Minutes of the 5th Meeting of the 2025 Interim

October 23, 2025

Call to Order and Roll Call

Approval of September Minutes

A motion was made by Representative Pollock and seconded by Representative Marzian to approve the minutes of the September 25, 2025, meeting. Minutes were approved by voice vote without objection.

Visit Jessamine - Making an Impact

Representative Moore; Charla Reed, Executive Director, Visit Jessamine; and Brian Young, Owner and Operator, 1922 House Vineyards and Winery, LLC, discussed Jessamine County tourism. Ms. Reed detailed statistics related to Jessamine County tourism; explained the process of rebranding Jessamine County as a premier Kentucky destination and tourist attraction; and highlighted the Jessamine County Wine and Spirits Trail. Mr. Young outlined how tourism dollars impact Jessamine County and surrounding areas.

Senator Boswell acknowledged the importance of tourism and sales tax dollars to Kentucky's economy.

In response to Senator Thomas, Ms. Reed detailed Jessamine County's annual Halloween traditions that are coordinated by Visit Jessamine.

Fort Knox Update and Impact

Representative Tate and Colonel (Ret.) Lance O'Bryan, President and CEO, Knox Regional Development Alliance, provided an update on Fort Knox and its impact on the communities of Bullitt, Hardin, and Meade counties. Colonel (Ret.) O'Bryan read a prepared statement written by Fort Knox Deputy Garrison Commander Jim Bradford, discussing Fort Knox's status as a driver of economic strength, community partnerships, and workforce development across the Commonwealth. Colonel (Ret.) O'Bryan detailed the history of Ft. Knox and its tourism impact on the surrounding area and the state. Ft. Knox brings 35,000 to Kentucky from May to November for summer cadet training. He outlined his professional experience at Fort Knox.

In response to Co-Chair Wheeler, Colonel (Ret.) O'Bryan confirmed Fort Knox has discontinued its World War II reenactments.

In response to Senator Thomas, Colonel (Ret.) O'Bryan discussed the impact of the government shutdown on Fort Knox military and non-military personnel.

In response to Representative Tate, Colonel (Ret.) O'Bryan discussed the recent installation of the digital air-ground integration range at Fort Knox.
