# A Responsible and Real Budget

- Sound Economic Assumptions Consensus Forecasting Group
  - Comprised entirely of outside economists/experts-only State in the Country with this structure
- Nonrecurring Resources used solely for Nonrecurring Spending
- Pays Down on Pension Liability
- Largest Budget Reserve Trust Fund Ever
- Pays Down on Deferred Maintenance Debt
- More than Structurally Balanced
- Disaster Relief and Recovery Natural Disaster Preparedness
- Debt Service Ratio 3.68% Lowest Since Policy Cap of 6% was adopted

# Recurring Revenue vs. Recurring Spending

- Governor's Budget Adds nearly \$2 Billion to the Education Budget (Pre-K through High School)
  - **\$915 million -** Fiscal Year 2023
  - \$983 million Fiscal Year 2024

- SEEK Funding Increased by 16.9% over FY2022 Budget
  - **\$441.8 million** Fiscal Year 2023
  - \$517.5 million Fiscal Year 2024
  - Largest Increase Since 1990 Education Reform Act and Formula Funding Model Increases

- SEEK Per Pupil Base Increase of 12.5%
  - \$4,000 FY 2022 \$4,300 FY 2023 \$4,500 FY 2024
  - Still less than inflation-adjusted amount since 2008
- Fully Funds Pupil Transportation +\$175 million each year & fully funds Vocational Education transportation
- Equalizes School District Local Tax Levies

  Dedicated to Capital Improvements additional \$74 and \$62 million in FY 2023 and FY 2024
- Nat'l Board Certification Salary Fully Funded

- Universal Preschool for all Four-Year-Olds \$172
   million each year
- Full-Day Kindergarten funded
- Teacher/School Employee Salary & Benefits
  - Minimum 5% Salary Increase for all staff in FY 2023
  - No health insurance premium increase
  - Fully funds teachers' pensions & medical benefits
- Teacher Student Loan Forgiveness Program
  - \$26.3 million annually for max \$3,000 annual award for each year employment as a teacher

#### Career and Technical Education

- \$97.4 million in FY 2022 to renovate another 11 local area vocational centers – already scored
- Another \$75 million pool for a new round of applications to renovate secondary centers
- \$8 million each year to 12 locally operated vocational centers-left out of formula funding for up to 12 years
- \$6.8 million over two years for State Operated Career and Technical Centers

#### **Postsecondary Education**

- □ Base Funding Increases nearly 12% over biennium
  - □ \$67.5 million FY 2023
  - □ \$90.0 million FY 2024
- Bucks for Brains Endowment Match \$60 million bond funds to be matched dollar for dollar
  - University of Kentucky \$33.3 million
  - University of Louisville \$16.7 million
  - Comprehensive Universities \$ 10.0 million

- □ \$500 million Asset Preservation to pay down the debt of deferred maintenance for nine postsecondary institutions to match each dollar with fifty cents bringing total investment to \$750 million
- Better Kentucky Promise Scholarship Free
   Tuition & Fees for up to Associate Degree
  - \$16.3 million FY 2023 funding 6,000 recipients
  - \$27.7 million FY 2024 funding 9,700 recipients
- Pension Subsidy Relief
  - Preventing cut of \$6.6 million over two years

- New Construction Projects
  - 19 Projects Bond funds of \$1.0 billion
- Needs-Based Student Financial Aid
  - Increase College Access Program (CAP) Grant Award from \$2,900 to \$3,300 in FY 2024
- □ **KEES** Fully Funded

# Federal American Rescue Plan Act Spending

\$1 Billion Remains to be Appropriated from the State Fiscal Recovery Fund of the American Rescue Plan Act

# Enhancing Public Safety and Victim Services

- Kentucky State Police Salary Increases for Retention & Recruitment
  - \$15,000 Pay increase for Troopers \$8,000 Pay increase for Telecommunicators
  - Trooper Retirement Plan Return to Tier II Plan from Tier III Hybrid Cash
  - \$12.1 million for State Police Body Cameras
- Training Stipend Increase for Law Enforcement & Firefighters
  - 25% increase from \$4,000 to \$4,600

