Children in State Custody: Challenges and Opportunities

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Current State at UL Health-Peace Hospital

- Peace Hospital assesses adolescents currently detained at a youth detention center or on diversion, often admitting those refused in other facilities.
- Peace Hospital has been a partner in solution finding discussions with KHA, Aetna Better Health, etc.
- Approximately 50% of our child and adolescent inpatients are in state custody.
- Today,
 - We have 57 children/adolescents in DCBS custody
 - On average the past couple months, we have ~53 inpatients/day
 - 30% of our children in DCBS custody require a 1:1 and/or single "blocked" rooms
 - 12 children/adolescents whose length of stay has been >90 days (up to 399 days)
 - Difficulty placing these children exacerbates "institutionalized" behaviors



Current Challenges

Safety

Environmental:

Ability/funding to build safe physical infrastructure on/within existing property.

Staff:

- Reduction of worker injury and high rates of light duty employees
- > 30 staff injuries/month, > 75% due to physical management/aggression

Patient:

- Compromising current population's safety by cohorting children and adolescents with specific behavioral and safety needs.
- Multiple daily risk meetings to review events of sexual acting out, physical aggression, selfinjurious behavior

Staffing

Ratios:

Requires 2-3 staff/ patient

Turnover/Retention:

- 46 full time mental health tech positions vacant
- 35 full time RN positions vacant
- Viewed as undesirable positions due to the nature of the roles; KHA workforce group

Competency

- Skill set needed to effectively manage behavior this population is an ongoing investment of time and resources
- Training and staffing in a manner that reduces risk of injury to workers involved in the physical management of aggressive children/adolescent

Future Challenges and Solutions

- UL Health-Peace Hospital <a>IS part of the solution
- The children of our Commonwealth <u>ARE</u> our priority
- KHA partnership with legislature
- Assessment of physical location and infrastructure appropriate to reduce risk and facilitate safety.
- Partnerships with detention facilities to leverage strengths of each agency
