

**ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATION REVIEW SUBCOMMITTEE**  
**Minutes of March 9, 2026**

**Call to Order and Roll Call**

The March meeting of the Administrative Regulation Review Subcommittee was held on Monday, March 9, 2026, at 12:40 PM in Room 149 of the Capitol Annex. Representative Derek Lewis, Chair, called the meeting to order, and roll call was taken.

### **Approval of February 9, 2026 Minutes**

A motion was made by Representative Marzian and seconded by Representative Gordon to approve the minutes of the February 9, 2026, meeting. Minutes were approved by voice vote without objection.

### **Findings of Deficiency pursuant to KRS 13A.030(2):**

#### **TRANSPORTATION CABINET: Department of Vehicle Regulation: Division of Motor Vehicle Licensing**

601 KAR 009:120. Accessible online insurance verification system.

Chair Lewis stated there are requirements in both the ordinary and emergency versions of these regulations that are not aligned with statute. Chair Lewis made a motion, seconded by Co-Chair West, to find these regulations deficient. A roll-call vote was conducted. With six votes to find 601 KAR 9:120 and 601 KAR 9:120E deficient, and two pass votes, these regulations were found deficient by the subcommittee.

Senator Chambers Armstrong explained her pass vote by stating she is a newer member of the subcommittee and does not have enough information.

601 KAR 009:120E. Accessible online insurance verification system.

#### **PUBLIC PROTECTION CABINET: Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control: Tobacco Enforcement**

804 KAR 013:020. Tobacco, nicotine, or vapor product license application forms.

Chair Lewis stated 804 KAR 13:020E and 804 KAR 13:030E were found deficient at the February subcommittee meeting. For consistency, he is moving to find the ordinary versions deficient. Chair Lewis made a motion, seconded by Co-Chair West, to find these regulations deficient. A roll-call vote was conducted. With six votes to find 804 KAR 13:020 and 804 KAR 13:030 deficient, and two pass votes, these regulations were found deficient by the subcommittee.

804 KAR 013:030. Causes for denial of tobacco, nicotine, or vapor product license.

#### **CABINET FOR HEALTH AND FAMILY SERVICES: Office of Inspector General: Controlled Substances**

902 KAR 055:110. Monitoring system for controlled prescription substances.

In response to Co-Chair West, Wes Duke, General Counsel, CHFS, stated the regulation requires veterinarians to use the Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting system (KASPER) when prescribing, but not administering, controlled substances. The cabinet engaged in substantial dialogue with KBVE and is open to continuing the discussion. He acknowledged timing and implementation is an issue.

In response to Chair Lewis, Mr. Duke stated the statutory definition of “prescriber” includes veterinarians. The cabinet is attempting to align the regulation and the statute, as veterinarians are currently exempt from the requirement to use KASPER.

In response to Senator Raque Adams, Mr. Duke confirmed veterinarians are required to have a U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) number.

Representative Marzian stated KASPER prevents doctor shopping. Veterinarians need to be in the KASPER program, as they prescribe scheduled drugs, which are subject to abuse.

Chair Lewis made a motion, seconded by Co-Chair West, to find this regulation deficient. A roll-call vote was conducted. With six votes to find 902 KAR 55:110 deficient, and two no votes, this regulation was found deficient by the subcommittee.

Senator Raque Adams explained her yes vote by stating the chair is privy to information concerning relevant legislation currently under consideration by the General Assembly.

### **Department for Community Based Services: Child Welfare**

922 KAR 001:565. Service array for a relative or fictive kin caregiver.

In response to Chair Lewis, Mr. Duke stated this regulation implements 2024 RS SB 151 if funds are available.

Senator Raque Adams explained the General Assembly unanimously passed SB 151 in 2024 and stated her frustration that the regulation is just now being promulgated. It is atypical to include conditional language in a regulation requiring available funds for implementation. The General Assembly is currently in the budget process. She advised CHFS to work with legislators on this issue. Kids are losing out because of the delay.

In response to Chair Lewis, Norma Hatfield, President, Kinship Families Coalition of Kentucky, stated the regulation shifts the beginning of the 120-day window for application to be a kinship care foster family from “placement” to “temporary custody.” This shift results in the waiving of federal funds. A simpler path is to place the child with the caregiver at removal and give the caregiver 120 days to consider whether to apply. This would protect the state and the kids, as well as avoiding waiver of federal funds.