# Enhancing Public Safety and Victim Services

- Supports Prosecutors & Victim Services (Marsy's Law)
  - Commonwealth Attorneys adds\$26 million over the biennium to support 139 additional positions
  - County Attorneys adds\$30 million over the biennium to support 165 additional positions
- □ **Corrections and Juvenile Justice** Return retirement plans to Tier II from Tier III Hybrid Cash recruitment and retention
- Probation & Parole Caseloads
  - \$5.1 million over the biennium for additional Probation and Parole Officers to maintain caseload of 99:1
- Replace Kentucky State Reformatory
  - Expand Little Sandy Correctional Complex
  - Relocate Corrections Medical Facility

# Protecting and Expanding Health Care

#### Nursing Scholarship Program

\$6 million annually for at least 1,000 recipients compared to current 150 & double the max award per semester to \$3,000

#### Nursing Student Loan Forgiveness

\$5 million each year for five years for up to \$3,000 per year for each year employed in KY, including nursing faculty - from the American Rescue Plan Act

#### Outreach and Marketing Nursing Profession

\$2 million from American Rescue Plan Act

# Protecting and Expanding Health Care

- Fully Funds Medicaid & Medicaid Expansion
- Michelle P. and Supports for Community Living
  - 500 new slots for Michelle P.,100 for SCL
- Nursing Home Facilities
  - \$150 million annually to support Nursing Homes
  - \$29 per diem Reimbursement Rate Increase Extended
- □ 988 Crisis Support Line
  - New National Crisis Line-Replacing Suicide Prevention Line
  - \$3.4 million in FY 2023 and \$9.9 million FY 2024 to phase in additional crisis support staff

# Protecting and Expanding Health Care

- Public Health Transformation-Local Health Depts
  - □ \$17.7 in FY 2023 and \$19.1 million in FY 2024
- State Laboratory-Expansion for Public Health
- Pension Subsidy-Health Depts & Community Mental Health Centers
  - Prevents cut of \$13.3 million two years-Health Depts
  - Prevents cut of \$2.5 million over two years-CMHCs
- Pediatric Research Trust Fund Adds \$1.25 million each year for Pediatric Cancer research

# Protecting Children and Families

#### Social Workers

- □ 350 more Social Workers to reduce caseloads by 25%
- Student Loan Forgiveness Program Provides \$2.1 million each year for a max \$3,000 annual award for each year employed by Community Based Services

#### Child Care Assistance

- \$12 million each year to provide a \$2/day increase using American Rescue Plan Act funds
- □ Prevention Services for Abused & Neglected Children
  - □ \$19.6 million each year
- Child Advocacy, Domestic Violence, Rape Crisis Centers
  - □ 34% Increase in funding equates to \$5,668,00 each year

# Protecting Children and Families

- Senior Meals Ensure No Waitlist
  - \$36.2 million over next two and a half years from the American Rescue Plan Act
  - 49,000 additional meals per week
- New Office of Dementia Services
  - 2021 legislation to support services to 73,000 affected
- Caregiver and Hart-Supported Living Programs
  - Additional \$2 million over the biennium
- Residential & Therapeutic Foster Care
  - 17% Rate Increase

# Preparing a World-Class Workforce

- Workforce Initiative Job Commitment Grants
  - \$20 million each year competitive grants to education & training entities for programs that combine an employer's commitment to hire
  - Expand Everybody Counts to other Ky locations
- Unemployment Insurance Field Services
  - 90 positions to restore field services cutbacks
- □ Urban League of Louisville CDL Training
  - \$667,000 each year for CDL training
- Area Health Education Centers to restore state funding to promote health care workforce - \$2.5 million each year
- □ Talent Attraction Media Campaign \$10 million each year to attract talent to Kentucky

