



Workforce participation in KY

We are currently ranked 46th worst workforce participation rate in the nation

43% among men 27% among women SUD is a leading cause of failing workforce participation.

4 In 10 people In KY have SUD or experience with SUD & is the leading cause of death.

KY total correctional population in 2022 = 95,479

Includes 32K incarcerations and 63K for community based supervision program (Unlock KY. Org)

OUR PASSION IS COMPREHENSIVE HEALTHCARE THAT ADDRESSES THE WHOLE PERSON.

It costs the U.S. \$15.4 billion to provide substance abuse treatment. (JAMA, 2023)

The U.S. workforce loses \$310.8 billion per year to loss of productivity due to addiction. (JAMA, 2023)

The medical costs associated with addiction are \$101.4 billion (JAMA, 2023)

The indirect cost associated with incarcerating people in addiction is \$1.2 trillion (lost earnings, adverse health effects, damage to the families) (JAMA, 2023)

Discharge planning starts on day one

Collaborative care with embedded peer support accountability must start from the very first encounter with a client on day ONE.

Meet people where they are

We must utilize technology and integrated social support resources for law enforcement and first responders to identify the need of high risk populations & interventionists needed with aftercare support.

OBJECTIVES

WORKFORCE PARTICIPATION

Kentucky is below the national average for workforce particiaption. This model will empower rootcause initiatives to identify and support access for higher work force partipcation opportunities.

BREAKING GENERATIONAL CYCLES

Early intervention treatment and preventative screenings will reduce health care readmission rates and spending for high risk populations who face barriers and lack educational access for evidence based outcomes.



RESOURCE COLLABORATION

Reduces duplication of resources to allow comprehensive integration with established agencies in a region for marganilized clients at risk or in acute need.

DECRIMINALIZATION

Kentucky has one of the highest class C/D felony court records in the country leading to our jails/prisons overcrowding and overspending. Leaving many first time non violent offenders with a felony and unable to find employment.
