In response to Chair West, Mr. Brown stated "Safe at Home" is a program providing crime victims, such as survivors of domestic violence, with the ability to shield their address from the general public.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: to amend the RELATES TO, STATUTORY AUTHORITY, and NECESSITY, FUNCTION, AND CONFORMITY paragraphs and Sections 1 through 4 to comply with the drafting and formatting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A. BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS: Board of Pharmacy. Jessica Brown, General Counsel, KBOP; and Christopher Harlow, Executive Director, KBOP, represented the board.

201 KAR 002:440. Legend drug repository.

In response to Representative Marzian, Mr. Harlow stated the Legend Drug Repository program is a regulated redistribution program for donated medication, with a participating pharmacy receiving the donations and then dispensing to underinsured or uninsured individuals at no cost. The proposed amendment authorizes individual patients to donate qualifying medication. There is currently only 1 participating pharmacy, but the proposed changes may encourage more to join.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: to amend the RELATES TO and NECESSITY, FUNCTION, AND CONFORMITY paragraphs and Sections 1 through 6 to comply with the drafting and formatting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

Board of Optometric Examiners. Mary Beth Morris, President, KBOE; and Kristen Webb, General Counsel, KBOE, represented the board.

201 KAR 005:010E. Application for licensure; endorsement.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: to amend Sections 1 through 3 to modify the deadline for submitting an application for licensure for consistency with the application and to provide adequate time for board review. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

201 KAR 005:021. Licensure Compliance Review.

In response to Chair West, Ms. Morris stated 201 KAR 5:021 is the ordinary companion to the emergency regulation previously reviewed by the subcommittee. The proposed amendments mirror those made at the July meeting of the Interim Joint Committee on Health Services.

Chair West expressed appreciation for the board's cooperation with legislators through this process.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: (1) to amend the RELATES TO and NECESSITY, FUNCTION, AND CONFORMITY paragraphs and Sections 2 and 4 to comply with the drafting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A; (2) to amend Sections 2 and 3 to only allow the Optometry Examining Board of Canada (OEBC) exam as an allowable substitution for Part 1 of the National Board of Examiners in Optometry (NBEO) exam for initial licensees if the exam was taken or test results were submitted between July 30, 2025, and April 15, 2026; (3) to amend Section 2 to only allow the American Board of Optometry (ABO) board certification exam as an allowable substitution for Part 3 of the NBEO exam for initial licensees if the exam was taken

between February 5, 2026, and July 17, 2026; and (4) to amend Section 4 to remove the reference to the ABO exam in the requirements for affected licensees that are credentialed to perform laser procedures. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

Board of Dentistry. Jeff Allen, Executive Director, KBD, represented the board.

In response to Chair West, Ms. Singer stated applied behavior analysts are first certified under a national organization. The regulation reduces experience hours from 1,500 to 1,000 hours to better align with national requirements.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: to amend Sections 1, 3, and incorporated material to comply with the drafting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

INDEPENDENT ADMINISTRATIVE BODIES: Board of Emergency Medical Services. Eddie Slone, Executive Director, KBEMS; and John K. Wood, Board Counsel, KBEMS, represented the board.

202 KAR 007:550. Required equipment and ground vehicle standards.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: to amend Sections 1, 2, 4, and 5 to comply with the drafting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

TOURISM, ARTS AND HERITAGE CABINET: Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. Jenny Gilbert, Legislative Liaison, KDFWR; and Ben Monarch, General Counsel, KDFWR, represented the department. Todd Blevins, Kentucky Director, Humane World for Animals, appeared in opposition to 301 KAR 2:251.

Game

301 KAR 002:228. Sandhill crane hunting requirements.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: to amend the RELATES TO, STATUTORY AUTHORITY, and NECESSITY, FUNCTION, AND CONFORMITY paragraphs and Sections 2 and 3 to comply with the drafting and formatting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

301 KAR 002:251. Hunting and trapping seasons and limits for furbearers.

In response to Chair West, Ms. Gilbert stated proposed bag limit increases for bobcats and river otters were approved at the September 2025 meeting of the Fish and Wildlife Commission. The agency amendment complies with 2026 RS SB 39, which added a night hunting option for beavers and bobcats. The bag limit for bobcats is being increased from 5 to 10. Only 3 bobcats can be taken with a firearm, and only 1 bobcat can be taken at night. This is a conservative approach, which complies with the statute.

In response to Co-Chair Lewis, Ms. Gilbert stated the increased bag limit is appropriate.

In response to Senator Raque Adams, Ms. Gilbert stated landowners may consider bobcats a nuisance animal, but bobcats are not otherwise considered a nuisance. KDFWR is pro-hunting and views hunting as a conservation and resource management tool. While the cabinet does not have a specific number for bobcats, the voluntary bobcat jawbone submission process was designed to provide information for a better population estimate. Participation in this process was low, so the department is developing a new incentive program to increase jawbone submissions.

Senator Raque Adams commented it is curious to hunt something that is not overpopulated and does not have a more definitive population number. Biologists are not in lockstep on this issue. There needs to be a more unified opinion before making this decision.

In response to Chair West, Mr. Monarch stated the department adheres to the North American Model of Conservation, which focuses on management at both a species and ecosystem level. The department cannot have absolute control over nature, but it can make decisions based on data-gathering, considering both the species itself, as well as any species it might be affecting.

