

ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATION REVIEW SUBCOMMITTEE
Minutes of February 9, 2026

Call to Order and Roll Call

The February meeting of the Administrative Regulation Review Subcommittee was held on Monday, February 9, 2026, at 1:00 PM in Room 149 of the Capitol Annex. Senator Stephen West, Chair, called the meeting to order, and roll call was taken.

Approval of January 12, 2026, Minutes

A motion was made by Representative Marzian and seconded by Representative Gordon to approve the minutes of the January 12, 2026, meeting. Minutes were approved by voice vote without objection.

The subcommittee determined that the following administrative regulations are deficient pursuant to KRS 13A.030(2)(a):

PUBLIC PROTECTION CABINET: Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control: Tobacco Enforcement

804 KAR 013:020E. Tobacco, nicotine, or vapor product license application forms.

In response to Chair West, Joshua Newton, General Counsel, ABC, stated the agency filed an additional emergency regulation after the December 8th informational review, establishing a provisional license for retailers who applied for a tobacco, nicotine, or vapor product license prior to January 1, 2026, but whose application is still pending. This assists retailers in meeting the statutory deadline.

In response to Chair West, Shannon Stiglitz, Senior Vice President of Government Affairs, KRF, stated there are retailers who still need to apply. On October 31, 2025, ABC sent notice to alcohol licensees. The portal opened November 14th, and the application deadline was January 1, 2026. Several KRF members are in dry territory, did not receive the notice, and did not have prior interaction with ABC. The timing of this implementation process is concerning.

In response to a question by Co-Chair Lewis, Ms. Stiglitz stated the KRF has a diverse membership, including grocery stores, gas stations, and pharmacies. 2025 RS SB 100 treats tobacco like alcohol, but some retailers are different.

In response to Chair West, Ms. Stiglitz explained ABC had at least six months to implement the bill. KRF reached out to ABC to inquire about the status of implementation and to offer assistance. According to ABC's numbers, around 2,000 retailers have not yet applied. Ms. Stiglitz stated lack of communication with the retailers is the biggest problem.

In response to Chair West, Mr. Newton stated ABC is required to follow the statutory deadline.

In response to Chair West, Ksenia Miller, Youth Ambassador, CTFK, stated electronic cigarettes and nicotine pouches target youth, creating addictions that result in health problems. The Campaign for Tobacco-free Kids supports these administrative regulations.

In response to Chair West, Zachary Crouch, Presentation Coordinator, TCYC, stated surveys demonstrate that some students are using tobacco products as early as third grade. Because of loopholes and poor oversight, underage students have access to tobacco products. Nicotine can be a gateway drug, leading to further substance abuse.

In response to Chair West, Shannon Baker, Director of Advocacy, ALA, stated these administrative regulations should not be further delayed. Tobacco protections passed six years ago lack adequate enforcement and many unknown retailers sell these products. These administrative regulations are needed for all retailers to be identified and regulated. Inspections should be unannounced.

In response to Chair West, Kristin Jimison, Advocacy Director, CTFK, stated Kentucky is being used as a model. These administrative regulations will prevent sales of tobacco products to minors, while protecting responsible and compliant retailers. Enforcement should begin immediately. The Campaign for Tobacco-free Kids supports these administrative regulations.

In response to Chair West, Ms. Baker stated existing underage tobacco protections are not fully enforced because data regarding tobacco retailers is incomplete.

Chair West stated that businesses need to be made aware and given time to comply with these requirements.

Chair West made a motion to find 804 KAR 13:020E and 804 KAR 13:030E deficient, and Co-Chair Lewis seconded the motion. A roll-call vote was conducted. With five votes to find these regulations deficient and one pass vote, 804 KAR 13:020E and 804 KAR 13:030E, as amended, were found deficient.

Chair West explained his yes vote by stating 2025 RS SB 100 is a major bill with many different components, and this is the first time some businesses are required to be licensed in this way. There may be bills this session that will address the problem, but he wants to provide more time for compliance.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendment: to amend Section 1(2) to limit automatic denials based on false material statements to those made "knowingly" by the applicant, because it was added by the department in the Statement of Consideration but inadvertently omitted from the filed version of the regulation. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendment was approved.

**CABINET FOR HEALTH AND FAMILY SERVICES: Office of the Inspector General:
Outpatient Pharmacy Program**

In response to Chair West, Lisa Lee, Commissioner, DMS, stated the proposed amendment does not cover a GLP-1 drug for obesity or cosmetic purposes alone. Coverage eligibility requires an underlying medical condition, such as diabetes or cardiovascular disease.

In response to Representative Marzian, Commissioner Lee stated the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Advisory Committee at CHFS has input on the full eligibility criteria. Other underlying medical conditions may be added in the future.

In response to Co-Chair Lewis, Commissioner Lee stated projected costs and savings are determined by considering current expenditures and the health status of current enrollees. DMS only covers the drug if it is subject to rebates, and federal money covers about 70% of the cost.

