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Senate Bill (SB) 90 Overview

This legislation provides an alternative to incarceration by allowing eligible defendants to receive treatment for substance use and/or behavioral health disorder.

Under this legislation, eligible defendants must be assessed as soon as possible (but within at least 72 hours) by a mental health specialist.

The program's goal is to divert defendants charged with certain **non-violent, non-sexual misdemeanors** and **Class D felonies** away from jail and into treatment for substance-use disorder(s) and/or mental-health issues.



Eligibility Criteria

- Kentucky resident and at least 18 years of age.
- Charged with a qualifying offense. (Exclusions: violent offender, sex offense, DUI, domestic violence, or protective orders against victim).
- Doesn't have a previous conviction for Class A, B, or C felony, or a Class D felony or misdemeanor that is not a qualifying offense;
- Assessed by Pretrial Services as low-risk for failure to appear, low-risk for new criminal activity; or prosecutor or defense attorney identifies defendant as a viable participant; and
- Clinical assessment determines defendant has a substance use and/or mental health disorder.



Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP) Overview

If the defendant is determined to be eligible for the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program, the prosecutor can enter into an agreement with the defendant to participate.

The program provides an array of services such as outpatient or inpatient treatment, cognitive and behavioral therapies, education, vocational services, and housing assistance.

BHCDP is funded as follows:


Defendant's current health insurance (including Medicaid); or

 If uninsured, the Opioid Abatement Trust Fund - administered by the Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities (DBHDID).

Data Collection

•SB 90 requires treatment providers and County or Commonwealth Attorneys to collect data regarding the defendant's participation in the program and report the data to AOC.

•Data will be collected via a 14-day report, 42-day report, quarterly report, and final report.

•Examples of data collected: # of participants eligible; # of clinical assessments; # of participants; # discharged for noncompliance or successful completion; # of victims that agreed or disagreed with program; etc.

Community Forums




•In collaboration with DBHDID, the AOC hosted local community forums in all 11 pilot sites.

- •All local stakeholders were invited:
 - Judges, prosecutors, public defenders, clerks, law enforcement, jail staff, adult education, treatment providers
- •Forums provided an opportunity for stakeholders to express concerns.
- •Forums were followed by one-on-one meetings with key stakeholders in pilot counties.

SB 90 in Action

Currently, BHCDP is live in seven counties: Letcher, Madison, Clark, Pulaski, Hopkins, Christian, and Oldham.

There have been 1000+ of pretrial eligible defendants since Jan 1 (for all 11 pilot counties).

Over 150 of defendants have voluntarily agreed to complete the clinical assessment.


As of 10/15:

- 140 agreements have been signed.
- 13 participants have successfully completed BHCDP. ③
- 2 participants voluntarily withdrew from BHCDP.
- 8 participants have been dismissed from BHCDP due to non-compliance.
- 23 agreements waiting to be signed.
- 57 defendants were denied entry into BHCDP due to prosecutor denial.




Clinical Assessment Completion

Implementation Barriers

- Hesitation from stakeholders
- Role clarification from partners and providers
- Eligibility criteria
- Finding qualified mental health providers in pilot sites
- Transportation in rural communities



Implementation Successes

- Collaboration between Judicial, Legislative, and Executive Branch partners. Biweekly meetings with DBHDID and Kentucky Adult Education.
- Local community resources have generously provided services to participants and recovery housing is continuing to expand opportunities:
 - Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program (EKCEP) has provided training and supplies for participants in program.
 - Letcher housing partners provided shelter for unhoused participant.
- Individual success stories:
 - One participant charged with flagrant nonsupport has completed lineman school and gained custody of his child.
 - One participant suffering from substance use disorder has completed treatment and is now on the path to getting her CNA.
