kynect health coverage resources benefits





- kynect Self Service Portal (SSP) portal was launched on October 5, 2020
- Provides a common platform to access kynect benefits, kynect resources, and kynect health coverage
- Redesigned look and feel for increased access and a new mobile design
- State Based Exchange was not included in the design of the new kynect SSP





Through kynect benefits, residents can check their eligibility and apply for the following Commonwealth's benefit programs:

- Food Assistance Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- ✓ **Financial Assistance** Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)
- Health Assistance Medicaid/Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) and COVID-19 time-limited coverage
- Premium Assistance Kentucky Integrated Health Insurance Premium Payment (KI-HIPP) Program
- Child Care Assistance Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP)

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
Through kynect health coverage, residents can check their eligibility, apply for the following Commonwealth's benefit programs, and find a kynector:

- Health Assistance Medicaid/Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) and COVID-19 time-limited coverage
- Premium Assistance Kentucky Integrated Health Insurance Premium Payment (KI-HIPP) Program
- Qualified Health Plan (QHP) Assistance Through the Kentucky Health Benefit Exchange (KHBE), QHPs <u>may</u> qualify for advance premium tax credits (APTC) and cost sharing reductions (CSR)
- kynector Assistance to guide you to the right coverage






Application Statistics - Daily Averages






Kynect benefits Usage Statistics - Since kynect go-live



What is a kynector?

- Known as application assisters, certified application counselors (CAC), or navigators
- Assist Kentuckians with finding and applying for health care coverage
- Located in all 120 counties and are trusted members of the community



ASSIST



EDUCATE

Teaching Kentucky communities about different health coverage options and the enrollment process.

Education is accomplished through outreach events. These events are hosted at common areas such as libraries, health departments, and community venues with flyers and information on available programs.

- Medicaid, including KCHIP and KI-HIPP
- Qualified health plans (QHP)
- Advanced premium tax credit

Enrolling individuals in health coverage with the aid of SSP/kynect benefits portal and HealthCare.gov. Track application notifications to ensure timely submissions.

This is a very important component to being an kynector. They assist individuals on followup with applications with the following:

- Assisting in uploading required verifications or appeals
- Follow-up with appropriate state entities regarding other benefits depending on eligibility & notices
- Directing the individuals to helpful resources based on need (food, shelter, etc.)

CONNECT

Connecting individuals to community resources and hosting outreach and enrollment events.

kynectors connect individuals with local resources. This can be verbal referrals to locations for assistance such as housing agency or Goodwill or by utilizing kynect resources. Since the majority of kynectors are employed by social or community partner agencies, kynectors are well informed community resources.



Contracted and Non-Contracted kynectors

Contracted kynectors

- CHFS contracts with three organizations and provides funding to:
 - Community Action Kentucky (CAK)
 - Kentucky Primary Care Association (KPCA)
 - Kentuckiana Regional Planning and Development Agency (KIPDA)
- These organizations employ 93 kynectors

Non-Contracted kynectors

- Non-contracted kynectors are certified application counselors (CACs), who are staff or volunteers of designated organizations that sign an agreement with CHFS and include hospitals, FQHCs, health care providers and agencies providing social services
- There are 331 non-contracted kynectors
- Non-contracted kynectors receive no funding from CHFS

Contracted and Non-Contracted kynectors

• Training is received for both contract and non-contracted kynectors through the Cabinet's MyPurpose Learning Management System

What is a Community Health Worker?

- Community health worker (CHW) is a frontline public health worker who is a **trusted** member of and/or has an unusually close understanding of the community served.
- This trusting relationship enables the CHW to serve as a **liaison/link/intermediary** between health/social services and the community to facilitate access to services and improve the quality and cultural competence of service delivery.
- Community health workers are employed by community health centers, health departments, hospitals, integrated health systems, and social service agencies.
- DPH estimates that there are currently 90-100 CHWs in Kentucky.
- CHWs build individual and community capacity by increasing health knowledge, health literacy, and self-sufficiency through a range of activities such as:

Community education	Outreach
Social support	Health coaching
Informal counseling	Advocacy



Certified Community Health Worker (CCHW)

Voluntary credential that recognizes a CHW's demonstration of the CHW Core Competencies.

CCHW Facts, Figures, & Resources

- Launched on October 1, 2019
- 59 CCHWs as of October 10, 2010

CHW Certification Pathways

A "formal" CHW Training Program

The training must provide at least 40 hours of didactic classroom experience based on the approved CHW core competencies

Complete a 40-hour mentorship with the supervisor verifying that the CHW achieved all core competencies

OR

Work Experience

2,500 hours working as a CHW or in a similar role within the past three years (patient navigator, community outreach worker, promotors)

NOTE: Recertification – Ten (10) continuing education units are required annually.



kynectors and Community Health Care Workers

What are the differences?

kynectors

Focus is to enroll individuals in health care coverage

Conduct outreach and education for enrollment in health care coverage

Enroll individuals in health care coverage

Assist individuals with the application process by tracking status, interpreting notices and defining next steps

Community Health Care Workers

Focus is to provide education and support to improve the health of individuals and their communities

Lead health education classes

Help with scheduling and accompany individuals to appointments

Assist people managing chronic conditions

Encourage people to utilize preventive services

Monitor compliance with care plans

No Mechanism

In Kentucky there is no mechanism for reimbursement from any payer including Medicare, Medicaid, or commercial insurance. Some states have approved particular codes for CHW reimbursement through Medicaid via a waiver or SPA (state plan amendment).

Funding

How are CHW programs in Kentucky funded?

• Some are grant funded

• Some are integrated into their operating budget (FQHC, insurers)

• Kentucky has a successful program with Kentucky Homeplace since 1994 through a contract with the Kentucky DPH

MCOs

Kentucky MCOs currently employ eighteen CHWs:

Anthem - 4

Humana - 4

Molina - 7

WellCare - 3



What is a Peer Support Specialist?

Peer support specialists have lived experience with mental illness and/or substance use. They work in community mental health centers, psychiatric hospitals, and substance use treatment programs.

The peer support specialist advocates for people in recovery, shares resources, builds relationships, leads groups, and helps others set goals for recovery.

There are 1,552 certified peer support specialists in Kentucky who serve communities as:

____ Adult peer support specialists

– Family peer support specialists



Peer Support Specialist Requirements



- o 18 or older
- Current or past diagnosis
- Have received treatment
- High school diploma or GED
- Demonstrate a pattern of recovery (consumer improves in health and wellness, self-directed life, and reaching full potential)

Training

- Successfully complete approved PSS training and pass exam (in regulation)
- Training includes problem solving, wellness recovery action plan, stages in recovery, effective listening skills, establishing recovery goals, and using support groups

Continuing Education

Successfully complete, maintain, and submit to DBHDID a minimum of 6 hours of related training or education each subsequent year

NOTE: Peer support is a Medicaid billable service



Peer Support Specialist Career Path

There is no direct career pathway from peer support specialist (PSS) to a social work/human services field. However, PSS employment allows for exposure to other fields of study through the following:

Guidance

Professional guidance through mentor/mentee relationships

Team

Interdisciplinary team approach to client care

Skillset

Development of healthcare skillsets that can be enhanced through further education


This exposure may lead a PSS to pursue education in the following professions:

- Alcohol and drug counselors