In response to Senator Raque Adams, Ms. Hatfield stated Missouri, California, and Tennessee have a longer window for preserving federal funds.

In response to Chair Lewis, Mr. Duke stated the cabinet reached out concerning federal funding, and the response was no federal funds are available. This written

correspondence can be provided to the subcommittee. CHFS has no objection to the premise of SB 151, but there is no money in the budget for implementation. Hopefully, that will change. The cabinet is open to attempting suggested alternative approaches to access federal funding.

Senator Raque Adams made a motion, seconded by Representative Bridges, to find this regulation deficient. A roll-call vote was conducted. With six votes to find 922 KAR 1:565 deficient, one no vote, and one pass vote, this regulation was found deficient by the subcommittee.

Senator Chambers Armstrong explained her pass vote by stating she is a new member and is not aware of the history of the regulation, but she is concerned about points made by Senator Raque Adams. She looks forward to discussing the issue with the cabinet to gain a better understanding.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendment: to amend the STATUTORY AUTHORITY paragraph and Sections 1 and 5 to comply with the drafting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendment was approved.

### **Informational Review pursuant to KRS 13A.030(3) and (4):**

#### **BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS: Board of Barbering**

201 KAR 014:085. Sanitation requirements.

In response to Chair Lewis, Mason McNulty, Administrator, KBOB, stated requirements for convention centers or expos are the same as those for a regular barbershop, whether charging for haircuts or not. He is not aware of how other states manage this issue but will look into it. The mission of the board is to protect the public. These events often provide teaching, but the licensed barbers providing the teaching are not licensed to be instructors.

In response to Representative Bridges, Mr. McNulty confirmed the requirements are the same for back-to-school events offering free haircuts to kids. The statutes and regulations are set up to license a barber only if the barber is working in a licensed facility. Demonstration permits make it possible for the board to go into a facility and ensure requirements are met so the event can be held.

In response to Chair Lewis, Mr. McNulty explained the board purchased two temporary sinks and several ultra-violet cabinets to make these events more accessible. There is a fee of \$50 to use these items.

#### **Board of Veterinary Examiners**

201 KAR 016:767. Registered veterinary facilities – Duties of registered responsible parties and veterinarian managers.

In response to Co-Chair West, John Park, DVM, Chair, KBVE, stated the board reached out to opposing stakeholders offering multiple dates and times to meet for discussion on the regulation. The stakeholders were not amenable to the offered dates, but a meeting is now scheduled for April 10, 2026.

In response to Chair Lewis, Bob Babbage, Lobbyist on behalf of PetIQ, read a statement from his client, Dr. Katryna Fler, Medical Director, Kentucky PetIQ Clinics, explaining her concern about the requirement to have a veterinary manager present during business hours, with a supervising limit of five facilities. The regulation is written for a traditional full-service veterinary hospital. These hospitals operate long hours, perform surgeries, treat complex cases, house animals overnight, and maintain an inventory of controlled substances. Most mobile veterinary clinics operate only one time per month for about 90 minutes. Only one or two of these clinics operate at any given time. Their services are limited to vaccinations, preventive care, and parasite testing. If needed, the mobile clinic's licensed veterinarian is able to consult with Dr. Fler. The veterinary manager requirement creates a significant administrative burden for PetIQ without improving safety or quality of care. Mr. Babbage stated the board was advised last year by Senate senior staff to meet with this stakeholder. No contact was made until the February 2026 subcommittee meeting. PetIQ offered to immediately meet with KBVE at the conclusion of the subcommittee meeting, but the board declined. Mr. Babbage stated both he and his client, PetIQ, request a finding of deficiency.

In response to Co-Chair West, Mr. Babbage confirmed the board did reach out to the stakeholder after the February subcommittee meeting, and there is a meeting scheduled for April 10.

Representative Bridges commented there is a shortage of veterinarian services. The General Assembly's intent is to make it easier for people to access veterinary care, especially in underserved areas. His perception is the board is making it more difficult to access these services.

In response to Co-Chair West, Michelle Shane, Executive Director, KBVE, stated the board agreed to defer consideration of this regulation to the April subcommittee meeting.
