
A KENTUCKY HISTORY MOMENT

MASON COUNTY: DARING SLAVE ESCAPE

Writer Harriet Beecher Stowe immortalized in "Uncle Tom's Cabin" a tale she heard of a slave who made a daring escape to freedom from South Ripley by crossing a thawing ice sheet in the Ohio River while carrying her child. Once across the river and in Ohio, the fleeing woman found her way to the home of John Rankin, a Presbyterian minister, abolitionist and conductor on the Underground Railroad. His home now is a museum and national historic landmark.
