Current Kentucky Older Adult Population

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), formerly known as the food stamp program, is the nation's largest federal nutrition program and an important safety net for adults ages 50 and older. Administered by the US Department of Agriculture's (USDA's) Food and Nutrition Services, the program helps millions of low income Americans avoid food insecurity—consistent lack of food due to inadequate financial resources

1—by augmenting their financial resources so that they can afford to purchase food. In 2016, 8.7 million (over 40 percent of) SNAP households had at least one adult age 50 or older.

2 SNAP is an especially important program for older adults because many live on fixed incomes and have limited financial resources to spend on food, housing, and other necessities. For example, research shows that older adults receiving SNAP are less likely to forgo needed medicine due to cost.

3 SNAP participation has also been linked to reduced hospital and nursing home admissions among older adults, resulting in millions of dollars in savings.
