What we Do

We ADVOCATE for laws and policies that protect the safety and well-being of survivors.

We EDUCATE advocates in the field, community partners, and the public on understanding and preventing domestic violence.

We EMPOWER survivors by providing rent and utility subsidies, emergency financial assistance, and through the development of 84 units of tax credit housing.

We SUPPORT the 15 state-designated domestic violence programs that serve all 120 counties in Kentucky.



Why Did We Change our Name?

To EVOLVE Our work is intersectional. Survivors experience multiple forms of violence, including poverty, homelessness, racism, sexism, homophobia, transphobia, and xenophobia, in addition to gender-based violence.

► To REIMAGINE a Commonwealth where all individuals, families, and communities have what they need to live in safety and thrive.

▶ To UNIFY

It takes all of us to make a stand that intimate partner violence hurts everyone in our families and communities. And it takes everyone working together collectively to change the culture to one that rejects violence as a normal way of life.



The Strength of our 15 Regional Domestic Violence Shelter Programs

Outcome performance of our programs over last year:

▶ 93% of survivors reported knowing more ways to plan for their safety.

▶ 95% reported being more aware of community resources available to them.

Over the past 5 years we have sheltered:

- ▶ 10,000 women
- ▶ 300 men
- ► 6,000 children

We have provided non-residential services to:

- ▶ 64,000 women
- > 5,300 men
- ▶ 3,000 children



7,800 unmet requests for shelter – 1,258 in FY23 alone





Reporting Intimate Partner Violence

- Crimes of domestic violence are underreported
- ► Cannot seek protective orders for some types of domestic violence including emotional abuse, financial abuse, and isolation.
- Intimate Partner Homicides uncertain counts.

 - ► Kentucky Violent Death Reporting System
 - Speak My Name

Kentucky State Police Data

- Total number of JC3s filed: **38,708**
- ► Total number of arrests: 8,867
- Total number of offenses charged:14,199
- Homicide (murder, manslaughter):27 (or 21)
- Felony assault: **276**
- Assault IV: 5,613
- *Strangulation: 880
- *Stalking: 18

- DV Sexual offenses (rape, sodomy, sexual abuse, sexual misconduct): 6
 - *no specific UOR code for DV
- ► Violation Protective Order: **1,045**
- ► EPO/tIPOs entered into LINK: **19,986**
- EPO/tIPOs served: 16,402 (82%)
 - Average time for service: Ranges 0 to 42 days, with an average 3.8 days to serve.
 - Unsure whether these timeframes take into account orders that were never served



Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) Data

- Petitions filed (EPO and IPO): 27,524
- Petitions denied: 5,514 (~20%)
- ex parte orders issued: 19,244 (~70%)
- Summons only issued: 2,802 (~10%)
- ► IPO petitions only: **6,104**
- ► IPO petitions denied: 1,798 (~30%)

- ► Long-term order granted:
 - ▶ DVO: 5,014
 - ▶ IPO: 1,182
- ► Total: **6,196** = 23% of all petitions filed and 31% of the 22,010 cases that "went to court"
- ~20,000 respondents were male; that's ~ 70%
- *29 DV homicides
- ▶ *27 Attempted homicide
- ▶ 47 DV rape/attempted rape and DV sodomy charges filed in Circuit Court;



Three Levels of Prevention



Primary:

Preventing anything from happening in the first place

Secondary:

Preventing things from getting worse

Tertiary:

Preventing the long-term effects

What do we Need Going Forward?

Living Wages and Competitive Benefits

Direct service advocates earn approximately \$16,000 less per year than the living wage, which is determined to be what a family needs to attain a modest yet adequate standard of living and includes consideration for housing, food, childcare, transportation, healthcare, taxes, and other necessities.

- Children Services and Support
- ► Services to Support Survivors experiencing Mental Health & Substance Use Issues

People who struggle with mental health conditions and substance use disorder are at a higher risk of victimization by an abusive partner; often, these circumstances lead to homelessness.

► Increase Access to Shelter & Supportive Services

Transportation services and funding to expand and renovate facilities.


