Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP)

Overview

• This legislation provides an alternative to incarceration by allowing eligible defendants to receive treatment for substance use and/or mental health disorder.

Goal

Divert eligible defendants with certain non-violent, non-sexual misdemeanors and Class D
felonies away from jail and into treatment.

Wide Array of Services

• Outpatient or inpatient treatment, cognitive and behavioral therapies, education, vocational services, and housing assistance.

Eligibility Criteria

- Kentucky resident and at least 18 years of age
- Charged with a qualifying offense. (Exclusions: violent offender, sex offense, DUI, domestic violence, or protective orders against victim).
- Doesn't have a previous conviction for Class A, B, or C felony, or a Class D felony or misdemeanor that is not a qualifying offense; and
- Assessed by Pretrial Services as low-risk for failure to appear, low-risk for new criminal activity.
- Clinical assessment determines defendant has a substance use and/or mental health disorder. OR
- Prosecutor or defense attorney can override






BHCDP Data Collection

- •SB 90 requires treatment providers and County or Commonwealth Attorneys to collect data regarding the defendant's participation in the program and report the data to AOC.
- •Data will be collected via a 14-day, 42-day, quarterly, and final reports.
- •Examples of data collected: # of participants eligible; # of clinical assessments; # of participants; # discharged for noncompliance or successful completion; # of victims that agreed or disagreed with program; etc.




2024 BHCDP Eligibility






2023 BHCDP Eligibility






2024 Eligibility Factors












2024 Clinical Assessment Completion






2023 Clinical Assessment Completion




2024 Clinical Assessment Results

Barrier Relief Support Services

BHCDP Barrier Relief Supportive Services are meant to help program participants achieve recovery and develop recovery capital that support treatment engagement and retention.

Recovery capital is defined as resources and services that a person can draw upon to initiate and sustain recovery from behavioral health disorders. Access to barrier relief supportive services should be closely tied to the participant's clinical treatment and/or recovery management plan.

Participant involvement in recovery planning can help determine the type of recovery supports most needed.

Success Stories From the Field

- I received a text from one of my participants in **Greenup County**. He was excited to share that he has his own apartment now and that his case manager from this treatment provider helped him to furnish it. He said he was up for a promotion at work and planning his first vacation in probably 20 years. In the beginning of SB90, he was depressed and experiencing anxiety with constant worry. It was wonderful to hear him be so excited and looking forward to things.
- Today, we had our very first SB90 Circuit Court case dismissed in **Clark County**! I am incredibly proud of this participant. They completed a residential program, which was very challenging to them, but they persisted. To date, they have remained substance-free for over a year and have maintained sobriety throughout this time. In addition to this incredible accomplishment, they are enrolled in a bachelor's degree program and working towards their degree while also holding down a full-time job. I am beyond proud of them! In addition, several other participants have been utilizing barrier relief through EKCEP, and it has been a tremendous help. Some have had their rent fully paid, easing their financial burden, and allowing them to focus on treatment. Many have received assistance with utilities, food, gas, basic needs, and they are all deeply grateful for the support.

Success Stories cont'd

- Female participant, charges surrounding substance use found this participant lodged in the **Letcher County jail**. While incarcerated, she was one of three females that overdosed and through the administering of Narcan recovered. Shortly after she became a participant in this program was found to be 6 months pregnant. Recently she gave birth to a beautiful healthy little girl and has since regained custody of her 3 year-old-daughter. She currently is enrolled in educational classes, pursing peer support specialist. Upon obtaining her certificate she will be employed with a local mental health provider working with other program participants.
- One of our first participants in **Christian County** completed the program successfully after signing a yearlong agreement. She did so good with the program! She plans to continue using KYAE services by attending HCC and studying business. Her boyfriend, EB, is set to complete the program this month as well and throughout his year of participating in SB90 he has attained his CDL license with the help of KYAE and has started driving with a company! They make a great team!

Implementation Accomplishments

- Collaboration continues between Judicial, Legislative, and Executive Branch partners. Monthly meetings with DBHDID and Kentucky Adult Education
- Data platform launch of DDOR by Fletcher Group Inc for providers
- Emergency barrier relief funds are available to all participants, distributed by the Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program (EKCEP)
- Multiple success stories from across the pilot counties, including promising recidivism rates from participants who've completed BHCDP
- Strategic planning underway with all three partners
