
A KENTUCKY HISTORY MOMENT



BARREN COUNTY: SLAVE FIND STILL FUELS TOURISM

On July 14, 1859, a slave of a Barren County landowner discovered a pit opening to a cave with sparkling calcite formations that looked like diamonds. Within one month, the public was touring Diamond Caverns – and still does today. The discoverer's name is unknown but his find continues to contribute to Kentucky's tourism and economy.
