

## General Electric 7.62 "Minigun" Rotary Machine Gun, 1972



Brought into the collections by George M. Chinn in 1978, this machine gun is a test model, serial number one, of a weapons system that General Electric developed for a number of both ground and air-based platforms. During the Vietnam War, a bank of three of these machine guns was mounted along the side of a Douglas AC-47. With a firing rate of 6,000 rounds per minute, each gun produced a steady stream of glowing tracers. Resembling fire falling from the sky at night, this configuration was nicknamed "Puff the Magic Dragon." Variants of this weapons system are still found in military aircraft.
