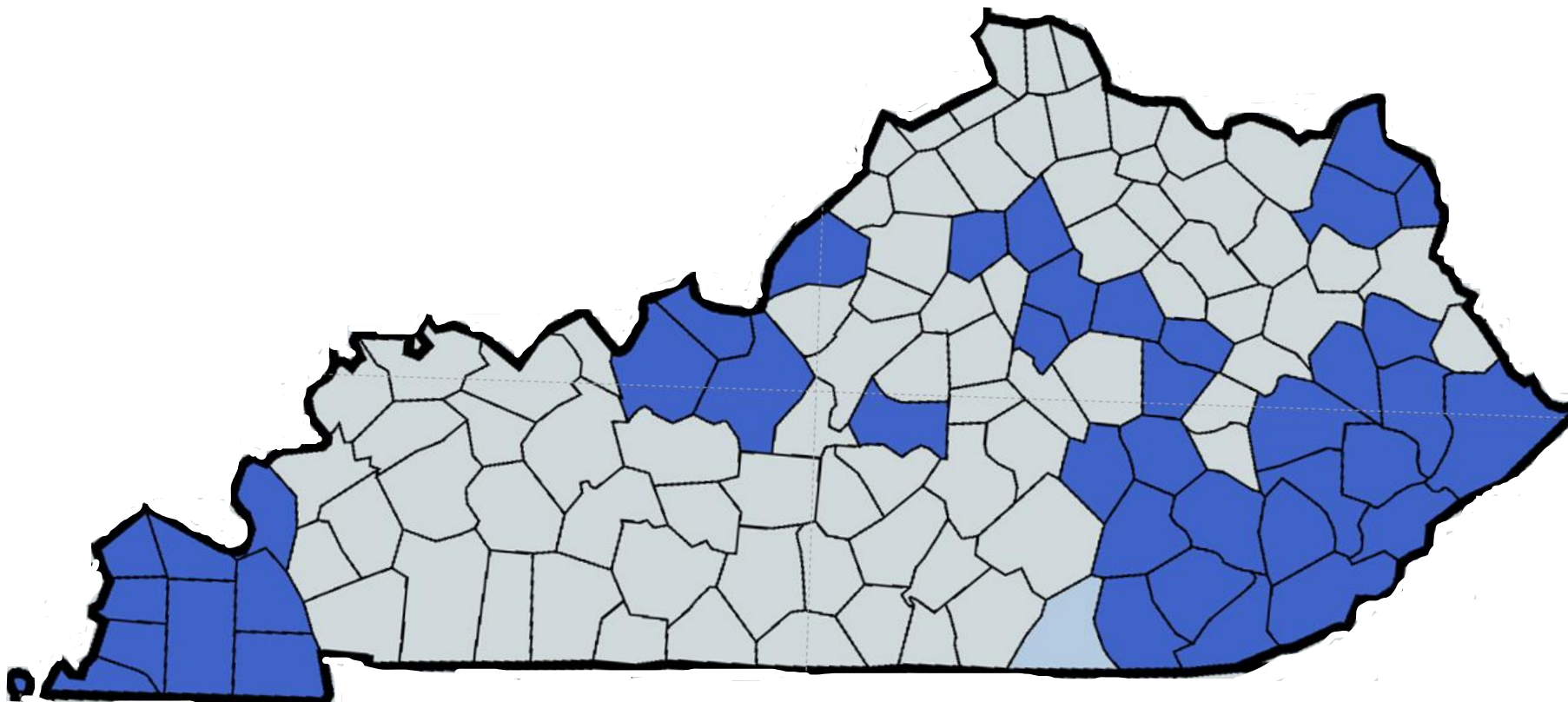

What is a QRT?

QRTs are innovative, mobile outreach services designed to reach Kentuckians within 24-72 hours of experiencing an overdose or substance-related crisis. The teams are made up of local partners – law enforcement, fire, EMS, behavioral health providers, hospitals, public health, etc. The multi-disciplinary programs streamline services so communities can efficiently respond to addiction and mental health needs. Kentucky's QRTs have been operational since 2019.

ROI of Deflection and Diversion

Deflection and diversion improve quality of life and reduce costs by:

- Reducing the risk of overdose deaths.
- Reducing arrests for non-drug related, quality of life crimes.
- Reducing new charges for violent crime.
- Reducing Emergency Department visits for all diagnoses.
- Reducing behavioral health hospital encounters.
- Reducing hospital Medicaid billing by an average of \$31,000 per person/per year
