Minutes of the 7th Meeting of the 2024 Interim

December 10, 2024

Call to Order and Roll Call

Approval of Minutes – November 8, 2024

Senator Funke Frommeyer made a motion, seconded by Representative Timoney, to approve the minutes. The motion passed by voice vote.

2024 RS SJR 170 Feasibility Study of Postbaccalaureate Programs

Dr. Aaron Thompson, President, CPE; Scott Friedman, Engagement Principal, Deloitte Consulting LLP; and Amy Whittmayer, Engagement Lead, Deloitte Consulting LLP, outlined the findings of a feasibility study conducted from August 2024 until November 2024, which explored the proposed addition of a new postbaccalaureate program at each of the following universities: Eastern Kentucky University, Murray State University,

Western Kentucky University, and Kentucky State University. The results of the feasibility study identified concerns. However, many of the identified concerns would be present at any institution which planned to launch a new graduate college, given the significant reputational and financial risk associated with such a venture. Deloitte Consulting LLP's recommendations included clarifying the mission of public institutions in statute, as well as ensuring that the coordinating entity (CPE) is empowered to carry out its statutory role of defining and approving all postsecondary academic programs in the Commonwealth.

2024 RS SJR 179 Report Findings

Dr. Ryan Quarles, President, KCTCS; Dr. James McCaslin, Acting Executive Director, KCTCS; and Dr. Phil Neal, Acting Executive Vice President, KCTCS, presented 11 recommendations from recently completed forensic audits which explored avenues for improving its existing systems. These recommendations included supporting third-party validation of academic programs, restructuring Program Advisory Committees, establishing a statewide workforce plan, exploring mergers and consolidations to repurpose and revitalize locations, preserving college-level accreditation, reforming governance, evaluating the current funding model, assessing tuition rates and analyzing affordability, restructuring the personnel system, examining the effectiveness of dual credit course offerings as well as the transferability of associate's degrees to other institutions, and rewriting outdated statutory language.

Public Comment

Dr. Lewis Pittman, DVM, and Dr. Jon Laster, DVM, expressed multiple concerns with Murray State University's ability to construct and operate a successful school of veterinary medicine. They cited a perceived lack of ability to attract and retain qualified professors, an inability to adhere to American Veterinary Medical Association guidelines, ineffectiveness of the proposed distributed model college, as compared to a traditional model college, as well as a lack of clinical sites for instructional use.