In response to Co-Chair Lewis, Jonathan Scott, Chief Legislative and Regulatory Officer, DMS, stated the Office of Data Analytics conducted a fiscal review, considering anticipated actual utilization and cost savings from disease prevention.

In response to Co-Chair Lewis, Commissioner Lee explained each state is different on the covered populations and the criteria used. DMS criteria is Kentucky-specific, addressing prevalent health conditions. Kentucky recently moved from 41st to 43rd place in America's health rankings.

Co-Chair Lewis stated he has seen lives improved with the use of this drug but is concerned about the costs and the timing given the impending Medicaid cuts. He understands and appreciates the department's work, even if he disagrees with this amendment.

In response to Senator Raque Adams, Commissioner Lee stated these drugs are approved for diabetes, but the regulation excludes use for obesity. All current GLP-1 users have an underlying health condition. Removal of the weight loss exclusion allows for other health conditions to be treated with GLP-1.

Senator Raque Adams stated it is important to determine health outcomes with this type of drug. This issue will be addressed at an upcoming Medicaid Oversight and Advisory Board (MOAB) meeting.

In response to Representative Bridges, Mr. Scott stated a cost number could appear significant unless real world utilization is taken into account.

In response to Chair West, Commissioner Lee stated these drugs are already in the formulary, which DMS routinely changes. She explained DMS is establishing guardrails to ensure the medication is only given to those that truly need it. This drug is another tool to improve health status.

Representative Marzian stated she is a former kidney disease nurse. She explained the cost of dialysis and other health treatments for diabetics, expressing that prevention saves money.

Chair West stated this regulation should be found deficient because the legislature needs to have more input, and MOAB needs to study and clarify the cost. Chair West made a motion, seconded by Co-Chair Lewis, to find this administrative regulation deficient. A roll-call vote was conducted. With five votes to find this regulation deficient and one no vote, 907 KAR 023:010, as amended, was found deficient by the subcommittee.

Senator Raque Adams explained her yes vote by stating those with diabetes and other health conditions can already access these drugs.

Representative Bridges explained his yes vote by stating the most acute situations are already being addressed, and he would like to see hard numbers on the cost.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendment: to amend Sections 2 and 11 to comply with the drafting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendment was approved.

In response to Chair West, Michelle Shane, Executive Director, KBVE, stated the board withdrew 201 KAR 16:762 because of significant stakeholder feedback. KBVE is not prohibiting “pop-up” veterinary clinics but intends to establish appropriate standards to protect pets and the public. Low-cost rabies vaccination clinics authorized through the DPH are not affected. John Park, DVM, Chair, KBVE, stated the “Dedicated AAH Services Space” (DASS) requirements provide safety for the public and pets, especially for animals that might be anxious and scratch or bite. Ms. Shane stated there had been complaints about the “pop-up” clinics, and investigations uncovered multiple problems. Dr. Park stated the veterinary manager requirements are a compromise between stakeholders and the board. After the public comment period, KBVE was not approached by stakeholders with any ongoing concerns.

In response to Chair West, James Beckman, DVM, President, KVMA, stated he is a mobile veterinary practitioner and supports 201 KAR 16:767 because veterinary manager provisions help ensure pet and public safety. Tracking diseases, medical records, human exposure to disease, and drug security is vital to the practice of veterinary medicine. All facilities, including “pop-up” veterinary clinics, need to comply with all standards.

In response to Chair West, Mark Chick, DVM, Member, KVMA, stated he is a small animal veterinarian. He explained the difficulties of managing large numbers of veterinary

clinics and the importance of aftercare for the pets. Sufficient knowledge and control of facilities is necessary for compliance and recordkeeping.

In response to Chair West, Katryna Fler, Medical Director, VIP Petcare, stated mobile clinics provide care to Kentucky's pets. Over the last decade, VIP Petcare provided preventative care to over 83,000 Kentucky pets without incident, at a rate of approximately 7,500 pet-care visits per year. The proposed amendments would have devastating impacts to VIP Petcare in Kentucky, including cessation of most operations during a time of veterinary shortage. Most VIP Petcare veterinarians are contracted. Unlike many Kentucky veterinary facilities, VIP Petcare provides services on weekends, usually for short durations.

In response to Senator Raque Adams, Ms. Fler stated VIP Petcare had not reached out to the board but would do so.

In response to Chair West, Ms. Shane stated the board is not trying to prevent services to Kentucky pet owners. There are many low-cost veterinary options that are independent of "pop-up" facilities. Currently, there is an expansion of services beyond rabies and vaccine clinics. Diagnoses and treatment require more active oversight. Contracted veterinarians usually do not have control over service and drug protocols. There are 25 patients with complaints related to "pop-up" clinics, and four of those pets died.

The subcommittee agreed to the board's request to defer consideration of 201 KAR 16:767 to the March subcommittee meeting. Without objection, and with agreement from the subcommittee, the administrative regulation was deferred.
