In response to Representative Petrie, Ms. Curry explained the Personal Service Contract pertains to complex litigation matters, which have recently increased in volume. She noted cost savings from other Personal Service Contracts would offset the additional expense of this agreement. Ms. Curry further state that a complex estate case in Colorado is nearing resolution and is expected to provide a tenfold financial return to the university within 60 to 90 days. Ms. Molsberger stated the vendor did not have the lowest hourly rate but was awarded the contract based on specialization needed.

In response to Co-Chair Douglas, Ms. Curry stated she would expect from the cost savings she could make adjustments to contracts requested, but he sitant because the CFO

determines final allocations. Ms. Curry stated she would make the adjustments available to the committee when realized.

A motion was made by Representative Roarx to consider the contract as reviewed. Co-Chair Douglas seconded the motion, which passed with Senator Meredith voting no.

BEHAVIORAL, HEALTH, DEVELOPMENTAL & INTELLECTUAL DISABILITIES

Seven Counties Services, Inc., 2500002783. Dr. Patti Clark, Director of the Division of Mental Health, DBHDID, CHFS; Wesley Duke, General Counsel, CHFS; and Sarah Johnson, Director of the Division of Substance Use Disorder, DBHDID, CHFS, discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Co-Chair Douglas, Dr. Clark stated Seven Counties provides 988 services and is one of 14 centers that answer calls throughout the state. They also provide a wide array of services to individuals with serious mental illness, including youths who have severe emotional disabilities. All services provided are out-patient services.

In response to Co-Chair Douglas, Ms. Johnson stated the regional prevention centers are housed in community mental health centers. The centers help support schools and community organizations to focus on universal prevention to prevent the disorders from occurring in the first place.

In response to Co-Chair Douglas, Mr. Duke stated the agency is cognizant of what is happening at the federal level and is communicating with individuals regarding coverages and any potential changes.

In response to Representative Petrie, Mr. Duke stated the bankruptcy case is pending with a motion of reconsideration for the past 13 to 14 months.

A motion was made by Representative Roarx to consider the contract as reviewed. Senator Thomas seconded the motion, which passed.

over the past two to four years, but now need the additional funds to finish existing cases that exceeded the original amount requested.

In response to Senator Thomas, Chair Hart stated the \$125 per hour is a committee policy, that it could be a regulation at the Executive Branch, and would get back to Senator Thomas.

DW Wilburn, Inc., 3605-2026. Micah Hunsucker, Director of Procurement, EKU, and Bryan Makinen, Chief Campus Operations Officer, EKY, discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Chair Hart, Mr. Makinen stated this is the total construction cost for the new Model Laboratory School being built on campus.

A motion was made by Senator Meredith to consider the contract as reviewed. Co-Chair Douglas seconded the motion, which passed.

WESTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY

Dinsmore & Shohl, LLP, 252610. Andrea Anderson, General Counsel, WKU, and Jennifer Smith, Assistant Vice President of Government and External Relations, WKU, discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Co-Chair Douglas, Ms. Smith stated the \$740 hourly rate is to service P3 counsel and the other bid was from a California firm with a higher rate.

A motion was made by Senator Richardson to consider the contract as reviewed. Co-Chair Douglas seconded the motion, which passed.

THE FOLLOWING PERSONAL SERVICE AMENDMENTS WERE SELECTED FOR FURTHER REVIEW:

DEPARTMENT FOR MEDICAID SERVICES

Gainwell Technologies, LLC, 2400001323. Lisa Lee, Commissioner, Department of Medicaid Services, CHFS, discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Chair Hart, Commissioner Lee stated SJR 72 mandated the department create a new waiver specific for individuals with severe mental illness and/or severe mental illness and substance use disorder. Due to this, they anticipate adding new individuals/members who will need prior authorizations for services provided by Medicaid providers.

In response to Co-Chair Douglas, Commissioner Lee stated the additional funds are to handle the anticipated increase because of the new 1959 Waiver for Severe Mental Illness.

In response to Representative Petrie, Commissioner Lee stated she anticipates initially around 5,000 individuals to participate in the new 1959 Waiver. This is needed to help individuals across the Commonwealth and promote recovery and prevent institutionalization.

Representative Roarx made a clarifying statement that 1915 I-Rise does function differently than the traditional 1915 C waivers.

A motion was made by Representative Roarx to consider the contract as reviewed. Senator Thomas seconded the motion, which passed.

DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS

Stantec Consulting Services, Inc., 2400004098; H. W. Lochner, Inc., 2500000143. Eric Pelfrey, Director of Professional Services, Department of Highways, KYTC, and Chuck Berger, Design Project Manager – Division 5, Department of Highways, KYTC, discussed the contracts with the committee.

In response to Co-Chair Douglas, Mr. Pelfrey stated using a phased approach is more prudent for cost and schedule. They have completed Phase 1 and are moving into Phase 2 which consists of structure design services.

