GROWTH AND CHANGE

HAVE BEEN SIGNIFICANT:

434% increase in total annual impacts since 2014.

Average of 30,000 treatment services per year.

Impacting more than 3,000 children, adults, and family members annually.

Significant, but only meeting a fraction of the need.



EVIDENCE OF THE MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS BEFORE US IS WELL RESEARCHED AND DOCUMENTED

You are likely already aware that:

Kentucky ranks 48th in state prevalence of untreated youth with depression.

An estimated 70 percent of our state's population live in a community that lacks enough mental health professionals.

7 in 10 Kentucky youth in the juvenile justice system have a mental health condition.

Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death among persons under age 45 nationally.

How can we create an easier path to mental health?



BEGINS WITH ACCESS.

NEED OUTPACING AVAILABILITY.

According to Mental Health America, Youth Data 2023 Report, Kentucky ranks 31/51 for prevalence of mental illness among youth in relation to access to care.

To add context, the same report notes 15% (51,000) of KY youth ages 12-17 experienced at least 1 major depressive episode this past year.

Only 59% (30,090) of these youth received needed care.





AN EASIER PATH TO MENTAL

HEALTH:

BEGINS WITH ACCESS

PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE AREAS EXACERBATING BARRIERS TO ACCESS:

Per County Health Rankings & Roadmaps, Kentucky's ratio of population to mental health professionals' averages 390:1 versus the national average of 350:1.

Some Kentucky counties have more than 4,000 residents for every 1 mental health professional.

All 12 counties of the Northern Bluegrass Region (NBR) have ratios greater than that of the state average, up to 6 times greater.

AVERAGE RATIO OF RESIDENTS TO MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONALS

KENTUCKY AVERAGE 390:1

NATIONAL AVERAGE 350:1

NBR AVERAGE 1,226:1



EXPANDING ACCESS.

CHNK HAS DEVELOPED A 5-YEAR PLAN TO EXPAND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ACROSS THE NORTHERN BLUEGRASS REGION.

With a primary focus on youth ages 12-17 and goal of expanding access by 40%.

Including outreach to rural and other professional shortage areas.

Resulting in a 200% increase in the number of clients served annually.







EXPANDING ACCESS.

ACHIEVEMENT WILL REQUIRE:

Workforce attraction and retention.

Expansion of telehealth and other critical programs.

Expansion of needed facilities in multiple locations.

Significant financial investment.

THE CAMPAIGN

OUR COMPREHENSIVE \$38 MILLION CAMPAIGN WILL SUPPORT:

- Growth of clinical capacity.
- Increased partnerships and collaborations across systems.
- Alignment of strategies across local, state, and federal initiatives.
- *Investments* in facilities, human capital, and evidence-based programming.





THE CAMPAIGN

- Funding from public and private sources, including \$19 million request to the state for capital funding priorities.
- Request for one-time funding; an investment in growth and expanded infrastructure.
