

African Americans Make Up Only 11% of Kentucky's Youth Population










Complaints Against African American Youth were Filed at a Rate Twice Their Representation

Truancy a possible explanation for reduced disproportionality for status offenses


Complaints Filed by Race/Ethnicity January – June 2018 Public vs Status



Complaints Filed by Race/Ethnicity January – June 2018 Public Offenses School vs. Community




Disproportionality for African American Youth among Public Complaints is Higher in the Community than in Schools




Complaints Filed by Race/Ethnicity January – June 2018 Status Offenses School vs. Community



This Trend Continues for School-Related Status Offenses: Disproportionality is Higher in the Community




At Positive Contact Points, African American Youth are Underrepresented

African American Youth Who Are Diverted are Overrepresented in Unsuccessful Diversions







Alarming Trends in the Top 4 DMC Counties




- Hardin African American youth are 15% of the population
 - 27% of complaints
 - 63% of youthful offenders 4x their representation in complaints
- Fayette African American youth are 20% of the population
 - Only 39% of diversion agreements, but 67% of unsuccessful diversions
 - 64% of detained youth 3x their representation in complaints
- Christian African American youth are 25% of the population
 - 76% of detained youth 3x their representation in complaints
 - 83% of youthful offenders
- Jefferson African American youth are 29% of the population
 - 71% of overrides by the judiciary and the county attorney
 - 77% of youthful offenders

Preliminary Outcomes

- Internal policy change on appointment scheduling
- Successfully reduced Failure To Appear
- New office space acquired at the Neighborhood Places located across Jefferson County
- New release options to youth that cater to both male and female
- Closer partnerships with African American community leaders to create programs and mentoring opportunities



JJOC Considerations





• Refer all kids 12 and under to the FAIR Team

• Mandatory diversion of certain cases when the child has no prior adjudications