# Creating and Attracting Jobs

- Site Identification & Development Program
  - \$250 million in one-time funds for build-ready sites
- □ Northern Kentucky Life Sciences Lab Investment of \$10 million with City of Covington & life sciences companies
- AgriTech Research and Development Facility
  - \$75 million to support state-of-the-art AgriTech R & D in Eastern Kentucky
- Worker Training Investment
  - \$5 million over the biennium for up-skilled robotics and advanced manufacturing training

# Investing in Our Public Employees

- Salary Increases for State Employees
  - Governor proposed a 5% increase effective May 1, 2022 & supports House's 6% increase, with a May 1 date
- Fully Funds & Pays Down Pension Liabilities
  - \$250 million in FY 2023 & \$500 million in FY 2024
  - Reduce amortization period extended 6 years by the 2020 Regular Session by 2 years -nonhaz plan
- Health Insurance No Employee Premium Increases for next two years

#### Infrastructure Investment

- □ \$959.6 million Federal Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act
  - 22% increase from federal Highway Trust Fund FY 2022
  - Additional state match of \$184.9 million leverages \$774.7
     million additional Federal
- \$250 million General Fund for Major Transportation Projects
  - Brent Spence Bridge, I-69 Ohio River Crossing & Mountain Parkway
- □ 2022-2024 Biennial Highway Construction Plan
  - \$8.5 billion state and federal program revenues
  - \$600 million annually in pavements and bridges
- □ \$100 million Electric Vehicle Charging Stations
  - □ \$69.5 million federal Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act
  - \$30.5 million General Fund for state match and purchase electric vehicles for state fleet

#### Infrastructure Investment

#### Better Kentucky Cleaner Water Program - \$500 million

- \$250 million from federal American Rescue Plan Act
- \$247.7 million from federal Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act; which is an increase of \$159.3 million over the baseline federal program

#### \$200 million Broadband Expansion

- \$100 million from federal Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act
- \$55.8 million American Rescue Plan Act
- \$44.2 million General Fund
- \$500 million total when combined with 2021 Session's \$300 million

#### Aviation Infrastructure

- \$50 million grant program for General Aviation Airports
- \$6 million for the Paducah Airport Terminal construction

# Partnering with Local Governments

- All Coal Severance Tax Revenue to Coal Counties
  - □ Return 100% to coal-producing counties +\$40 million/year
- □ County Clerks \$50 million Investment
  - □ \$25 million to transition recorded instruments to electronic
  - \$25 million to acquire election equipment
- Property Valuation Administrators
  - \$5.6 million over the biennium for additional 45 positions
- Area Development Districts
  - Additional \$500,000 over biennium to match increase in the Appalachian Regional Commission Grants

# Investing in Veterans

- Investments over the biennium for Veterans:
  - Homeless Veterans Program \$400,000
  - Veteran Benefit Field Representatives \$1.4 million
  - Expand Outreach Programs \$600,000
  - Veterans Cemeteries-staffing to meet interment needs
  - Kentucky Medal of Honor permanent memorial
  - Phase-in operations of the Bowling Green Veterans Center in FY 2024

### **Tourism**

### Parks Improvement Pool - \$200 million General Fund

Essential projects to maintain, renovate, repair, replace, and expand to preserve and enhance State Park facilities

#### Kentucky Tourism Marketing

\$10 million from the American Rescue Plan Act to market the safe return of visitors to Kentucky's tourism destinations

# **Enhancing Fiscal Responsibility**

- Budget Reserve Trust Fund Largest Ever
  - Current Balance \$1.5 billion + \$250 million in FY 2023
  - Raises balance to \$1.76 billion -12.5% of FY 2023 Estimated Revenues
- More than Structurally Balanced In FY 2024, recurring revenues exceed recurring spending by 5%
- Preparing for Natural Disasters
  - \$100 million new Disaster Relief & Recovery Fund
- Paying Down Debt-Deferred Maintenance-\$1.2 billion
  - \$956 million in General Fund
  - \$250 million Postsecondary Education match

- □ Commission on Women restore its funding
- Commission on Human Rights restore recent budget cuts
- Office of Minority Empowerment restore its funding