A motion was made by Senator Meredith to consider the contracts as reviewed. Co-Chair Douglas seconded the motion, which passed.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

Jackie Horn, Attorney at Law, K25-151. Barry Swanson, Chief Procurement Officer and Interim Vice President for Facilities Management, UK; Melissa Fredrick, Vice President of Human Resources, UK; and Michael Hatfield, Director of Administration at UK Healthcare and Office of Government Relations and Public Policy, UK, discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Representative Petrie, Mr. Swanson stated he was not aware of the funding mechanism and can speak only to the procurement and services. He stated he does not know how long Jackie Horn has provided services, but this contract was set up as an RFP and was awarded as so. The law firm represents patients and does not represent the university. The firm applies for appointment with the local district court as a guardian. Mr. Hatfield explained that the increase was due to a reduction from three attorneys to two, resulting in services being shifted to this attorney.

Senator Thomas made a statement that guardianship statutes need to be addressed and are outdated.

A motion was made by Senator Meredith to defer the contract to the October 2025 meeting. Co-Chair Douglas seconded the motion, which passed with Senator Thomas and Representative Roarx voting no.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

Aon Consulting, Inc., K25-222. Mr. Swanson, Ms. Fredrick, and Mr. Hatfield discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Representative Petrie, Ms. Fredrick stated this is considered one time work that they came across as they embarked on a couple of their RFPs. The vendor supports the university's health insurance plans, student health plans, retiring medical health plans, and knowing your RX coalition.

A motion was made by Senator Meredith to consider the contract as reviewed. Senator Thomas seconded the motion, which passed.

WESTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY

Willoughby & Crane (Mrs. Willoughby), 242625. Ms. Anderson and Ms. Smith discussed the contract with the committee.

A motion was made by Senator Meredith to consider the contract as reviewed. Representative Roarx seconded the motion, which passed.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH, DEVELOPMENTAL & INTELLECTUAL DISABILITIES

Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation, 2500003391. Dr. Patti Clark, Director, Division of Mental Health, DBHDID, CHFS, and Sarah Johnson, Director, Division of Substance Use Disorder, DBHDID, CHFS, discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Chair Hart, Ms. Johnson stated the contract supports statewide training for substance abuse disorder for treatment professionals on the American Society for Addiction Medicine (ASAM) criteria 4th edition. It is a highly recognized set of standards for treatment placement, treatment service intensity, treatment planning of individuals, addiction, and co-occurring disorders. It is a requirement by Medicaid for ASAM criteria effective July 1, 2025. Ms. Johnson stated they have placed this on their website and emailed to Community Mental Health and Licensed providers. They have worked with Hazelton Betty Ford to develop a customized outcome measurement, pre and post evaluation, to help measure the return on investment.

A motion was made by Senator Richardson to consider the contract as reviewed. Senator Thomas seconded the motion, which passed.

CHFS - DEPARTMENT FOR AGING AND INDEPENDENT LIVING

Multi, 2600000026. Marnie Mountjoy, Director, Department for Aging and Independent Living, CHFS; Edward Clark, Human Services Program Branch Manager, CHFS; and Tiffany Smither, Assistant Director, Department for Aging and Independent Living, CHFS, discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Chair Hart, Ms. Mountjoy stated multi vendors cover the 15 area development districts.

In response to Representative Petrie, Ms. Mountjoy stated this is a federally funded program for outreach.

Senator Thomas made a statement to add the 15 area development districts to the vendor list or description.

A motion was made by Senator Meredith to consider the contract as reviewed. Chair Hart seconded the motion, which passed.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH, DEVELOPMENTAL & INTELLECTUAL DISABILITIES

Foundation for A Healthy Kentucky, 2400003380. Dr. Clark and Ms. Johnson discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Chair Hart, Dr. Clark stated that the funding supports a variety of programs across the state, including life skills training, mentoring, opportunities to build resilience for success in society, and school-based prevention initiatives.

A motion was made by Senator Meredith to consider the contract as reviewed. Representative Roarx seconded the motion, which passed.

DEPARTMENT FOR COMMUNITY BASED SERVICES

Feeding Kentucky, Inc., 2600000049. Roger McCann, Director, Division of Family Support, DCBS, CHFS, discussed the contract with the committee.

In response to Co-Chair Douglas, Mr. McCann stated this contract is for SNAP outreach, a USDA program focused on outreach and education rather than benefits. He explained the previous four contracts did not cover all 120 counties, so a new contract was developed with reduced overhead and fewer invoices. The selected vendor is affiliated with seven food banks that collectively serve all 120 counties.

In response to Co-Chair Douglas, Mr. McCann stated this contract is not adding additional funds, they are combining all previously existing contracts into one contract to make it more efficient.

A motion was made by Senator Meredith to consider the contract as reviewed. Senator Richardson seconded the motion, which passed.
