SUBJECT: .AN ACT relating to offenses committed in a continuing course of conduct against vulnerable victims.

SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION: Create a new section of KRS Chapter 501, relating to general principles of liability, to define "offense against a vulnerable victim" and to create a mechanism for charging a person with the commission of an offense against a vulnerable victim in a continuous course of conduct.

SCS1/CI/LM - Add KRS 529.100 and 529.110 to offenses which can be charged in a continuing course of conduct. Add subsection specifying that if a person is convicted of an offense against a vulnerable victim in a continuing course of conduct, that person may not also be convicted of charges based on the individual unlawful acts that were part of the continuing course of conduct.

SFA1(W. Westerfield) - Clarify that applicability of bill is determined by age of victim at the time of the offense.

During the calendar year 2015, 356 individuals were incarcerated under the offenses listed in the proposed egislation. If an additional 10% of offenders were incarcerated that would add 36 offenders.

Violent Offenses require the offender to serve 85% of their sentence to release.

Additionally, there would be costs associated with Sex Offender Conditional Discharge (SOCD). SCOD lasts for 5 years upon release from prison. Any offender who violates SOCD returns to prison and serves the remainder of the SOCD time day for day.

Those offenders charged with a sex crime would have to register on the Sex Offender Registry. This duty would fall to law enforcement to complete and maintain.

LOCAL IMPACT : Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. While the expense varies by jail, this estimated impact will be based on \$31.34 per day, which equals the per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders.
