

Winchester M1897 Shotgun, 1917



Trench warfare required the development or adaptation of a weapon capable of a rapid rate of fire with wide dispersion at close ranges. The Winchester Model 1897 shotgun ideally fit this criteria. Sometimes referred to as a trench gun or trench broom, the shotgun was effective for capturing and clearing trenches. After capturing two American soldiers in possession of a shotgun, the Germans issued a legal protest against its use. The protest stated that any future soldiers captured with a shotgun would forfeit their life. No evidence exists to suggest that any American was executed for this reason.
