ALLEN COUNTY: OIL BOOM FUELS HOTEL BUSINESS

Tourists and oil workers wanting to strike it rich during the oil boom of the 1920s found a place to stay in the Jacksonian Hotel. Constructed in 1919, the hotel quickly received a reputation among visitors and was said to have the best dining room in the Mid-South. Its name came from its location on the Jackson highway, a path people believe President Andrew Jackson took when traveling from Nashville, Tennessee, to Washington, DC.
