


Kentucky Youth Advocates has provided **county- and school-district level data** on children and families for Kentucky's state and local decisionmakers for **35 years**.


Supported by the Annie E. Casey Foundation to:

- Maintain Kentucky data on the national KIDS COUNT Data Center





















2025 KY KIDS COUNT: Four Domains of Child Wellbeing

2025 KY KIDS COUNT: Preview of Coming Data




119 of 120 counties saw worse rates of food insecurity in 2023 compared to 2021, and 1 county saw a rate that did not change.



ALL Kentucky counties had lower rates of mothers smoking during pregnancy between 2021-23 compared to 2016-18.



Data Spotlight on Childhood Obesity & Food Access



The neighborhood a child grows up in can shape their diet and impact risk of obesity:

- In Kentucky, nearly one in five youth ages 6-17 (18.7%) are obese, mirroring the national rate of 17%
- Limited access to healthy foods, few opportunities for physical activity, and chronic stress drive higher obesity rates, especially in low-income and rural communities
- Children living in high-poverty neighborhoods with poor food access during pregnancy and early childhood had a more than 50% higher risk of obesity



Data Spotlight on Childhood Obesity & Food Access



School meals impact children's nutrition and help combat obesity:

- Most Kentucky schools offer free meals through Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)
- Free/reduced priced meals at schools are linked to improved health and lower rates of obesity
- In Kentucky, more than 1 in 4 food-insecure children live in families that earn too much to qualify for free and reducedprice meals, relying on SNAP and Medicaid

Data Informs Policy

The Blueprint for Kentucky's Children speaks with a common voice to create brighter futures for all Kentucky kids and their families.

The Blueprint is a coalition of non-profit, public, and private organizations that stands on three pillars:

- Thriving communities launch strong families,
- Strong families launch successful kids, and
- Successful kids launch a prosperous future for Kentucky.







Blueprint for Kentucky's Children 2026 State Policy & Budget Priorities

- Ensure meaningful nutrition access including SNAP and school meals.
- Prioritize investments for children who have experienced abuse and neglect by dedicating funds to support kinship caregivers.
- Define child and family impact statements and create a process for analyzing proposed legislation to determine impacts on kids and families.
- Support youth mental health by creating mechanisms to direct social media settlement dollars to positive youth development programs.
