CUMBERLAND COUNTY: SEARCH FOR SALT YIELDS OIL

Martin Beaty drilled for brine in 1829, but he found oil – a gusher that soon spread oil to the Cumberland River and ignited. The blaze, described as a spectacular "river of fire," burned for three weeks and disrupted river traffic. Oil bottled from this well was sold widely for medicinal use in the United States and Europe under the name "American Oil." After about 30 years, the well finally produced salt water.
