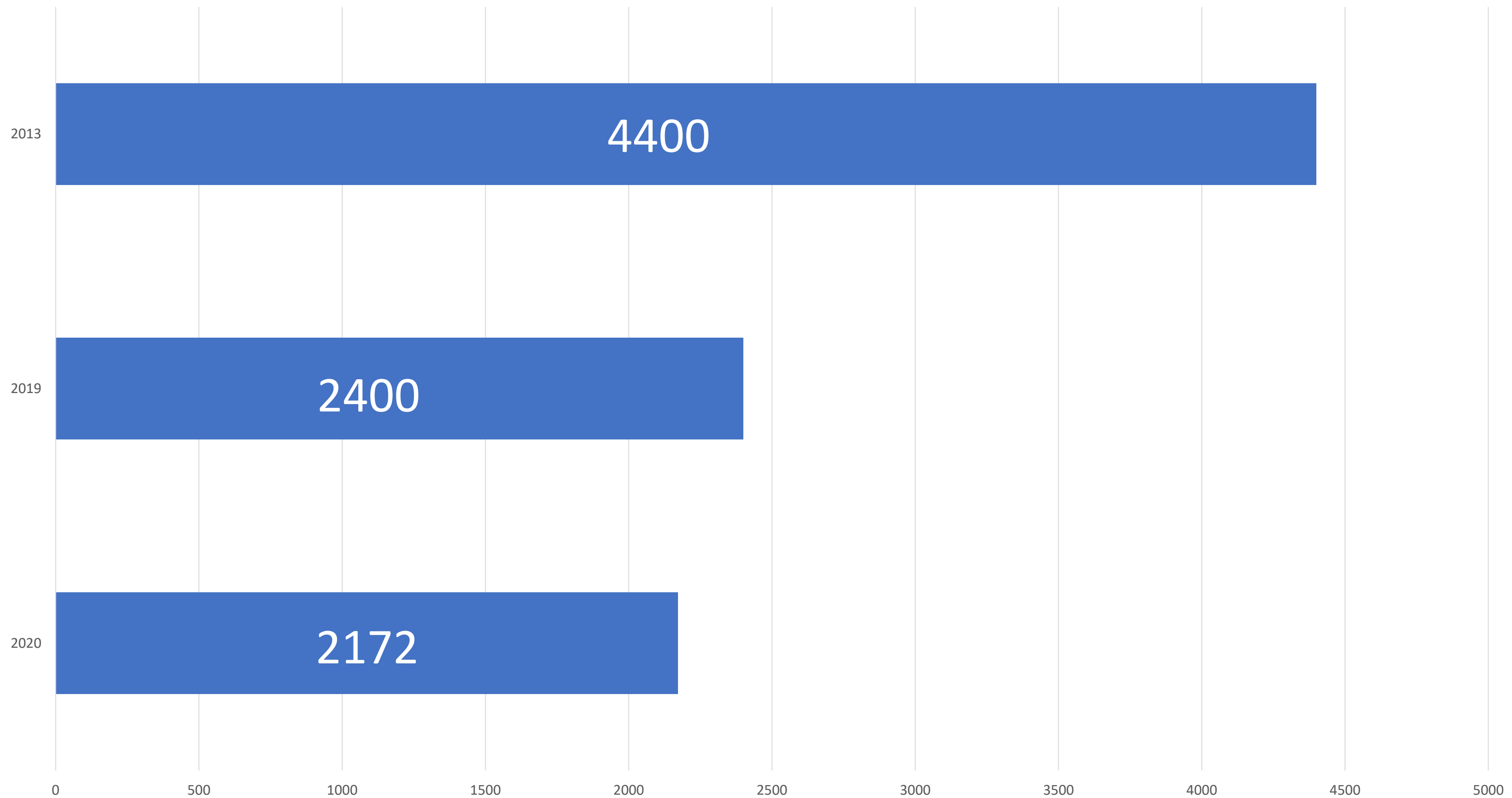

WHAT WE KNOW

- SURVEY CONDUCTED BY PRICHARD COMMITTEE FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE
 - MORE THAN 1,500 RESPONSES
- PRE COVID19 – KY'S CHILD CARE CAPACITY = 165,314
- 11% - 15% OF PROVIDERS MAY CLOSE PERMANENTLY

June 15, 2020

- ✓ LICENSED PROVIDERS ALLOWED TO REOPEN (Family Child Care opened on June 8)
 - ✓ Strict New Guidelines
 - ✓ Increased cleaning, disinfecting, sanitizing
 - ✓ Group sizes of 10 children

Represented

- **PROVIDER TYPE & CAPACITY:**
 - Type I – 546 (85%)
 - Type II – 24 (4%)
 - Family Child Care Home – 72 (11%)
- 54,898 total capacity of respondents
 - 44,333 – enrollment prior to COVID-19
 - 25,728 – enrollment after reopening



CHILD CARE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (CCAP):

- 84% of respondents accept CCAP
 - Current CCAP enrollment of respondents – 8206 children



WILL YOUR CENTER HAVE TO CLOSE IF GROUP SIZE RESTRICTIONS ARE NOT REMOVED?

- Yes – *43% of respondents (276 providers)
- No – 57% of respondents
- *230 providers who accept CCAP reported they would close (4,604 children)

*Majority of respondents by 11/1/2020 (Range from 7/15/20 – 1/30/21)

WEEKLY INCOME LOSS:

- 315 respondents reported weekly income loss
- \$3,605 average loss per center (of the 315 respondents)
- \$1,135,575 total weekly loss

FACILITY TOURS:

- 57% reported need for in person tours to build capacity/enrollment
- 43% reported no need for in person tours