In response to Representative Marzian, Ms. Gilbert stated sportsman's groups and commission members requested the increased bag limits.

In response to Senator Wilson, Ms. Gilbert confirmed there is a nuisance animal regulation, which previously applied only to deer, but now applies to all wildlife.

In response to Chair West, Mr. Monarch confirmed bobcats are very elusive, and it is impossible to know the exact number.

In response to Chair West, Mr. Blevins stated he has deep respect for the department, but this proposal is premature. At the May commission meeting, the furbearer program coordinator for KDFWR explained the department needs to have 20 to 25% of the bobcat harvest for a valid population estimate. On average, the department gets information for approximately 7% of the harvest. Mr. Blevins stated the director of wildlife at KDFWR also expressed concern to the commission about insufficient data on the bobcat population and the risk of overharvest.

In response to Chair West, Mr. Blevins stated no one can say, without sufficient data, whether the new bag limit puts pressure on the bobcat population.

In response to Chair West, Mr. Monarch stated it is easy to think of data as a fixed number, but the department is constantly gathering and interpreting data every season. Ms. Gilbert stated the regulation can be amended when more information is available.

Representative Marzian commented on the increased bag limits. Humans encroach on habitat every day, labeling animals living there as a nuisance. Laws for increased hunting can result in the wipeout of a species. There needs to be more study on this issue.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: (1) to amend Section 7 to add requirements for taking a beaver or bobcat at night, in accordance with 2026 RS SB 39; and (2) to amend Section 11 to delete requirements relating to voluntary submission of lower jaws from harvested bobcats. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

Water Patrol

TRANSPORTATION CABINET: Division of Driver Licensing: Matt Cole, Commissioner, DVR, KYTC; Jon Johnson, Staff Attorney, OLS, KYTC; and Heather Stout, Executive Director, OIT, KYTC, represented the department.

601 KAR 012:130. Third-party issuance of identity documents.

In response to Chair West, Commissioner Cole stated this regulation establishes identity security requirements for third-party entities issuing identity documents. The intent is to protect driver privacy. Duties include finger-printing and Real ID, and the department is required to conduct security audits.

In response to Chair West, Commissioner Cole explained private agencies, such as the American Automobile Association, or AAA, successfully pursued legislation on this topic. The cabinet reviewed similar programs in other states prior to promulgation.

In response to Chair West, Commissioner Cole stated the cabinet has a new, more secure system in place to protect against illegal activities.

In response to Representative Gordon, Commissioner Cole stated there is not currently a backlog, except possibly with driver testing. Third-party facilities are brick and mortar locations, not mobile units.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: (1) to amend the RELATES TO, STATUTORY AUTHORITY, and NECESSITY, FUNCTION, AND CONFORMITY paragraphs and Sections 1 through 7 to comply with the drafting and formatting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A; (2) to amend Sections 3 and 6 to require necessary equipment be leased; (3) to amend Section 4 to require third-party issuers to maintain cybersecurity liability insurance rather than require a fine for a breach of security; and (4) to amend Section 7 to correct the name of the incorporated material and update the material consistent with the administrative regulation. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

815 KAR 035:015. Certification of electrical inspectors.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the following amendments: to amend the RELATES TO paragraph and Sections 2 through 4, 7, and 8 and incorporated material to comply with the drafting and formatting requirements of KRS Chapter 13A. Without objection, and with agreement from the agency, the amendments were approved.

CABINET FOR HEALTH AND FAMILY SERVICES: Office of Medical Cannabis. Cannon Armstrong, Executive Director, OMC, CHFS; Sam Flynn, Special Advisor, Chief Deputy Counsel, Office of the Governor; and Shelby Lewis, Executive Policy Advisor, OMC, CHFS, represented the office.

915 KAR 002:050E. Qualifying Medical Conditions.

In response to Chair West, Mr. Flynn stated 2023 RS SB 47 created a list of conditions and symptoms qualifying for the medical cannabis program. Due to an outpouring of questions related to qualification, the governor issued an executive order directing the cabinet to promulgate an emergency and ordinary regulation clarifying the conditions covered. The proposed conditions meet the statutory definition of "qualifying medical condition" and require a diagnosis by a medical cannabis practitioner. These conditions do not constitute an expansion of the statutory list.

In response to Chair West, Ms. Lewis stated there are several peer-reviewed studies showing medical cannabis reduces hospital admissions for those experiencing significant, chronic pain. It can increase appetite and reduce nausea for cachexia, which is a severe weight loss syndrome often affecting cancer patients. Mr. Flynn stated studies also show opioid overdoses decrease as availability of medical cannabis increases.

In response to Chair West, Mr. Armstrong stated there are approximately 23,495 active cardholders. Since January 2026, cardholders increased by 250 every week. After adding these clarifications and educating the public on qualifying conditions, cardholders are increasing by 400 to 500 per week. Mr. Flynn explained this number is expected to grow as dispensaries open across the state.

In response to Representative Gordon, Mr. Flynn stated OMC meets on a regular basis with the Kentucky Center for Cannabis at the University of Kentucky, although much of the work done by the center is grant-focused and not always concentrated on medical cannabis.

In response to Chair West, Mr. Flynn confirmed the cabinet is following the letter and the spirit of the law. The General Assembly has the authority to expand these conditions, although the statute carves out an exception for the Kentucky Center for Cannabis, which may expand the conditions under certain circumstances.
