SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION: Create a new section of KRS Chapter 431 to allow expundement of designated Class D felonies: amend KRS 431.076 to allow expungement of felony charges on which the grand jury has not issued an indictment and to allow an appellate court opinion to be redacted to remove the name of a person for whom an expungement has been ordered on the basis of a finding of not guilty or upon a dismissal of the charges; amend KRS 431.078 to allow for expungements of multiple misdemeanors and to prohibit any expungement if it is for an offense subject to a penalty enhancement for a second or subsequent offense; amend KRS 431.079 to conform. STATE IMPACT: Class A, B & C felonies are based on an average daily prison rate of \$61.09. Most Class D felons are housed in one of 78 full service jails for up to 5 years. DOC's cost to incarcerate a felony inmate in a jail is \$32.51 per day (includes jail per diem, medical & central office costs), not including substance abuse treatment. Projections are based on the daily rate x 365 x number of years. MINIMAL MODERATE NONE **SIGNIFICANT Projected Impact:** \$0-\$1,000,000 \$1,000,000-\$5,000,000 \$5,000,000- Up Potential Impact: The proposed legislation will allow for persons with certain class D felonies to apply for expungement. Thee is a \$500 fee for the expungement and it can only be applied for 10 years after serve out of completions of a person's probation or parole. Upon entry of an order vacating or expunging a conviction the Department Of Corrections would be required to delete or remove the records from the computers system so that the matter shall not appear on official state performed background checks. The Department of Corrections processed than 208 expungements for 2015. This bill is expected to increase staff time to research and process the expungement of records; however, the impact is expected to be minimal. LOCAL IMPACT: Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. While the expense varies by jail, this estimated impact will be based on \$31.92 per day, which equals the per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders. Projected Impact: NONE MINIMAL MODERATE Potential Impact: Local facilities would be required to remove the expunged records from their computer systems.
