Jaime Walz set career and tournament records that are just now beginning to be broken.

Walz attended Highlands High School in Fort Thomas from 1992 to 1996. She is the state's second all-time leading scorer with 4,948 points, having been displaced in 2016 by Whitney Creech of Jenkins High School.*

In all, Walz set 12 state records and was twice named the Kentucky Female Athlete of the Year. By the end of her senior year, she had earned a place in the Gatorade Circle of Champions, Parade Magazine National Player of the Year and the title Kentucky Miss Basketball.

She is head girls basketball coach at Highlands High School.

*Creech scored a total of 5,527 points, which includes 1,065 points scored before her 9th-grade season. According to Kentucky High School Athletic Association records, three girls have topped the 4,000-point career total. The third is Geri Grigsby, with 4,385 (her career was three seasons because she was in school before KHSAA sanctioned girls' basketball). Only one boy has a career-high point total of more than 4,000: Kelly Coleman, Wayland High School, 1952-56, with 4,337.
